S'side Board Discusses Street Mail Delivery

Mr. Fred Bell, the newly elected president of the Summerside Board of Trade presided last evening at the first meeting held since the annual banquet. The main item of business was the ratification of the slate of committees drawn up previous to the regular meeting by the council of the Board. Mr. J. F. Arnett, speaking on the proposed street mail delivery, said that he and the members of the committee had met with Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M. P., who had stated that apparently there was no doubt that the project would go through. In view, however, of the impending change in the number of street deliveries daily all across Canada, which will go into effect in March, the committee was referring the matter back to the Board for their opinion as to whether the street delivery was still desired. The number of deliveries made after the change becomes effective will be the same daily to all houses and two to the business houses. It was the general opinion of the members present that street delivery was still desirable and Mr. Arnett said that this was a progressive step and should be pressed for now, otherwise this Town might never enjoy the service. Mr. Eric MacKay of the Post Office staff informed the meeting that two representatives of the Postal Department from Saint John, N. B., would be in Summerside within the next few days to conduct a survey of the Town in connection with the proposed service. The meeting went on record as still favoring the inauguration of the street delivery mail service. On motion, the president was authorized to attend as the representative of the Summerside Board, a meeting of the Maritime Board to be held in Moncton, N. B., on February 5th.—S

Teacher Shortage In Rural Schools

TORONTO, Feb. 1 — (CP) — Almost 200 one-room schools are closed in Canada because there are no teachers to staff them, the Canadian Education Association reported Wednesday. In 3,900 other rural schools the teacher is not fully qualified for the position, the association announced after completing a national survey. The teacher shortage in urban areas had improved 15 per cent in the last year. Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, the Roman Catholic system in Quebec and Alberta reported no shortage in urban elementary and secondary schools. All four have shortages in rural schools. The C. E. A. estimated the total shortage of teachers in Canada at 3,856. Teachers not fully qualified were counted as vacancies. Newfoundland had most shortages with 1,330 vacancies, the Quebec Catholic system 1,200; New Brunswick 712; Manitoba 687; Saskatchewan 606; Nova Scotia 571; Ontario 308; Alberta 147; Quebec Protestant 144; British Columbia 100 and Prince Edward Island 71. Ontario's shortage is made up of 82 in elementary schools, 23 in secondary schools and 203 in unqualified teachers now teaching in rural schools. The numbers of teachers in training this year is 8,966, compared with 10,971 last year, a drop of almost 20 per cent. Of 193 rural schools closed, 100 are in the Quebec Catholic system. Others are scattered among six of the other nine provinces. None is closed in Ontario, Saskatchewan or British Columbia. The association said Alberta paid its rural teachers a median salary of \$2,187, highest in Canada. The lowest was the Quebec Catholic system, \$900 a year. Figures for Newfoundland were not available. Median rural teachers' salaries in other provinces: Prince Edward Island, \$1,075; Nova Scotia \$1,300; New Brunswick, \$1,275; Quebec Protestant, \$1,200; Ontario \$1,813; Manitoba \$1,600; Saskatchewan \$1,650, and British Columbia, \$1,900.

Typus Epidemic Reported In Korea

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 — (AP) — A typhus epidemic in "serious proportions" has broken out among Communist troops in Korea, an army spokesman said today. No figures were available in reports received here. Allied forces are inoculated against the disease. DARE-SALAAM, Tanganyika, Jan. 31 — (AP) — Man-eating lions have killed six natives within a few days at Songea in the Southern Province of Tanganyika, it was reported today. Last November, a lion credited with 32 victims was trapped.

Teacher Shortage In Rural Schools

TORONTO, Feb. 1 — (CP) — Almost 200 one-room schools are closed in Canada because there are no teachers to staff them, the Canadian Education Association reported Wednesday. In 3,900 other rural schools the teacher is not fully qualified for the position, the association announced after completing a national survey. The teacher shortage in urban areas had improved 15 per cent in the last year. Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, the Roman Catholic system in Quebec and Alberta reported no shortage in urban elementary and secondary schools. All four have shortages in rural schools. The C. E. A. estimated the total shortage of teachers in Canada at 3,856. Teachers not fully qualified were counted as vacancies. Newfoundland had most shortages with 1,330 vacancies, the Quebec Catholic system 1,200; New Brunswick 712; Manitoba 687; Saskatchewan 606; Nova Scotia 571; Ontario 308; Alberta 147; Quebec Protestant 144; British Columbia 100 and Prince Edward Island 71. Ontario's shortage is made up of 82 in elementary schools, 23 in secondary schools and 203 in unqualified teachers now teaching in rural schools. The numbers of teachers in training this year is 8,966, compared with 10,971 last year, a drop of almost 20 per cent. Of 193 rural schools closed, 100 are in the Quebec Catholic system. Others are scattered among six of the other nine provinces. None is closed in Ontario, Saskatchewan or British Columbia. The association said Alberta paid its rural teachers a median salary of \$2,187, highest in Canada. The lowest was the Quebec Catholic system, \$900 a year. Figures for Newfoundland were not available. Median rural teachers' salaries in other provinces: Prince Edward Island, \$1,075; Nova Scotia \$1,300; New Brunswick, \$1,275; Quebec Protestant, \$1,200; Ontario \$1,813; Manitoba \$1,600; Saskatchewan \$1,650, and British Columbia, \$1,900.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 — (AP) — A typhus epidemic in "serious proportions" has broken out among Communist troops in Korea, an army spokesman said today. No figures were available in reports received here. Allied forces are inoculated against the disease. DARE-SALAAM, Tanganyika, Jan. 31 — (AP) — Man-eating lions have killed six natives within a few days at Songea in the Southern Province of Tanganyika, it was reported today. Last November, a lion credited with 32 victims was trapped.
