Confederation Centre Ball Is Last Centennial Event

Tonight's New Year's Eve Ball at the Confederation Centre will be the last event of a successful Centennial Year. The ball will be interrupted shortly after 11 and those present will be asked to go into the theatre where a brief ceremony will mark the closing of Centennial Year 1964.

Among those who will participate in the ceremonies will be Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Premier W. R. Shaw, Mrs. Florence Matheson, Mayor A. W. Gaudet, the official termination of the Centennial Year will be made by Lieutenant Governor W. J. MacDonald. Closing out the ceremonies will be the Town Clerk reading an official proclamation declaring the end of Prince Edward Island's 194th Centennial celebration.

There had been over 500 tickets sold to the Centennial New Year's Eve Dance. Dr. MacKinnon said yesterday, "a year ago the cake was cut to begin the Centennial Year, this dance tonight is not just another dance, this is the final event of a very successful Centennial Year."

The people attending the ball will dance to the music of a six-piece orchestra and be treated to a buffet supper around 12:30 New Year's morning.

RCMP Recover Stolen Vehicle

(Continued from page 1) Party union, objected that the RCMP was trying to screen the information available to the inquiry. This would place Judge Dorion in an impossible situation, since he had been directed by the government to report on the RCMP's handling of the investigation into the bribery allegations.

Judge Dorion took over the questioning and asked Const. Poissant whether he had heard of a bribe offer to Mr. Lamontagne.

Const. Poissant: "Yes, a few days before Aug. 11. One of the members of the drug..."

Judge Dorion: "Don't say who told you. Just say whether it was someone inside or outside the RCMP."

Const. Poissant: "I heard it from someone in the RCMP."

Earlier, lengthy testimony was given by Ronald Crevier, sergeant in charge of the RCMP's Montreal narcotics squad until Oct. 5 when he resigned to join Mr. Lamontagne's law firm as a special investigator.

But Mr. Crevier and Const. Poissant testified that they monitored an Aug. 20 telephone conversation between Mr. Lamontagne and Mr. Denis.

SOUNDING DISCOURAGED
Mr. Crevier said both lawyers sounded discouraged and were afraid that their careers would be jeopardized by the RCMP investigation into Mr. Lamontagne's bribery allegations.

He said Mr. Denis denied repeatedly having offered a \$20,000 bribe to Mr. Lamontagne. Mr. Denis is quoted as saying in French: "Damn it, I should never have gotten mixed up in an affair like this."

Mr. Crevier said Mr. Denis added: "Pierre, you're not mad at me because this affair happened, are you?"

Mr. Lamontagne had replied: "No, we're still friends."

Mr. Crevier said the conversation, which he mentioned at the request of the RCMP and Mr. Lamontagne, then turned to Mr. Lamontagne's fears about potential reprisals against him.

The Montreal lawyer had said he was worried about rumors circulating in legal circles that he had accepted a \$20,000 bribe to help spring Rivard from Bordeaux Jail. Rivard still is in jail awaiting his appeal against a court order extraditing him to the U.S. to stand trial on charges of smuggling heroin for a Mafia-controlled international crime ring.

Mr. Crevier added: "Mr. Lamontagne said Rivard might think he had accepted the money. Unless he was convinced otherwise, Rivard and his gang could decide to get rid of him and he would find himself at the bottom of a river."
