DAIRY INSPECTION.

The bill before the Legislature gives such large powers to the inspector and instructor that great care and discrimination will need to be exercised in the selection and appointment of the officer. Given the right man, our dairy interests will undoubtedly be promoted by the operation of the bill. But an incompetent man will do more harm than good. We, therefore, hope that a prudent and good man will be selected,—one who will not presume too much upon his powers or make himself offensive to the managers of factories, and yet one who will insist upon the production of a uniform quality and a high standard of excellence in respect to our dairy products.

P. E. ISLAND'S CLAIMS.

The people of this Province are greatly indebted to Messrs. McDonald and Martin for their representation of P. E. Island's claims upon the Government of Canada. The Hon. Donald Ferguson had no sooner obtained a seat in the Senate than he set about enlightening the pure minds of the gentlemen of the Upper Chamber upon this important point, convincing them of the justice of our case; and Messrs. Martin and McDonald have been performing a like service in the House of Commons. We hope that they will be equally successful. An epitome of the argument presented by Mr. Martin a few days ago will be found in another column of this issue of THE EXAMINER. It is so forcible and clear that it cannot fail to have convinced any one who gave it an attentive hearing, that Messrs. Bell and McLellan seem to have thought that it was not necessary to add anything to it, and as to have elicited a word of commendation and encouragement from Sir Louis Davies. It is to be regretted that other, perhaps more important, business prevented every other member of the Government in the House of Commons from remaining to listen to Mr. Martin's argument. But if they should be influenced to perform the measures of justice which Messrs. McDonald and Martin demand we shall excuse them upon that score. In any case, Mr. Martin's latest speech in the House of Commons cannot fail to have a good effect upon Parliament and the country.

GOVERNMENT STOCK FARM.

Since the Liberal Government came in, the reports on all public matters have been short. Members of the Government apparently think that it is not safe to let the people know too much. The report on Public Lands has been whittled down to almost nothing. The report on the Public Accounts has been greatly curtailed. The report of the Government Stock Farm Commissioners is little more than an attenuated list of the few animals on the farm and a bald statement of the accounts showing an expenditure of \$1,566 71 in the past year and a debit balance of \$4,673 44. It appears that there are on the farm six working horses and one colt; thirty-four Shorthorns; twenty-nine Ayrshires, five big pigs and three little ones. The crop last year consisted of 150 tons of hay, 1200 bushels oats, 350 bushels mixed feed, 150

bushels barley, 200 tons of corn, 3000 bushels turnips and 600 bushels mangles. It is stated also that the stock is healthy and in fine condition; and that "a new well, 75 feet deep, was bored near the barn, with pump and windmill attached, which are working well; the water is carried under ground by pipes into the stable; a large tank is kept at all times full of water, as a reserve in case of accident to pumps." The cattle sold during the year brought in \$1,040.00 and the grain \$124.80,—and the amount added to the debt was \$393.92.

In view of the unsatisfactory results and conditions, the people are surely entitled to an explanation and a suggestion as to some way of betterment. But nothing of the kind is vouchsafed. For the distribution throughout the country of twenty-two calves the expense and trouble of maintaining the farm has been incurred and all for \$400 added to the debt. Yet, the commissioners have nothing to say about the matter. There is, apparently, no intention on the part of the Government either to enlarge the usefulness of the farm or to curtail its expense so that ends may meet.

—The old saying about "two winters in one year" is being verified.

—The office of High Commissioner in London cost \$97,700.00 last year and is to cost \$400,000 more next year.

—The cost of the Civil Government last year was \$1,431,991.49; next year, according to the estimates the cost will be \$1,451,475.66—an increase of \$19,484.17. Deplorable news for the taxpayer.

—But, then, there is to be a reduction of \$32,100 in the votes for arts, agriculture and statistics,—less money for the promotion of the interests of our farmers!

—The Administration of Justice cost last year \$795,901.03; next year there is authorized and to be paid for the same service \$818,155.00—an increase of \$22,253.97—all for the Liberal lawyers!

—The cost of the Post Office department last year amounted to \$3,603,411.00; and next year there is to be \$3,604,843—an increase of \$1,432.00,—notwithstanding Mr. Mulock's protestations that expenses would be reduced.

—There was expended in the collection of excise last year, \$451,776.25; and there is to be spent next year the sum of \$462,095.00—an increase of \$10,318.75—this latter is probably on account of the additional tax on tobacco.

—The government of Canada now pay, \$13,313,889.91 as interest etc., on the public debt—\$421,140.04 more than last year! In addition, \$161,243.80 a year are to be paid as charges of management of the debt—an increase of \$8,400. How these dear Liberals are economizing.

—In reply to an enquiry as to the desirability of incorporating in the measure now before the Legislature a prohibition of the export of inferior cheese or butter the Dairy Commissioners telegraphed today to the effect that it was not expedient to enact any such prohibition.

The Finance Minister seems to want to take credit to the Government for the prospect which has given him a surplus in the face of largely increased expenditures. He might, just as reasonably, be asked to take the responsibility for the long hard winter we have had and the north east snowstorm on the 4th of May.

—The Guardian agrees with THE EXAMINER that if it is at all practicable the bridge across the Hillsborough should be opposite the city and not at a distance above; and we agree with the Guardian that the engineers will have to settle the question of practicability. Further we think that no trifling difficulty or expense should deter the government from placing the bridge at the point at which it will do the greatest good to the greatest number for all time to come.

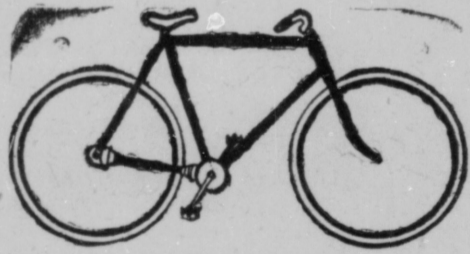
