## Nurses Association Endorses Training At Riverside Hosp.

Three years ago the Maritime Hospital Association made a recommendation to the Minister of Health, Dr. M.L. Bonnell, to the effect that "A Psychiatric Affiliate Program be Organized at the Riverside Hospital". This recommendation was wholeheartedly endorsed by the Directors of the Nurses' Association.

"It is exciting to see words take the form of a nurses' residence and a nursing education program in such a short space of time," said a spokesman for the nurses' Association.

At this time, the Association of Nurses wishes to express publicly our appreciation to the Minister of Health, Dr. M.L. Bonnell and the Deputy Minister of Health, Dr. O.H. Curtis for their co-operation and interest in implementing this recommendation. It is an indication, too, of the foresight of the members of our government that they approved the expenditure of funds for this program.

**DIFFICULT TIMES**  
The responsibility of the care of the mentally ill in this province has been shouldered by Dr. A.J. Murchison and Mrs. Laura Kitchen, R.N. in difficult times. The construction of the new hospital and nurses' residence is the realization of an idea long entertained by them. Dr. A.J. Murchison has been Superintendent of the Provincial Psychiatric Hospital since 1934 and Mrs. Laura Kit

chen has been Director of Nursing since 1947. The young women and the men who have served as nursing attendants at Falconwood Hospital (now Riverside Hospital) are deserving of a great deal of admiration, they have met the challenge of patient care when there were fewer measures available to alleviate the sufferings of the mentally ill patient.

We look forward with hope and intense interest to this new program of twelve weeks affiliation for the students of nursing from the General Hospitals. In this first class, there are twelve students, nine from the Charlottetown Hospital and three from the Prince Edward Island Hospital. In September 1958, the Prince Court Hospital School of Nursing will begin to participate in the programme.

Forsyth, a Social Worker Miss Mary Farmer, M.S.W., a Psychologist Mr. Russel M. Ewing, M.A., and two nurses, Miss Katharine MacLennan, R.N., B.Sc. and Mrs. Laura Kitchen, R.N. Both nurses have had special preparation in the care of the mentally ill.

Miss Katharine MacLennan has had the responsibility of organizing the Psychiatric affiliate program with the collaboration of Mrs. Laura Kitchen.

The program for the preparation of nursing attendants is in charge of Miss Katharine MacNaughton, R.N. Both of these Nursing Education programs are carried on simultaneously and

## Narrow Escapes Are Not Just Food For Talk

Put a group of men together in a club or at lunch, introduce experiences like that and immediately you have a string of dramatic recollections of accidents and narrow escapes. It will be surprising how many of them refer to unsafe vehicles. They will talk of lights that went out at 50 miles an hour, tires that blew, broken exhaust pipes that sent fumes into parked cars, windshield wipers that blinded drivers, horns that went mute at the wrong times, and many more.

"After a hard winter of driving," warns the Canadian Highway Safety Conference, "the only way to drive without fear of your vehicle's mechanical faults is to have it thoroughly checked. After all, a car is only a machine; it can't cry out in pain or complain of an ache in the crankcase. Find trouble before it finds you, and eliminate it."

The Conference is sponsoring a national "Check Your Car, Check Your Driving, Check Accidents" campaign during May in Canada.
