MARKETS
New York Stocks
 NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week was buffeted by one of the heaviest falls of the year. When selling spent itself, the market steadied and held firmly at the lowest point of the week.
 At the same time, there were indications that a recovery movement had strong backing, especially in the key railroad section. The fall represented a technical correction that so far has not reached major size. Nor are there any present indications, brokers say, that the fall is going to snowball into a break.
 The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined \$2.70 and closed the week at \$134.60. The retreat was equal to that suffered seven weeks ago—heaviest decline of the year.
 The market has been going up steadily for the last 13 months, and such a sustained rise always makes it vulnerable to a technical correction.
 Aside from that, there is nothing in the news to warrant undue bearishness, brokers declare.

RAILS BULLISH
 One of the most bullish factors present now, they find, is the strength in the railroad division. Last week the railroad component of the Associated Press average rose from \$99.60 to \$100.10 while the 60-stock average was falling from \$137.30 to \$134.60.
 The five most active issues on the New York stock exchange were:
 Royal Dutch Petroleum up 3/4 at 67, Tide Water Associated Oil up 1/4 at 27, Gen Martin up 1 at 30 3/4, General Electric off 1 1/2 at 41 1/2 and Texas Instruments up 2 1/2 at 13.
 Canadian stocks closed mostly higher. McIntyre advanced 3/4 Friday, Hiram Walker 3/4, Distillers' Seagram 1/4 and Canadian Pacific and Dome Mines each 1/4. International Nickel was down 1/2.
 Royalite Oil, a Canadian issue on the American stock exchange, was up 1/4 and Lake Shore was off 1/4.

U. S. Steel
 CLEVELAND (AP)—With rising demand for steel boosting the industry's production rate, manufacturers are beginning to extend delivery dates. Steel magazine said today:
 The metalworking weekly, noting that steel producers are still looking for business, said the pickup in demand stems from the resumption of ordering by the automobile industry and by other consumers who have completed inventory reductions.
 One of the industry's chief barometers, the national steel ingot production rate, continues to rise in response to the strengthened demand.
 Steel said that in the week ended Oct. 17, the fifth consecutive week of rise, the rate climbed to 73.5 per cent of rated capacity, an increase of 2.5 points over the preceding week. That makes a total gain of 10 points in the last five weeks, and is only 1.5 points off the year's high point.

British Steel Industry Figures
 LONDON (Reuters) - Britain's steel industry published figures Thursday indicating production this year is likely to set an all-time record.
 Steel output in the first nine months of 1954 was at the record annual rate of 18,320,000 tons, compared with a rate of 17,139,000 tons for the same period last year.
 The statement, issued by the Iron and Steel Board, added: "There is good prospects that the total for the year will reach the 18,500,000 tons which the board indicated in April was a practicable level of production for 1954."
 Last year, British steel production totalled 17,609,000 tons. In 1952 the figure was 16,418,000 tons.

Plan To Widen Membership In Wheat Agreement

 LONDON (CP) - The International Wheat Council Thursday announced plans for a 1955 world wheat conference to widen membership. It approved Italy's application to join the present International Wheat Agreement which expires in July, 1956.
 The International wheat council, voice of the 47-country International Wheat Agreement, concluded a three-day routine private session with a communique covering its survey of the world wheat picture and prospects of a more comprehensive wheat body.
 It has instructed its executive "to begin the preparatory work necessary for an international conference of all interested governments, whether members of the council or not, for a negotiation of the renewal of the agreement."

NOTE LOW HARVESTS
 The 37 delegates on hand, who included George McIvor of Winnipeg, chief commissioner of the Canadian wheat board, also took note of the "decidedly lower harvests this year in North America, particularly in Canada."
 It was the general expectation that the demand for wheat would be at a higher level than in the last crop year, in which about 57 per cent of the import quotas was picked up by the 43 importing countries.
 This would ease surplus problems, but the council "recognized that the available exportable surplus of wheat remain at a very high level and that only a gradual alleviation of the situation can be expected."
 Italy's admission to the IWA will add 3,700,000 bushels to the import quotas, which total roughly 400,000,000 bushels. However, under IWA terms, no importing country has to buy unless the price drops to the IWA minimum of \$1.55 a bushel. Nor do exporting countries have to sell unless the price rises to the maximum \$2.05.

Textile Buyer Gives Views To Tariff Board
 OTTAWA (CP)—A textile buyer for one of Canada's largest clothing manufacturers told the tariff board Tuesday competition today is so severe that anything influencing prices upward in the slightest would have a serious effect on the industry.
 George Allport of Toronto, buyer for Tip Top Tailors, men's clothing manufacturers and retailers, said there is more competition for the consumer dollar than at any time since 1929. To stay in business his firm had to hold price sales, had to cut stand prices on men's suits and had resort to offering credit.
 Mr. Allport was testifying as witness for the clothing manufacturing industry, opposing a tariff by the Canadian wool textile industry for higher tariff protection against competing British textile. The tariff on British wool cloths now is set at a maximum of 50 cents a pound.

SYNTHETICS INCREASING
 Mr. Allport said he believes that increasing use of synthetic fabrics such as dacron, nylon and orlon in the clothing industry has taken a "substantial slice" out of the Canadian wool market.
 In addition to competition among manufacturers, he said, people seemed to be wearing their clothes longer these days and "we are in a squeeze." There was no room for any abnormal profit in the industry.
 If the maximum was removed from the tariff on British textiles, manufacturers' and subsequently retailers' prices would increase.
 Cecil Ushe, Montreal chartered accountant called by the clothing manufacturers, presented figures to the board purporting to show the retail price effect of removing the maximum.

SWITCH FROM WOOLLENS
 He said cloth costing \$3.51 a yard in Britain would eventually cost the purchaser \$1.60 more than present day prices. On British cloth costing \$3.76 a yard the retail suit-price increase would be \$2 while on cloth costing \$4.74 a yard it would be \$3.35.
 He testified that one big Montreal manufacturer of cheap men's clothing had switched in the five years from 1949 to 1954 from complete use of woollen clothing to complete use of synthetic fabrics. He said the annual consumption of cloth would total more than 500,000 yards.
 The special tariff board hearing is expected to conclude this week, with final argument to be set for a later date.

PREDICTS NO TROUBLE
 HONG KONG (AP)—A Canadian general who represents his country on the neutral supervisory commission in Indochina said Wednesday on arrival in Hong Kong he does not anticipate any violation by the former belligerents of the terms laid down at the Geneva conference. Maj. Gen. R. E. A. Morton said the part played by the three commission members—India, Poland, Canada—is one of "merely supervision."
