ONE STANDARD ONLY OF CHRISTIAN LIFE

Respect for the sovereign rights of God and obedience to His Law are the necessary foundation of all human happiness. If our religion is to be the basis of our happiness, it must not be a mere sterile speculation about God and our relations with Him. Rather must it be a way of life finding practical application in solving for us the problems of human existence.

The only real Christian is the one who not only believes the truths of the Christian faith but also strives at all times to guide himself by those truths, and lives his whole life in the spirit of that faith. This is what St. Paul meant when he said "Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ." (Romans xiii, 14).

The highest and best in human ideals and in human achievement will always be found to be the result of human faculties developing and working in harmony with the laws of the Creator and in respect for His supreme rights over the world which He has made. In spite of plausible excuses, specious arguments and the seductive appeal of apparent advantages, every principle and action of human conduct that violates the laws of nature, the commandments of God, and the teachings of His divine Son will be found in the end to be grievously detrimental to the interests, both temporal and eternal of mankind.

ONE STANDARD

There is but one standard of life under which individuals, families and nations can lay hold on true peace and happiness; that standard is the eternal law of God. "Place thy treasure in the commandments of the Most High and it shall bring thee more profit than gold." (Eccles. xix, 14).

The moral law is one and unchangeable. Poison is still poi-

son, however attractively colored or deceptively labeled. So too, there are things in the moral order which are fundamentally and intrinsically wrong, things which all the arguments of pseudo science, all the influence of wealth and social position, all the false and shallow notions that are heralded as substitutes for God and conscience, can never change.

Whatever new gospels may be preached by the godless, there is but one standard of Christian life. Its main lines are engraved upon the hearts of us all, and are easily read by any one not blinded in mind and heart to the knowledge and love of God our Creator.

MADE EXPLICIT

That standard is, of course, made explicit in the Ten Commandments of God; it is developed and exemplified for us in the infallible words and works of the Saviour. It is a standard for every Christian civilization: "Heaven and earth shall pass, but my words shall not pass." (Matt. xxiv, 35). It is by Christ's standard we must live, for it is by this same standard with His Divine sanction, that we shall be judged.

It would be false and idle to pretend that the Christian life, lived in accordance with such a standard, is an unbroken path of roses. It does admittedly demand a certain amount of courage, even at times of heroism, if it is to be true to its ideals. But God does not leave us to struggle alone. We have the Christian hope, founded on the infallible promise of God, that Divine grace will second our efforts to keep faith with God in this world and to reach the eternal happiness for which He created us.

This is indeed the victory that overcomes the world — our faith in God for us, who is against us. . . . In all these things we overcome because of

## Quartet Face Revenue Charge

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP) — Four Massachusetts and Rhode Island men pleaded not guilty in U.S. district court today to a charge of conspiring to smuggle Chinese merchandise into the United States from Canada.

They are Leo A. Champagne, 21, Lucien Champagne, 28, Howard Wood, 38, and Clarence K. Burdick 40.

Judge Edward W. Day fixed bail of \$5,000 for each defendant.

The government alleges that the smuggled goods, consisting of assorted foods, medicine and liquors from China, were transported across the boundary without payment of duty Dec. 8, 1956.

U.S. customs officials, when the men were arraigned last December, said the contraband had been shipped from Hong Kong to Vancouver. From there it was driven to the outskirts of Montreal, concealed in hay bales, and taken into the United States.

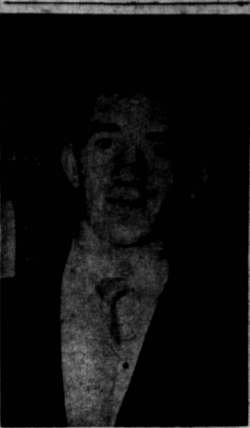

## New Kirk Organ To Be Dedicated Sunday Morning

In a service of solemn joy and gratitude the new organ now installed in the Kirk of St. James will be dedicated Sunday morning at 11 o'clock "to the Glory of God and in grateful tribute to the men and women of this Congregation who throughout the years have served and sacrificed for Christ's Church, and in honoured memory of those who in the armed forces laid down their lives in the service of their country."

The new organ is a magnificent instrument built by the celebrated Canadian firm, Messrs. Casavant Freres of St. Hyacinthe, Quebec. Comprised of 2,256 pipes ranging in size from 16 feet, to 1/4 inch in length, it has two manuals and 32 speaking stops, one of which controls a bank of 86 pipes.

The former chests and pipes were installed in 1886 and had served for the intervening fifty-nine years until their removal last April. The beautifully hand-carved oak screen was taken down for safe-keeping and has been erected again in its original position around the largest pipes in front of the organ chamber in the north wall of its sanctuary. An interesting detail was discovered with the removal of this casing — on the inside wall of the lower section was written the name of "G. W. Kitt" and the date, "August 9th, 1898." Mr. J. L. Curran of Charlottetown, who with Mr. Roland Blanchard of the firm of Casavant Freres has been installing the instrument for the past few weeks, recalls meeting this Mr. Kitt in Woodstock, Ontario, in 1912. Mr. Kitt was then an elderly gentleman and passed away soon afterwards. It is a matter of particular satisfaction that these much cherished casings are still to be used in the new instrument.

The console of the organ has been placed in the chancel near the position of the former console but enabling the organist to have a better view and command of the choir area by this re-arrangement the capacity of the choir seating has been slightly enlarged.

## Value Of Landed Fish Declines

OTTAWA (CP) — The landed value of fish caught in Canada in the first eight months of this year dropped 12 per cent by comparison with the same period of 1956, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

The 1957 value was \$69,300,000, against \$68,400,000.

Weight of the catch dropped by 13 per cent to 1,325,100,000 pounds from 1,519,700,000.

Practically all the major fisheries contributed to the decrease on both coasts.
