**BOMB WRECKS SHOP**

PARIS (AP)—A plastic bomb exploded early Thursday in front of a butcher shop which remained open Tuesday during a butchers' strike against government price ceilings. Heavy damage was done to the shop, but no one was hurt. The violence occurred as French voters and the government moved toward a showdown on price ceilings.
