Traditional Moving Week Finds Conditions Better

Thousands of Canadians will pull up stakes this week and begin the annual spring trek to new homes. May 1 is the traditional moving day for Canadians and a Canadian Press survey shows it is still the favored date for crossing new thresholds in many areas. In Montreal, moving companies have stopped taking orders as more than 150,000 persons, 20 per cent more than last year, have picked today for moving day. Ottawa, Edmonton and Quebec City report May 1 is still the traditional date. Other cities show less reverence for tradition but the easing of winter's grip still makes May the most popular moving month for more practical reasons. New homes should be easier to find this year because of record building in most areas during 1955 and 1956. The move is still generally one to the suburbs as farmlands around large municipalities continue to be subdivided and developed.

Some King's Co. Areas Make Start On The Lobster Season

The weather man proved unkind to the lobster fishermen in Kings County yesterday for the running of lines and setting of traps. With bad sea conditions hampering the herring catch at the Magdalen Islands, some areas suffered a scarcity of bait. Some packers and buyers have been able to procure bait from New Brunswick at a cost of \$9.00 a barrel.
125 boats left Georgetown, Sturgeon, Lower Montague, and Paradise Island areas to run their lines, but few traps were set due to the rough sea and poor visibility. The Sturgeon and Gaspeaux territory will not run their lines till this morning at 6 a.m. There are approximately one hundred boats running from this area.
The Murray Harbour South area fishermen agreed to wait a few days before running their lines and traps due to the unfavorable weather conditions. There no scarcity of bait in the report from this area.
Latest reports from Annandale were that fishermen were successful in running lines but not able to set traps. This area also short of bait.
Most fishermen at Souris and Morell were able to run their lines and succeeded in placing approximately one third of their traps. One small boat arrived in port at Souris yesterday morning with herring from the Magdalen Islands. This was the first this season and more are expected shortly.
Fog and haze cut visibility to some extent in the Kings County areas but there was no snow during the day, although for part of the time a cold rain fell.

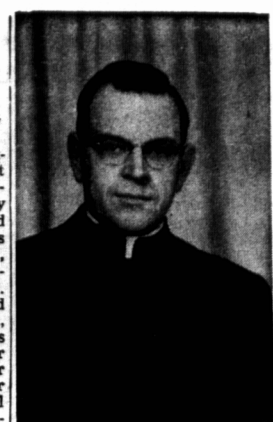
