

## Americans Plan Firm Stand On West's Rights At Geneva

WASHINGTON (CP) — President Eisenhower made clear Wednesday that the United States will present a firm stand at Geneva, demanding that Russia recognize the basic rights of the Western powers in any new East-West negotiations.

But at the same time he told a press conference that while he feels sure the American people are alerted to the possible consequences of failure in the new round of negotiations opening Monday, he never would give up trying to find a solution to the cold war.

Eisenhower's press conference followed a brief private morning chat between the president and State Secretary Herter, who flies to Ottawa Saturday on his way to Geneva.

**THREATENING TALKS**  
Eisenhower rebuked Khrushchev for what he termed menacing talks about a possible war over Berlin.

"I don't believe that responsible people should indulge in anything that can even remotely be considered ultimatums or threats," he said. "That is not the way to reach peaceful solutions."

## THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

The problem of how to spend one's summer vacation—where to go and what to do—can often be very perplexing. One naturally wishes to get the most out of it. We wait so long for our holidays. Suddenly they are upon us, then behind us; so short they are, so quickly gone.

It is no wonder that quite often we feel cheated. But this feeling of being cheated is not seldom due to a lack of preparing for, and perhaps a misuse of, the time allotted us.

The purpose of holidays, of course, is to give us a chance to recoup the losses of vigor which a year of work has inflicted upon us in mind and body. We need to relax, rest, and, above all, re-energize.

(The hypoten in the last work is intentional; for the word "re-energize" has all but lost its original meaning and has become synonymous with any kind of idle enjoyment.)

In other words, holidays should be looked upon as a time of restoration, not as a time for further depletion of our much-needed energy.

What has been said so far will seem to many a laboring of the obvious. But that it is not so obvious to others is proved by the very familiar sight of vacationers returning from their holiday more tired than when they left.

No wonder such people feel cheated. The very purpose of vacation has been frustrated. One recalls, in this connection, the physician in an advertisement for pain-relief pills a few years ago: "For vacations and other headaches."

**OUT OF RUT**  
Perhaps the most misleading of maxims regarding vacation is that which says "a change is as good as a rest." Now, no one would claim that this saying is literally true; tightrope-walking would be a change for most people but not, for most, as good as a rest.

But there is some truth in it, in so far as a change of situation and activity helps us get out of the rut which daily routine produces, brings our creative self

**QUESTION SUSPECTS**  
SAIGON (AP)—Vietnamese security troops have apprehended several persons believed connected with killing of two American army officers and wounding of a third at Bienhoa, an American official said Saturday. The suspects were being interrogated and officials hoped they would reveal the whereabouts of the Communist terrorists who attacked the Americans' billet at a Vietnamese army base with sub-machine-guns and homemade bombs Wednesday.

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## Harvard Professor Retires, Is Former Tryon Resident

Alden B. Dawson, 12 Scott St., Cambridge, professor of zoology at Harvard University and well-known for his work on the minute structure of a variety of animal tissues, will retire this Summer.

Associated with Harvard since 1929, he was director of the biological laboratories from 1935 to 1940 and chairman of the biology department the next five years.

After retirement he will remain in the biological laboratories to continue his research and to write a book on histology. His major research interest has been to relate the activities of tissues with their microscopic structure.

Born in Tryon on Prince Edward Island, Canada, he studied at Prince of Wales College and Acadia University. He received his Ph. D. from Harvard.

He has been president of the American Microscopical Society and treasurer and vice-president of the American Society of Zoologists.

**Develops Mink Feed Ration At Summerside**  
OTTAWA — Cod fish offal has been found to be a good substitute for 60 per cent of the horse meat in mink rations during the growth and furting seasons.

Dr. C. K. Gunn of the Summerside, P. E. I., Dominion Experimental Fur Ranch, made the test with offal after removal of fillets and livers.

Conditions of feeding simulated those at commercial mink ranches. The 72 standard dark mink tested showed no significant difference in body weight gains or fur quality to indicate which mink received the standard ration with horse meat and which the cheaper horse meat and offal ration.
