

Charlottetown Entry Wins CNR Golf Trophy

MONCTON, Aug. 26 — One of the most successful C. N. R. Atlantic Region golf tournaments was held in Moncton yesterday afternoon with the largest number of entries from outside points since the formation of the tournament back in 1925. Despite the inclement weather there was a large turnout locally. The tournament was played over the 18-hole course of the Moncton Golf and Country Club.

Following the close of play a banquet was held during which the several trophies and prizes won were presented. Frank L. Doyle, railway veteran of Moncton and a veteran golfer, presided as master of ceremonies.

The regional trophy went to H. L. Woodridge of Charlottetown. With the trophy went a miniature donated by W. E. Robinson, vice-president and general manager of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways who made the presentation.

Other prize winners were championship runner-up, Robert LeBlanc, Moncton; first division low gross, E. C. Taylor of New Glasgow; runner-up J. G. Heavyside of Moncton; low net, W. C. Randles, also of Moncton; runner-up, J. P. Ward of Campbellton.

A very large crowd watched the tense struggle and fan-interest was at fever pitch.

Andy's Aces committed two errors, both in the first inning, and George's had one in the final frame. Between these miscues very steady ball was played. Time after time the girls made nice catches, handled grounders well, and displayed heads-up ball in critical situations. Marie Peters and Cousin Carmen Smith were the pitchers and shared honors fairly evenly. Peters allowing only four hits but walking seven, and Smith giving up nine bingles but issuing only one free pass.

George's safe blows were delivered by Linnie Gallant, Wanda Chappell, Carmen Smith and Muriel Mimeo. Marie Peters led the Ace attack with 3 for 3. Joyce Enman and Ellen Gibson each had 2 for 3, and Teresa Cahill and Lorinda Gaudet clouted out one apiece.

Teedie Cahill's run into the shrubs to gather in Rose Gaudet's foul fly at a critical time in the last frame was the best defensive play among many good ones. Dot Callant's scooping in of Nancy MacFarlane's foul in the fourth was also brilliant, as was Muriel Mimeo's leaping catch of Helen MacFarlane's potential Texas leaguer, and Marion Rogers' stab of Marsha Delaney's looper in the third, and Gibson's catch in the fifth to rob Delaney again.

Two double plays were pulled off, one by each team. Gibson caught Delaney's pop in the first and doubled Chappell off first. Mimeo caught Myra Murphy's fly in the third and caught Enman napping off third.
