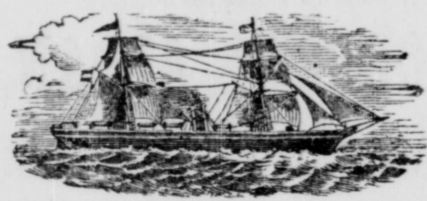

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.—Spain, while not
 entitled to the preferential tariff treatment,
 is to get it, as there is a tacit understand-
 ing that the treaty privileges formerly in
 force are still wending negotiations for a
 special treaty between Canada and Spain.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—The general
 strike of the cloakmakers of this city and
 vicinity, which has been threatened for a
 long time, has been ordered. Henry Fisch-
 er, of the board of walking delegates of the
 Brotherhood of Cloakmakers, announced
 today that the 12,000 cloakmakers in the
 brotherhood will be called out tomorrow.
 More than 5,000 went out this afternoon.

MONTREAL, Aug. 25.—The arrangements
 for the British Medical Association
 meeting here on Tuesday next are almost
 complete and are on an elaborate scale. All
 the delegates have arrived except those on
 the Labrador, Lake Huron and Lucania,
 and are now touring Canada, and a num-
 ber are taking in the British Association at
 Toronto. Many others are taking in differ-
 ent excursions.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—There was a
 pause in the downward movement of wheat
 prices today, and at the best point of the
 session a rise of four cents a bushel from
 yesterday's close, but still 3 1/2c. under the
 highest figure of the year on December.
 Final figures for the day were at 2 1/2 to 3c.
 advance over last night. Total transac-
 tions today were upwards of 14,000,000
 bushels.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 25.—The Czar,
 Czarina, President Faure and their re-
 spective suites witnessed a march past of
 50,000 troops at the Kraeoc Solo camp
 today. The spectacle was most imposing.
 As the imperial guard passed the grand
 stand the Czar cried: "Thank you all
 my men." At the luncheon which fol-
 lowed President Faure toasted the Czar
 and Czarina and the Russian army, to
 which, he added, he brought the greetings
 of his French comrades. The Czar replied
 by toasting: "Our comrades of the
 valiant French army." Both toasts were
 honored standing, and the Marseillaise
 and the Russian hymn were played.

IT LOOKS DANGEROUS.

The Afridis Uprising is Assuming Serious
Proportions.

BOMBAY, Aug. 25—11 p. m.—The latest
 despatches received from the front indicate
 that the situation on the frontier is getting
 worse. It is evident that the Indian
 government must face a grave crisis, in-
 volving heavy expenditures and probably
 great loss of life. The government is
 confronted with the following state of
 affairs:—

Kyber Pass has fallen into the hands of
 the Afridis; the posts in Kurran valley are
 threatened by the powerful tribe of the
 Orakzai; the Mohammedan tribesmen are
 meditating a renewal of hostilities around
 Fort Shadabakar, while thousands of
 troops are engaged in crushing the revolt
 in the Swat Valley, and two large brigades
 are holding the Tochi Valley, where the
 Mawsoof-Mazris are again hostile.

Fort Jamrud is held by a strong force
 of British and native troops, and the Brit-
 ish front extends about 35 miles from
 Sookkadar along the north side of the
 Cabul river and southwards to Peshawar,
 where the troops are massing as the Bazoo
 demonstration against Orakzai, who
 occupy the region south of the Afridis, but
 have not yet assumed the belligerent pro-
 portions of their northern neighbors.
 There is a rising, however, of small parties
 which is proving troublesome near Kohat,
 and it is expected that both tribes will try
 to close the Kohat pass. Numbers of
 tribesmen are moving up toward Khyber
 from Kohat and that district is making the
 salt tariff the pretext for hostilities.

The wildest excitement prevails among
 the Hindoo traders at Bannu, on Kurram
 river. It is rumored that 7,000 intend to
 swoop down on that place tonight, sack
 the town and massacre the inhabitants.
