**—OFFICERS RE-ELECTED AT ANNUAL MEETING OF PRINCE COUNTY HOSPITAL**—Mr. H. T. Holman was re-elected president of the annual meeting of the Prince County Hospital held on Tuesday evening in the Town Hall. Mr. Holman presided and Mr. James H. Frichard, secretary, read the minutes of the last annual meeting. Mr. H. T. Holman submitted his annual report which was passed and approved. The retiring directors, H. T. Holman, W. E. Darby, B. W. Robinson, A. S. MacKay and J. L. Gorrill were re-elected for another term of three years. Officers all re-elected are President, H. T. Holman, Vice-President, Charles T. Rogers; secretary treasurer, James H. Frichard.

**—COUNTY COURT**—The June term of the County Court of Prince County commenced at Summerside Court House on Tuesday Judge D. Edgar Shaw presiding. There were eight garnishee cases, six contested cases and five cases stood over from the last term of the docket. The garnishee cases were disposed of in the morning. One of these garnishee cases furnished considerable interest as it concerned part of a fisherman's replacement loan of \$100 which had been transferred for a third party's benefit and then had been attached in the hands of the third party. The Judge gave the garnishee the order to have the money paid to him. In the afternoon two contested cases were tried being actions for debt. Judgment went for the defendants in both cases. W. E. Darby for the plaintiffs, and Heath Strong, K.C., for the defendants. The Court adjourned at six o'clock to July 5th when the contested cases which have been set down at various dates to suit the parties will be commenced. All the Summerside lawyers were in attendance at the opening of the Court.

### McCallum On Mound As Kensington Turns Back Vitas In Thrilling Game

The Kensington entry in the Summerside Baseball League celebrated the official opening of its new diamond with a thrilling 4-3 victory over the luckless Vitamannas of Summerside. Close to 700 fans were kept at a fever pitch right from the beginning up to the "Merriwell" finish which saw Kensington push across the winner with one out in the last half of the ninth inning. It was a tough game for the Vitas to lose as they had the two big factors which go to win ball games. They had three errors to seven by Kensington and also outbatted the winners seven to five, but tight pitching by lion-hearted "Boo" MacCallum in the clutches, and poor base running by the Vitas led to their downfall. It was the third straight loss in three consecutive nights for the Vitas and sent them floundering into the league cellar.

"Boo" MacCallum pitched steady ball over the whole route and was unbeatatable in the "pinches", leaving eight runners stranded on the bases. He struck out fifteen over the nine inning route.

Daly started for the Vitas but had to retire at the end of the third because of a sore arm. He had allowed two hits and his successor Murray Willett allowed only three in the remaining six innings. With the score deadlocked at three all from the 5th inning on a hush could be heard as the locals came to bat in their half of the ninth for what proved to be a dramatic finish. Webster, first man up, attempted to bunt down the third base line but was out on a pretty play by Jim McInnis. Higgins was next batter and he drove a hard grounder through the box for a base hit, and stole second on the next ball. Champion then laid down a bunt which was fielded by Willett but in making a hasty throw to first he threw wild allowing Higgins to score and the game was over.

To pick individual stars would be impossible as each player on both sides gave all he had. Many fans welcomed the return of Irving Jay to the Kensington lineup as it will be remembered he was very popular with the fans as an extra base hitter last season.

The fourth game of the week

will be played at the School diamond this evening between the Red Sox and Kensington.
