Saint John Beavers In 7-3 Victory Over Hawks; Rousing Third Period

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 11—(CP)—Third place Saint John Beavers outscored Moncton Hawks 5-2 in a rousing third period tonight and increased their lead over the tail-end Hawks to 15 points by winning the Maritime Senior Hockey League fixture 7-3.

Both Nick Nicolle and Paul Platz shot a brace for Beavers, Larry Blackburn, Buck Whitlock and Tommy Brennan netting the other Saint John tallies. Gordie Miller fired two for Moncton and Rod McKenzie counted once.

The first two periods were raged and dull but the last was a rip-roarer. Both teams gained a goal in the opening frame and Saint John made it 2-1 before the middle session ended.

Niccole opened the scoring while Hawk Gus Galipeau, who received the only penalty of the first period, sat in the box. Brennan passed to Nicolle through the Moncton defence. McKenzie tied it up after Beavers lost the puck in front of their own goal. Rod snatched the disc and scored from a scramble. Miller was officially credited with an assist. Shots on goal were about even during the stanza. Dennis Brodeur, of Beavers, stopped seven and Les Colvin made eight saves.

The lone goal of the second period came while Moncton was short two men and Saint John one. Blackburn put Beavers ahead 2-1 with a 30-foot slap shot after taking a pass from Brennan. Each goalie made the same number of stops, six, in this session.

Hawks came out of a defensive shell in the final period and really tried for goals. The result was that they were outskated and



Charles 1 To 5 Favorite To Retain Title In Bout With Lee Oma Tonight

NEW YORK, Jan. 11—(AP)—Ezzard Charles, improving with every start, rules a solid 1 to 5 choice to whip tricky Lee Oma tomorrow night at Madison Square Garden in the sixth defence of his world heavyweight title.

The champion, sharp and ready at 184 pounds, hopes to unhinge the clownish Oma within the 15-round limit, perhaps around the eighth. The scant betting centres around Lee's chances of going the route. It's about 9 to 5 he won't.

New-found respect for 29-year-old Charles after his victory over Joe Louis is reflected at the gate. It won't be a sellout but the International Boxing Club expects about 12,000 fans and \$65,000. Ring time is 10 p.m. EST.

Styles make the bout interesting. Oma, a master of confusion, is hard to catch. Sometimes he walks away, drops both hands, and turns his back. He is a master at slipping and catching punches and a pretty fair right-hand puncher.

The reform angle is stressed heavily in Oma's story. Spotty is a polite way of describing his past record that shows at least 91 official fights. When in shape, he whipped some of the best around. Currently he ranks No. 4 among heavyweight contenders although he'll be 35 years old in March.

Oma lost only one of his last 16 fights. That was a knockout by Bob Satterfield which he later reversed with a decision Sept. 25 in his last fight. He'll weigh about 192 for this one and has been working hard in training camp.

Charles is ahead of Louis' record for defences by some three months. Since he beat Jersey Joe Walcott June 22, 1949, to win the title, he has knocked out every opponent—except Louis.

A sharp puncher with either hand and a smart boxer who always is in good condition, Charles doesn't figure to be bothered by Oma's style. He did a good job on Walcott who uses much the same tactics.

For the record, here's how the fighters shape up on past performances.

Charles: Fights 75; won 69; k.o.s. 44; losses 5; draws 1.

Oma: Fights 91; won 62; k.o.s. 28; losses 26; draws 3.

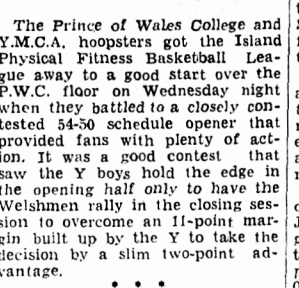
If Charles gets past Oma, he'll probably defend against Walcott in Miami, Feb. 26 although details have not been worked out.

Canadiens Score 4-1 Victory Over Chicago To Take Over Third Place

FORUM, Montreal, Jan. 11—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens, with Maurice Richard again on the prowl, handed Chicago Black Hawks a 4-1 defeat tonight and took over third place in the National Hockey League standing.

A crowd of 14,042 saw Richard fire two goals to bring his season's total to 26. He also had an assist. Glen Harmon and Elmer Lach were the other scorers for the Montrealers.

The Hawks' lone goal came early in the third period when Roy Conacher tipped the puck past Gerry McNeil. Jim Conacher and Bep Guidolin supplied the passes for a perfect set up.

The game dragged in spots but was lively enough in others. Two fist fights, starring Bill Mosienko and Calum MacKay in the opener, and Hugh Coffin and Butch Bouchard in the closing piece, brought four major penalties.

Canadiens had a good margin on the play and a wide margin in shots on goal, 34 to 21.

After a scoreless first period Harmon sent Canadiens in front at 5:45 of the second period, letting drive from a power play with a partly screened shot. Lach added his on a play started by Richard with a perfect passout by Bert Olmstead.

Roy Conacher's goal cut the lead in the final period but Richard sent the home crowd into raptures with a backhander as he reached the Chicago defence and goalie Harry Lumley looked none too good on the drive.

The Hawks were making a last desperate bid in the final minute when Richard took Olmstead's pass and fired from an angle, the puck barely catching the net. The Hawks put up a mild protest that the puck didn't enter the cage.

Spectators at the game included coach Lynn Patrick and his Boston Bruins who were displaced from third spot tonight—while the Hawks remained at the bottom with a streak of 10 losses and two ties in their last dozen games. Bruins and Canadiens meet here Saturday night.
