



### DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The regrettable news of the death of the Free-For-All pacer Little Brown G. 2:06 3/5, has been the subject of a great deal of talk at the Charlottetown track since the happening a few days ago. Little Brown G. was a starter with Peach Butter, Crusader Chief, Jennie Lyn, Ridge-wood Grattan and Vella La Vella in a featured Free-For-All at the Cape Breton Sports Centre Friday night, June 28th. A great deal of interest was taken in this race which brought together some of the fastest pacers in the Maritime Provinces. An accident occurred as the six free-for-alls were going under the starting wire. Peach Butter was the pole and was out in front with several horses, including Little Brown G., bunched in the centre. Just as they crossed the starting line the mishap occurred. Three sulkeys appeared to jam and driver Howard Hastings was thrown to the track. Little Brown G. raced away dragging half a sulky.

Driver Hastings was quickly removed from the track by fans who witnessed the occurrence. Presiding Judge Ken MacDougall advised the 2,500 fans present that driver Hastings was conscious. He was taken to hospital where a fracture of the neck was found to be a broken collar bone and severe contusions. Little Brown G. was thought to be almost unhurt but not so. He received internal injuries from which he died, as mentioned above. The death of this horse is a great loss to the racing world. The world's record and his dam's was Single Stine 2:00 by Single G. 1:58 1/2. He was campaigned with great success by Joe O'Brien and because of his good past performances was sold for a long price at the Harrisburg sale last November to Harry Hirsch of Sydney, N. S. He won his previous starts at Sydney with one of them in 2:11 2/5 and looked to be ready to meet all comers this season. About a week or more prior to the accident he had been sold to R. J. "Dick" Logue of Sydney for a reputed price of \$5,000. All horsemen will sympathize with Mr. Logue in this very unfortunate happening.

Both dashes in that Free-For-All were won by Mr. Hirsch's newly acquired Peach Butter 2:10 with Crusader Chief 2 and Jennie Lyn 3 in the first dash, and Vella La Vella 2 and Redwood Grattan 3 in the second dash, stepped in 2:09 4/5—a new record for Peach Butter and the fastest mile paced in Cape Breton this season. The ex-Ontario trotter Prairie Pet was the winner from a good field of trotters in 2:14 1/5, which equalled his record. He is owned and driven by R. Andrews of Port Morien. The pacer Lee Hy 2:10 2/5, brought down from Ontario by the North End Driving Club a couple of months ago, and driven by Harry Hastings in the second race that evening, won in 2:15 4/5.

Glancing over the Truro summaries of last Saturday and Monday we notice that Polly Scott won the second race for owner E. Haley, Antigonish. If we remember correctly she was bred by D. J. Riley of Belle River and is by "Bellini" Scott 2:09 1/4. Harley Harrison won the 8th dash with Fingo's Girl in 2:20. She is owned by F. W. Barry, Cape Tormentine. For wearing qualities it would be difficult to find one like Hanover Courier that won the 7th dash from Flora Direct, Billy Aubrey, Scotty Budlong and others. He is owned and driven by H. H. Allen of Halifax. This horse started racing in 1933 and must be over twenty years old and is still good enough to reach the wire first in 2:20. The previous dash fifteen-year-old Flora Direct headed the same field in 2:19 1/5. She is owned and driven by H. C. Boutillier of Halifax.

Monday at Truro one of the biggest surprises on the card—at least to horsemen here—was the winning of the 2nd race by Lusty's Queen 2:16 in 2:14 3/5. This mare took a record of 2:18 3/5 at Covehead last season and many thought that would be her final but, trained and driven by Lloyd Walker for owners Kaiser & Nicholson of Halifax, she is now considered one of the top slow class trotters in the Maritime Provinces. She is by Charlie Chandler's former splendidly bred stallion Lusty Frisco 2:07 1/4. Joey Harvester after a slow start was out in front at the finish in the 3rd race and lowered his mark to 2:13, and he was also won the 8th race. He was driven by Johnny Conroy, who is piling up a lot of points and Joey is owned by Lahey & McNeill. Other winners include Hedgewood Chief, 2:06 2/5, owned and driven by Heber Sweeney, winner of the 6th race; Victory Dale, 2:05 3/5, owned by B. C. Cruickshank and driven by B. Cruickshank, Alice T. Clegg, owned and driven by B. A. Taylor of Aylesford, winner of the 7th race in which she trotted her record from 2:15 to 2:15; the record from Friar, owned and driven by J. E. Given of Halifax, winner of the 9th race. Chief A. C. 2:10 3/5, owned and driven by F. G. Daniels, winner of the 5th race in 2:14 2/5. This is the International ice pacing championship at Moncton last winter, and Henry Day 2:21 2/5, owned by B. Mitton of Moncton and driven by C. MacLeod, winner of the 1st and 4th dashes.

A very large holiday crowd turned out in perfect racing weather to witness the \$1,000 Miramichi Stake, feature of the racing card at Chatham, July 2nd. There were nine starters. The race was won by Joe Eves, owned by James Watt of Chandler, Que., and driven by Wib Jandine. The third heat was won by Surprise Lady (Shirley) owned by W. J. Jandine, and driven by M. MacArthur at 2:20 and Silver Ash (Irving) 2:21 2/5. No. 3 Classified, Craigelea Harvester (Queen) won the

first heat in 2:23 2/5, and Ruth Direct (Wood) the second in 2:22 2/5. The Free-For-All was won in straight heats by Abbe-land, owned by James Watt and driven by W. Jandine, with Johnny Dale (Irving) 2:23, best time 2:15 3/5.

The largest crowd of the season attended the races at Moncton Raceway on Monday. Time Table (Cormier) won the Free-For-All, purse \$675 in three straight heats, 2:11. Junior Hal (Whalen) won No. 1 Classified with 4-1-1, Polly Reynolds (Cormier) 1-2-2, Senator Craigmyle (Ramsey) 2-3-3, best time 2:13 1/5 by Junior Hal. No. 2 Classified was won by Abbe's Boy (Horseman) 5-1-2, 1-2-1, Dizzie Dean (London) 5-1-2, Norah Dale (Cormier) 3-4-6, four other starters, best time 2:16 2/5 by Dizzie Dean. No. 3 Classified was won by Omar Lee (Cormier) with 7-1-1. Playaway (Cormier) 1-5-2, best time 2:17 1/5 by Playaway.

Our good friend James L. Reed of Truro, sent us a marked score card of Monday's events there with some observations such as: "Henry Day, good size, good gaited and well mannered. Looks as if he would make a good trotter. . . Cumberland Scott went a good race with good finish. . . Lusty's Queen a lovely trotter, won her first dash easily. . . Joey Harvester, a real nice pacer. Will likely get very low mark before season ends. . . Thanks, Jim, for remembering us."

Joe O'Brien's stable did not make as brilliant a start as some of the others this season but now it is coming into its own with a very important win at Roseville Raceway. On June 20th the two-year-old Nonian Chief by Chief Abbedale, dam, Silver Queen, was third in the Village Farm Stake for two-year-old pacers, second division, purse \$5,000, time, 2:07 2/5. Place winners of the first and second divisions raced at Roseville on July 1st. Joe O'Brien drove Nonian Chief to a win in 2:07 1/5. The same night he won the 6th race, purse \$2,000 with the three-year-old trotter Mahlon Hanover in 2:06, heading such stars as Percy Hanover, Matlinner, Prince Colby and Estey Volo, showing that he is going to be a big factor in the \$72,000 Hambletonian to be raced at Goshen, N. Y. later on.

### Keen Competition At Firemen's Tournament Held Here Yesterday

Fire department teams from Dalhousie, N. B., Dartmouth, N. S. and Charlottetown all came through with their fair share of laurels at the Maritime Annual Firemen's Tournament held at the Exhibition Grounds yesterday morning.

Competing against one another in firefighting and athletic competitions all three divisions displayed an exceptionally friendly rivalry in a keenly contested program of events. Charlottetown captured firsts in two of the leading firefighting contests, the ladder race and the hose coupling race, another first in the hose replacement race, a second in the hose reel event and third in the ladder race.

Dartmouth won second honors in the ladder race, took both second and third positions in the hose replacement competition and another third in the hose reel event. Charlottetown cornered the market in athletic events, taking first in the half-mile relay and first and third in the 100 yard dash. In the dash event Bill Ledwell of the City, won in the time of 11 4-5 seconds and a special prize donated by Crockett's Jewellery, a combination cigarette case and lighter, Bud Eslinger of Dalhousie placed second and John MacAulay of Charlottetown third. Dartmouth placed second in the relay and Dalhousie third. The local team's winning time for the event was 1:55 1-5.

Charlottetown and Dartmouth staged a close battle in the ladder race that caused plenty of excitement for the spectators. Both tied for first place with a time of 11 2-5 seconds and had to compete in a run-off that saw the local take the event in the fast time of 11 seconds flat. They needed it, however, to win out over the Nova Scotia team who made their second run in 11 1-5 seconds.

Competing with a short-handed crew of only seven men in the hose reel race, Dalhousie made an excellent showing to place second to Charlottetown with a time of 48 1-5 seconds. Ten men are allowed to be used in the hose reel event, but three of Dalhousie's team had to return on Thursday when the event was postponed on account of rain. The City team's time was 39 1-5 seconds and Dartmouth, who placed third, had a time of 49 4-5 seconds.

Although there was no special award for the team with the highest team total, Dalhousie led the way with 17 in the firefighting contests, Charlottetown second with 10 and Dartmouth third with 9. Including the sporting events, Charlottetown and Dalhousie tied with 21 points each and Dartmouth next with 12.

The tournament was very well conducted by the presiding officials who ran the events of smoothly and efficiently. They were as follows:—Judges—Art Henry, Louis Stewart, Rankin McInnes, Dave Bethune; Starter—George Walters; Timers—Bill Bevans, Gordon Bennett, Stan Matheson and Art Campbell; Referee-in-Chief—Neil Matheson, Announcer—Fred Smith; Official Scorer—T.
