HONORS TO O'REILLY.

The memorial to John Boyle O'Reilly was dedicated with impressive ceremony at the Back Bay Park, Boston, on Saturday afternoon last. The exercises began at 2 o'clock and included a public oration by the 150 singers of the St. Cecilia and Apollo societies, together with 50 members of the Boston symphony orchestra, and speeches by A. S. Shuman, chairman of the monument committee, Gen. Francis A. Walker, president of the day; Hon. Thomas J. Gagan, Mayor Quincy, Rev. Dr. Elmer H. Casan and Vice-President Stevenson. A feature of the occasion was the presentation of a letter from the Rev. Mr. O'Reilly, widow of the poet and her four daughters, one of whom unveiled the memorial.
