

Italian Scandal Probe Lays Charge Against Three

ROME (AP) — Italian courts ended a 16-month probe of the Wilma Montesi scandal Wednesday and ordered three men to stand trial on manslaughter charges.

Also ordered to trial with the 30-year-old son of ex-foreign minister Attilio Montesi, playboy Ugo Montesi and former police chief Javerio Polito.

Young Piccioni is accused of contributing to the death of Wilma Montesi, 20-year-old beauty from Montesi, on April 10, 1953, by abandoning her, believing her already dead, on the edge of the sea.

Montesi and Polito face charges of "favoreggiamento," or aiding and abetting a crime by trying to help Piccioni escape prosecution.

FOUND ON BEACH
The final order was handed down by Raffaele Sepe, a Roman magistrate who began investigating the lurid affair in March, 1954. His 419-page report traced the case from its quiet start when Wilma's shapely body was found on the beach at Torvajana, near Rome.

FEARED FOR LIFE
Muto's trial suddenly ended. The cause was Anna Maria Caglio's charge that she feared for her life. That Montesi was the "brains" of a dope ring and that Piccioni was the "assassin."

Sepe took over then.

Last September he got authorities first to withdraw Piccioni's, Montesi's and Polito's passports, and then to arrest Piccioni and Montesi. The 57-year-old Polito was allowed to remain free because of his age.

A few days prior to young Piccioni's arrest, his father quit as foreign minister to defend his son from "calumny." Late in November Piccioni and Montesi were released pending the finish of "the probe."

The government of Mario Scelba, who then was premier, faced a political storm over the case. Communists demanded that Scelba resign because officers responsible to him had tried to hush up the scandal.

Seelba asked for and won votes of confidence in the Chamber and Senate on the issue.

Acadians Celebrate 1755 At Rustico Meet

Historic St. Augustine's Church at South Rustico, the oldest Roman Catholic Church in Prince Edward Island, was the centre of a mammoth celebration yesterday as a huge throng took part in the Acadian Bicentennial celebrations.

Pontifical High Mass was celebrated in the church in the morning by Most Reverend Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown. In the afternoon the overflow crowd assembled on the grounds in the field for the official opening and entertainments. During the evening they lined the highways and the church grounds to watch a colorful float parade and pageant followed by day-ending display of fireworks.

Representatives of both the French and English races took advantage of the fine weather to be present in large numbers. They came from as far away as Quebec and New Jersey and there were crowds on hand from numerous districts in this Province.

Assisting His Excellency Bishop MacEachern at Pontifical High Mass were Rev. Arthur Gallant, C.M.M., Bate Comeau, Quebec, as High Priest; Rev. Theodore Gallant, C.S.C., president of St. Joseph's University as Deacon of Honor; and Rev. Henri Cormier, C.J.M., president of Sacred Heart College, Bathurst, as Subdeacon of Honor.

Rev. Patrick Gallant of Rimouski was Deacon of Office and Rev. Joseph LeBlond of Summerside was Subdeacon of Office.

The master of ceremonies was Rev. P. F. MacDonell, Charlottetown, while the second master of ceremonies was Rev. Charles Gallant. Rev. Emmanuel Richard was Thurifer while the acolytes were Rev. Nazaire Gallant and Rev. Arsene Richard, C.S.C.

An eloquent sermon was preached by Most Reverend Norbert Robichaud, Archbishop of Montreal.

Mr. J. Edmund Arsenault, president of the Acadian Society of Prince Edward Island, presided over the official opening. He introduced Rev. Clarence Pitre, parish priest at South Rustico who welcomed the visiting dignitaries of church and state and the numerous visitors. Father Pitre stated that the celebrations commemorated 200 years of God's protection of the Acadian people and also served as a rededication "of ourselves to God and country."

In his remarks Mr. Arsenault stated: "We are proud of our ancestors because they have given us our faith and customs." He pointed out that there are over 1,000,000 Acadians in America and over 300,000 of them are in the Maritimes.

He stated the celebrations were a chance for the people to offer thanks to God and to Our Lady

of the Assumption. He also extended a welcome to the church dignitaries, to the Premier and to the French Ambassador, Mr. Hubert Guerin.

An address of welcome from the South Rustico people was read to Bishop MacEachern on the occasion of his first visit to the parish. The address was read by Mr. Edward Blanchard, Bishop MacEachern, speaking in both French and English, noted that the French people were making tremendous strides in commerce and science and he urged the progress would help them preserve the French language. He urged the people to speak French in the home recalling that Napoleon had once stated "The man who speaks two languages is worth two men."

Most Reverend Gerald D. Barry, Archbishop of Halifax, stated he was happy to take part in a celebration of this kind. He congratulated the people for putting on such a display and noted: "It's a great day for the Acadians and may it be a happy harbinger of the years to come."

Premier A. W. Matheson stated that Bishop MacEachern's words were very close to him "because he tells you the language you speak around your neck and in the world."

He offered the gathering his heartfelt congratulations for remembering the early pioneers. He told the Acadians they deserved a great deal of credit for the position they had obtained in a great many fields and reminding his audience that "we are all living in a great country and we must work together to make our country one of the greatest in the world."

Mr. Hubert Guerin, French Ambassador to Canada, stated he was very grateful when Mayor J. David Stewart extended him an invitation to visit Charlottetown and he arranged his visit to coincide with the Acadian Bicentennial celebration.

He stated that he wished to pay a very warm tribute to Premier Matheson and Prince Edward Island for the very warm welcome that had been accorded to him and expressed the hope that God would bless this Province, its people and this country.

Mr. Alderic Melanson, Moderator of the Assumption Society, also spoke at the official opening. Following the opening the students at Rustico convent entertained the crowd by square dancing and the Miscouche Band offered several selections.

Later in the afternoon Judge J. Sylvere DesRoches presided over another meeting. The principal speakers were His Worship Mayor Adelard Savoie, General Organizer of the Acadian Bicentennial; Mr. Martin Legere, manager of the Federation of Acadian Credit Unions of New Brunswick; and Mr. Armand Arsenault of St.

Chrysostome and Charlottetown.

Archbishop Norbert Robichaud of Montreal, Mr. Euclid Arsenault and Mr. Martin Gallant spoke at a third meeting.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given in the church at six o'clock by Archbishop Norbert Robichaud. He was assisted by Rev. Joseph LeBlond of Summerside as Deacon and Rev. John Buote as Sub-deacon.

Father Barriau was master of ceremonies and Rev. Charles Gallant, Thurifer. Rev. Sylvere Gallant was in charge of the choir for both Mass and Benediction and the capable organist was Mr. Edward Blanchard.

The parade of floats was held after Benediction. Led by men on horseback and a band, the floats depicted events from the earlier days. They were colorful, original and well designed, and they drew the favorable comments of the large crowd.

The first float was Our Lady of the Assumption with the Blessed Virgin's part being taken by Cecile Buote. Next came a float depicting the late Father Belcourt's car. Father Belcourt, a parish priest at South Rustico 100 years ago, built the first car ever to operate under its own power.

There was another float of Gabriel and an Evangeline. Another showed Mother Bourgeois, founder of a religious order of nuns. The first settlers in Rustico were shown in another float while there was a group square-dancing in a sixth float, and lastly came the comic float.

A patriotic pageant in front of the Church Hall followed by a great display of fireworks ended the day's celebrations.

Throughout the afternoon and evening meals were served on the grounds. There were entertainments and refreshment booths throughout the nearby field and they were well patronized.

Former Islander To High U. S. Army Position

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Department of Defense has announced that Captain William M. Silliphant, Medical Corps, United States Navy, has been appointed The Director, Armed Forces Institute of Pathology.

The 54-year-old veteran Navy pathologist succeeds Brigadier General Elbert DeCoursey, MC, USA, whose tour of duty ends on August 1. General DeCoursey will become Commandant of the Medical Field Service School at Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio, Texas.

Captain Silliphant, Deputy Director of the AFIP since February 1952, was nominated for his new post by the Board of Governors of the AFIP, composed of the Surgeons General of the Army, Navy, and Air Force. This assignment is normally for four years and rotates in order among the Army, Navy, and Air Force.

The Armed Forces Institute of Pathology serves as the central laboratory of pathology for all the Armed Services, the Veterans Administration, and on a voluntary basis for the United States Public Health Service, the Atomic Energy Commission, and other Federal medical agencies.

FORMER ISLANDER
Captain Silliphant, who was formerly a resident of Hunter River, has been appointed The Director, Armed Forces Institute of Pathology.

Captain Silliphant received his early education at Prince of Wales College and for some years taught school in Prince Edward Island.

He emigrated to the United States in the early 20's and continued his education here.

Captain Silliphant's two sisters are residents of Prince Edward Island. Mrs. J. W. Paterson lives in Hunter River and Mrs. Sherman MacDuff in Brookfield.

Captain Silliphant received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Southern California in 1928 and his medical degree from Stanford University Medical School in 1931. He was commissioned in the Medical Corps of the Navy in 1930 and interned at the U.S. Naval Hospital, Mare Island, California.

SERVED IN HAWAII
At the termination of his first sea duty with the Pacific Fleet in 1933 he began postgraduate study in pathology at the Naval Medical School, Washington, D. C. Since then he has served as pathologist and Laboratory Officer at various Naval Hospitals, both in continental United States and overseas. From 1937-40, while stationed at the Naval Hospital, Pearl Harbour, he served concurrently as pathologist to the Kapiolani Maternity Hospital in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Assigned to the Naval Hospital, Cebu, Philippine Islands, one month before the Japanese began their conquest of these islands, he was captured and interned by the Japanese for 37 months. On the staff of Bilbil Prison Hospital for Allied Prisoners of War, he served simultaneously as ward medical officer, sanitation officer, and laboratory officer. Deprived of supplies and material with which to work he claims the distinction of probably being the only pathologist ever to have run a laboratory without the aid of a microscope, or to have resorted to burying vaccines in the ground for their preservation in lieu of refrigeration.

Theodore Gallant, C.S.C., president of St. Joseph's University as Deacon of Honor; and Rev. Henri Cormier, C.J.M., president of Sacred Heart College, Bathurst, as Subdeacon of Honor.

Rev. Patrick Gallant of Rimouski was Deacon of Office and Rev. Joseph LeBlond of Summerside was Subdeacon of Office.

The master of ceremonies was Rev. P. F. MacDonell, Charlottetown, while the second master of ceremonies was Rev. Charles Gallant. Rev. Emmanuel Richard was Thurifer while the acolytes were Rev. Nazaire Gallant and Rev. Arsene Richard, C.S.C.
