TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

Thursday Morning Session.

After roll call and reading of minutes, the special work of the Association began by "A Lesson in Chemistry" by Mr. J. M. Duncan.

The difference between chemical and mechanical union was illustrated by a number of experiments.

The action of acids in changing vegetable blues to red, and of gases in changing the red to blue; also the similar results in the processes of breathing and the burning of a candle were experimentally shown, with quite a number of others which we have not space here to enumerate.

The discussion following this lesson was participated in by Mr. R. H. Campbell, Inspector Campbell, Mr. Seaman and Prof. Murray.

Next was a paper by Prof. Murray, of Dalhousie College, Halifax. The individual in education was the subject of this paper. Prof. Murray in referring to the centralizing tendency of the age showed the advantages and the defects of the movement in education. He condemned the present method of compelling all teachers and pupils to follow the routine. He favored the independence of the individual. The school work should be arranged and carried forward to form men and women of independence and not faint echoes of their predecessors. A plan tried in Dakota in which the teaching was chiefly individual was described and favorably criticised. The English, French and German methods of examination were afterwards discussed and the superiority of the German method pointed out. The great object, however, was to secure able men and women as teachers.

In the discussions which followed, the principal speakers were Mr. Seaman, Mr. Kiely, Rev. Mr. Corey.

At the close of this session it was announced that there would be a public meeting at 8 o'clock tonight at which the speakers would be Rev. P. Curran, Prof. Murray, Rev. Mr. Fullerton and Hon. D. Laird.

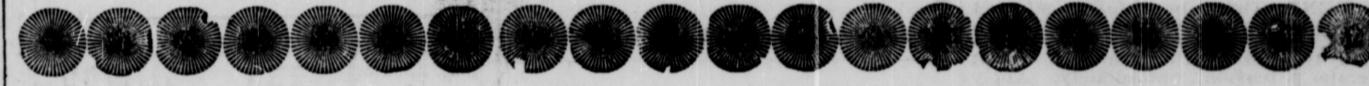
