THE Summerside Journal says: That very desirable property known as the James C. Pope farm, at Dunk River, was sold at auction by J. Leitch Hunt, Esq., to C. C. Gardiner, Esq., on Tuesday last, for \$2,600.
VENNON predicts as follows: Very severe storms are probable for the Gulf and Lower parts and Newfoundland coast on the 15th, 16th, and 17th, accompanied by sleet, snow and strong north-easterly gales.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 11.
At Newmarket, to-day, the Bedford stakes were won by Lordiard's Touch-me-Not by a length; Crawford's Red Gold second.
The race for the Middle-Park plate was won by Crawford's Macbeth, Ellensure's Highland Chief second, Perkins' Chishurst third.

SINGAPORE, Oct. 11.
The explorer Witt, in the service of the British North Borneo Company, has been murdered by head hunters. The old Dyak custom of collecting human heads has been thought to be dying out.

CAIRO, Oct. 11.
Sir Charles Wilson is satisfied of the impartiality of the judges who are appointed to try the rebel leaders.
According to advices from the interior the British occupation has produced little or no impression. On Saturday night one of the chief Eunuchs of the palace entered the cell of Abdul Gaffor, a political prisoner, roused him from sleep, spat in his face and inflicted other indignities upon him.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.
Henry Ward Beecher formally withdrew from all connection with the New York and Brooklyn Association of Congregational Churches yesterday.
The Australians and American cricketers finished their game yesterday afternoon. The foreigners won with seven wickets to spare. Each team scored 129 runs.

PANAMA, Oct. 11.
An Indian from San Blassa district, in this State, on the Atlantic, brings in a report that on Sept 7th, the day on which the earthquakes occurred here, there were four tidal waves, which overwhelmed and destroyed or badly damaged six or seven little villages on the Island and mainland and drowned about 70 persons.

LIMA, Oct. 11.
The La Patria gives a report of a skirmish at Choisca, 30 miles from Lima, with Montaneros, of whom two officers and 25 men were killed and many wounded.

BOSTON, Oct. 11.
To-day has been observed as a half-holiday in honor of the visit to the city of President Arthur and party. The President, accompanied by Secretaries Lincoln and Chandler of his Cabinet, his son, Chester A. Arthur, jr., Private Secretary Phillips and others, arrived from New York this morning and were received by Gov. Long, Mayor Green, a city committee and military escort and taken to Boston Common.
The procession formed composed the entire State militia, and the Presidential party with other guests and some officials were escorted through the principal streets to Hotel Brunswick, where the procession was reviewed. In the afternoon an informal reception to citizens was held in Faneuil Hall, when the President and Secretaries Chandler and Lincoln briefly returned thanks for their kind reception. Leaving the hall the party were driven about the suburbs by city officials. In the evening an informal reception and banquet were given in their honor at Hotel Brunswick, at which a notable gathering, numbering nearly three thousand, were present during the evening. To-morrow the President and party go to Marshfield to participate in the Webster Memorial celebration.
