Student Choir To Visit Island

—The members of the Y.P.S. of the Summerside Presbyterian Church have been busy making arrangements for billets for Wednesday night, when the Presbyterian Student Choir will be heard in the church at 8 o'clock. Plans have also been made for a reception in the church hall at the close of the service. Two dozen young men, representatives of Knox College, Toronto, and the Presbyterian College, Montreal, will be guests of the Summerside Presbyterian congregation on Wednesday, May 14, when they will sing in the church.

This is the third annual tour under the direction of Rev. Finlay G. Stewart of Kitchener, Ontario, convener of General Assemblies Committee on Full Time Service. Mr. C. H. Milligan, Mus. Bac., organist of St. Andrews Church, Chawes, is the special lecturer in church music in the two Presbyterian Theological Colleges. This is the first time the choir has come to the Maritimes.

Following directly on the Convocation of Knox College and the Presbyterian College, the choir departed by bus on May 2 for points east, the first stop being in Sherbrooke, Quebec, then to St. Stephen, St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, Saint John, Fredericton, Moncton, Truro, Lunenburg, Halifax, Glace Bay, Sydney Mines, Sydney, New Glasgow, Charlottetown, Summerside, Chatham, Dalhousie, Quebec City, concluding in the Ephraim Scott Church, Montreal on May 19.

The members hail from as far east as Sydney, N.S., and as far west as Taipei, Formosa, and Paingpao, China. Two members who are studying in the Montreal Presbyterian College are from the United States. The three branches of the armed forces are represented, as well as former storekeepers, teachers, farmers, railroad men and steel workers.

In the past two years the choir has sung and preached in small frame school houses in wayside villages and in great stone churches in cities from Sherbrooke to Sarnia. The choir has travelled four thousand miles by bus, meeting boys and girls from kindergarten to entrance class, teenagers from high schools and universities, men and women of all ages; staying in their houses, talking with them of Christ. The response has been so encouraging that the church has planned to send a student choir annually to different sections of Canada. This year it is the Maritimes, the birthplace of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. —S
