After hearing the evidence of two witnesses, His Honor dismissed the case with costs.

TO REFORM MEN.—The Women's Christian Association of the United States, in convention at Cleveland, Ohio, recently passed a resolution in relation to the reform of men. Social parties will be large, and the intention to establish an equal standard of purity for men and women. Men known to be profane are to be worked against if they seek public honors, and will not be recognized in society. The drink habit is to be considered scientifically. Physical culture, narcotics and cigarettes will also be carefully considered.
