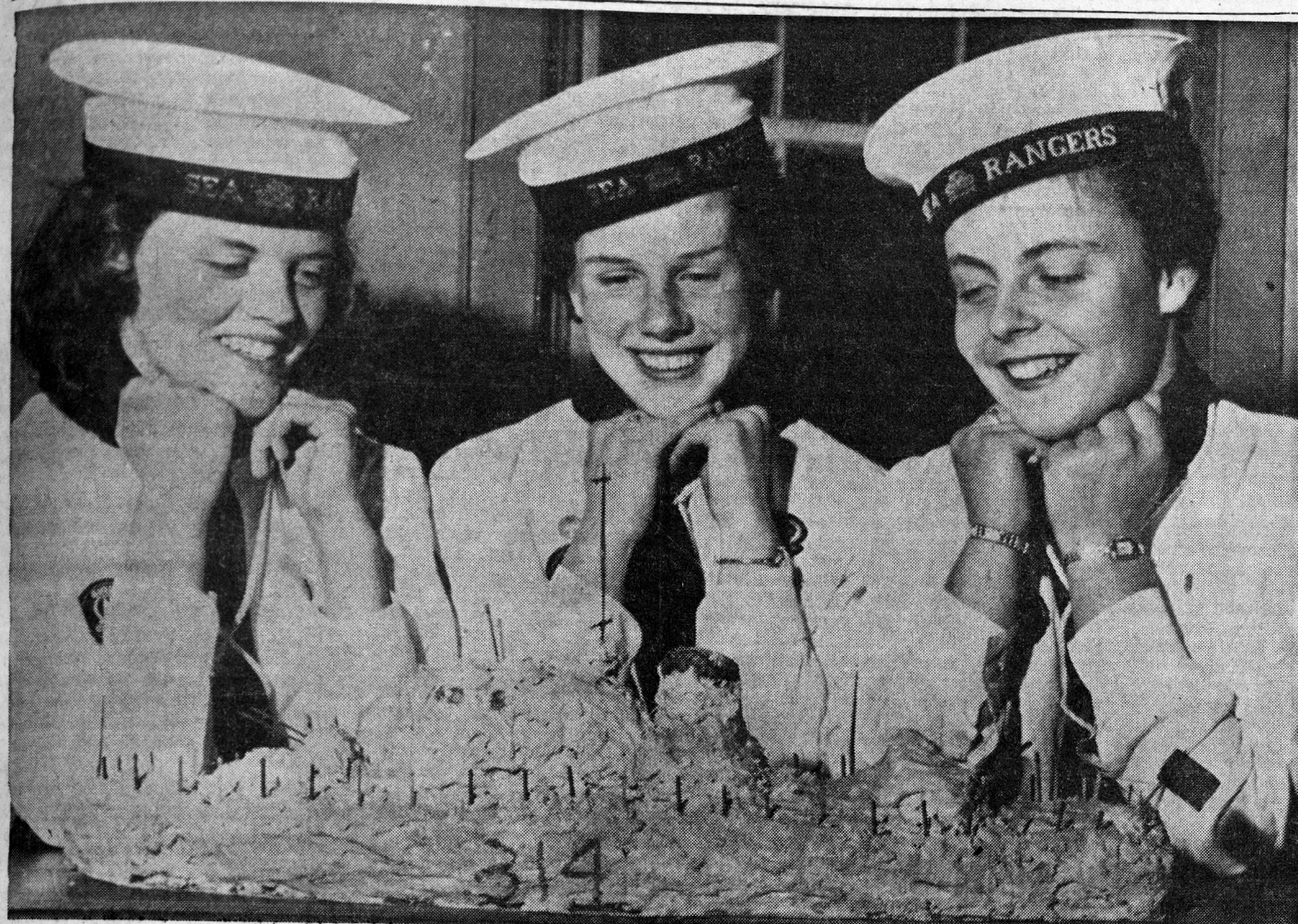

See Atomic Power Aim Reached

CHALK RIVER, Ont. (CP) — Canada's top nuclear scientist has expressed renewed confidence that the Chalk River, Ont., atomic project has reached a point where it can design an atomic power plant which will produce electricity as cheaply as coal-burning stations.

"We feel we have reached an objective of years of research and can now design a nuclear power plant to generate electric power at six mills a kilowatt hour," Dr. W. B. Lewis, vice-president of Atomic Energy of Canada Limited said in a statement. However, it might take up to five years to solve all technological problems.

Dr. Lewis, in charge of basic research at this atomic establishment, said the Canadian objective is to produce electricity by atomic means at considerably less than six mills.
