## Breaks And Vandalism Sparks Reward Offer

A \$50 reward has been offered School Trustees for information by the Charlottetown Board of leading to the conviction of the

person or persons responsible for the recent rash of breaks involving theft and vandalism in city schools. The incidents have occurred mainly on the weekends, with the breaks usually taking place immediately after a week in which a school has collected money from magazine sales, student insurance policies, and so forth. It was reported that the pattern in the breaks is basically the same in all cases. Entry is gained through basement windows, the offices and classrooms are ransacked. Soft drink vending machines are often a target.

**SMALL MINORITY**  
In discussing the problem, Dr. Kenneth Parker, superintendent of city schools, said yesterday that it seems to be the work of a small minority group. "Most adolescents are responsible people," he commented.

He said that the school breaks and vandalism have reached a height this fall, and that it was hoped parents would co-operate with law enforcement officers to attempt to get to the bottom of it.

**IN EXCESS OF \$300**  
The breaking of school windows by the use of B-B guns is raising concern, not only from the point of view of the thoughtlessness it indicates, but for a very practical reason.

The cost of replacing seven windows shattered by B-B's recently at Prince Street School was "in excess of \$300." Dr. Parker said he felt that if the "unfortunate results of this thing" are pointed out to youngsters, the petty crime wave will come to a stop.

**PLANE LANDS SAFELY**  
LONDON (Reuters) — A full emergency was called at London Airport Thursday for a BOAC Vanguard airliner flying from Manchester with 116 passengers on board. But the plane landed safely. The pilot of the flight reported difficulty in raising the nose wheel of the four-engine airliner after takeoff from Manchester. He made the flight with the nose wheel half down and flew over the control tower at London Airport so a check could be made to see whether the wheel was safe for landing.
