cattle (more or less) taken per week would not be more than about one eighth or one tenth of the total number passing through the port of Montreal.

The Government control of this business would win for it a status and name in Great Britain at once which private individual or joint stock company could never secure.

The prestige of powerful Government administration, the reputation of the Government in having successfully assisted in putting Canadian cheese and Canadian butter on the British markets in the best way, would vanquish the active hostility of the retail butchers, without any keen commercial struggle involving loss.

The Government would be in a position to select the pick of the cattle at Montreal, and it would effectually prevent any such sentiment being fostered upon the consumers in Great Britain towards the dressed beef trade from Canada as would make them think of it as a "cheap John" affair for the disposal only of the best from the refuse cattle of the country, which were not fit for consumption, or large enough to be shipped alive.

It need not be managed by the Government for longer than one year, when doubtless a joint stock company could be formed to carry it on thereafter.

A similar class of work has already been taken up by the Government, with most beneficial results to the farming community in Great Britain. The work which has been done by the dairying service of the Dominion Department of Agriculture on Prince Edward Island may be cited as an instance in point. In 1892 a joint stock company of farmers erected the building for one dairy station on the island.

The Government loaned the machinery and apparatus to fit up that one factory for the making of cheese. The Dairy Commissioner took charge of the business and manufactured the cheese for the patrons at a charge of two and a half cents per pound.

The revenue from that source nearly met the expenses. Next year—1893—joint stock companies of farmers were erected, fully equipped and fitted up at their own expense eleven dairy stations, and turned over to the farmers. The short summer to the value of \$18,000, a manufacturing charge was made for the making and marketing of the cheese and providing the milk in connection therewith.

The control of these eleven dairy stations was about \$2,500 for the year. (Cheer.)

WORK ALREADY ACCOMPLISHED.—In 1894 there were sixteen cheese factories and two creameries on the island under the charge of the Dairy Commissioner. In every case joint stock companies of farmers provided all the buildings and equipment, with the exception of the apparatus and equipment loaned to the dairy station. In 1894 the value of the cheese and butter made was, in round figures, \$90,000. After the manufacturing charge was deducted the proceeds were paid to the farmers according to the quantity, and at some factories according to the quality, of the milk which they supplied. A sum of \$40,000 was placed in the estimates by the Government and granted by Parliament, to enable the Dairy Commissioner to promote dairying interests by advances.

New York's 1,800,000 people will, this year, have to pay \$14,000,000 to the city.
