OTTAWA, July 7.—Among the Canadians specially decorated in connection with the Diamond Jubilee was Sir Arthur Halliburton, permanent under-secretary for war, who received the G. C. B. Sir Arthur is a native of Nova Scotia.

The Liberal press is taking great liberties with names of Ministers in the Cabinet as to coming Cabinet shuffle. Sir Oliver Mowatt is slated for Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, Sir Richard Cartwright for Finance Minister, Hon. Mr. Fielding for Marine and Fisheries Department and Sir Louis Davies for Justice.

Decrease of Inland Revenue.

ST. JOHN, July 7.—The Inland Revenue receipts for June were but \$7,283 as compared with \$26,237 in the corresponding month of the previous year. Applicants for the position of Post Office Inspector are growing in number every hour and the battle for the position has already become red hot. Those most prominently mentioned are Dr. Colter, ex-M. P. for Carleton, George Haddon, ex-M. P. for Restigouche, W. A. Lockhart, a life-long St. John Liberal auctioneer, T. S. Allen, who opposed Hon. Mr. Foster last election in York County, and S. R. Everett, hardware merchant, of Fredericton. John McMillan, of St. John, is also in the field, and so is W. C. Whitaker, Deputy Post-Office Inspector. Lockhart and Colter are reported to have the best backing.

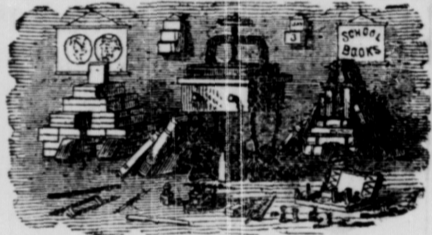

THE PEACE OF EUROPE.

New and Interesting Situation

A SIGNIFICANT HINT TO THE SULTAN.

LONDON, July 7.—In the House of Lords yesterday the Marquis of Salisbury said that the delay in the settlement of peace terms between Turkey and Greece was entirely the fault of the former. There were no delays as far as the powers were concerned, but Turkey had carried deliberation and circum-pection to such an excess that delay was not without danger. He thought that the danger was not immediate. They were at present no nearer to a solution of the question than before. The morning papers comment editorially upon the new danger in the Greco-Turkish situation and the statement of the Marquis of Salisbury is regarded as extremely grave and as a clear intimation of the readiness of Great Britain to join in active coercion of the Sultan.

MARRIED AT VANCOUVER.

An interesting ceremony took place this morning at 8.30 o'clock in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, and which was witnessed by a large number of friends of the contracting parties, when Miss Ethel Jean MacLaren, eldest daughter of W. H. MacLaren, of this city, was united in marriage to Charles Hamilton Macaulay, storekeeper of the Pacific division of the C. P. R., the pastor, Rev. E. D. MacLaren, officiating. Miss Louise M. MacLaren, sister of the bride, acted as bridesmaid, while the best man was George E. Macdonald. The church was handsomely decorated, the work having been carried out by the King's Daughters, of which the bride was a prominent member. The music was of a special nature, and the service was full and solemn. Miss Edwards presided at the organ. After the wedding breakfast the happy couple left on the 9 o'clock train for Seattle, thence they will go to Spokane and Northport, returning by way of the lake steamers to Arrowhead, stopping en route at Nelson, Rossland, and other points. They were bidden farewell by many friends and officials of the C. P. R., who gave them hearty cheers. The numerous handsome presents attest to the esteem and respect in which Mr. and Mrs. Macaulay are held.—Tancoiler World.
