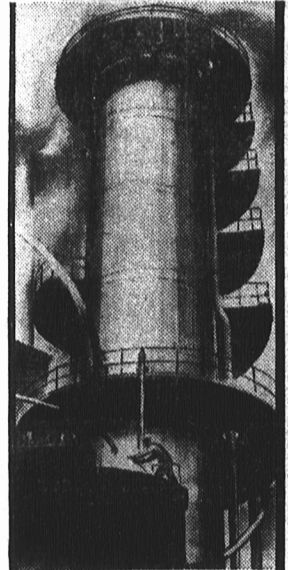

### Few Upsets Second Day, Ascot Meet

ASCOT, England, June 14—(CP-Reuters)—Fashionable Ascot today generally rewarded those who backed the favorites or second choices as the second day's racing took place amid chilly winds and heavy showers with threatening thunderclouds overhead.

While the Hunt Cup, the day's main event, went to a second choice, Sir Abe Bailey's four-year-old Caeloptis, an even-money favorite, Hypnotist, won the King Edward Stakes.

The day's other successful favorites were James Rank's Michoumy, 6 to 5, in the Churchill Stakes, and Lord Glanely's two-year-old colt, Rose of England, backed at 5 to 4 in the Besham Stakes.

But there were disappointments also for the "form players". R. S. Clark's Galatea II, winner of the Classic Oaks Stakes for fillies, was not placed in the Coronation Stakes in which she started at 11 to 8.

Also the neck defeat of the odds-on favorite Pandora, 4 to 9, in the Fernhill Stakes by Lady Beatty's Gold Vista, starting at 10 to 8, was not expected. Gold Vista was ridden by Brownie Canlake, veteran Australian jockey who also rode Michoumy to victory and gained places in two other races.

Sir Abe Bailey's bay colt Caeloptis, best Chris Jarvis' Galsonia, by a length in the prized Hunt Cup race of seven furlongs, 155 yards. The winner started at 100 to 8. Galsonia at 20 to 1, and the Earl of Derby's Greenwith, third by three-quarters of a length, at 25 to 1.

Mrs. A. Bendir's Quarter-Maitre, was fourth and J. A. Swan's Domaha, co-second choice with the winner, ran out of the money.

Tomorrow's card will be headed by the Gold Cup, a 2 1/2-mile endurance test.

### League Leading Reds Rally To Defeat Phillies 10-7; Feller Downs Yanks 4-2

NEW YORK, June 14—(AP)—Rallying three runs in the ninth inning, Cleveland Indians gave Bobby Feller his 10th American League baseball victory of the season 4-2 today after two unearned runs nearly took it away.

The Cleveland youngster gave only two hits until the eighth, when two more singles, a walk, and an error by catcher Rollie Hemsey accounted for New York's runs.

After Cleveland had been given the lead in the fourth on a single and three walks by Monte Pearson, forcing in the runner, Feller passed pinchhitter Charley Keller to open the eighth. Frank Crossetti popped up, Red Rolfe singled Keller to third. Then Tom Henrich lifted a short fly to right field and Bruce Campbell cut off Keller at the plate only to have Hemsey miff the throw. Joe DiMaggio singled Rolfe home.

After the Yankees went to the mound for the ninth and was promptly touched for a single, a walk, a single and a double by Ben Chapman, his third hit of the day to put Cleveland in front again. Murphy was charged with the loss.

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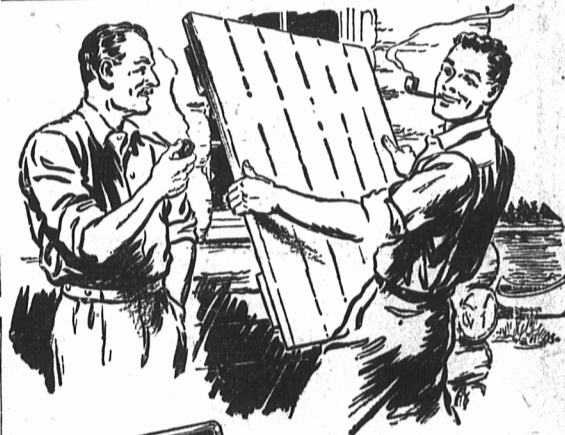
