

Review Is Given Of Outcome In Inter-Racial Slaying Cases

Several inter-racial homicides, some of them directly linked to racial demonstrations, have reached the trial stage in the southern United States in the last decade. Among them were:

Sept. 1, 1955—Emmett Till, 14-year-old Chicago Negro, was seized from a relative's home in LeFlore County, Miss., and slain. Two white men were tried and acquitted in a case that evoked civil rights demonstrations.

April 19, 1962—Leslie Lee Lutes, 16, white, was shot to death during racial troubles in Augusta, Ga. six Negro youths were convicted and sentenced to prison for terms ranging up to life.

March 23, 1963—Mrs. Johnnie Mae Chappel, 35, Negro, was shot and killed in Jacksonville, Fla., during racial demonstrations. A white man, J. W. Rich, 22, was sentenced to 10 years for manslaughter, and charges against three other men were dropped.

June 12, 1963—Medger W. Evers, 36, Negro, field secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Mississippi, was killed from ambush at his home in Jackson, Miss. A white man, Byron de la Beckwith, was charged but two trials ended with hung juries.

Sept. 15, 1963—Virgil Ware, 13, Negro, was shot to death in the riotous aftermath of a Negro church bombing that killed four girls in Birmingham, Ala. Two white youths

were convicted of second-degree manslaughter, and were released on probation.

July 11, 1964—Army Lt.-Col. Lemuel B. Penn, Negro, of Washington, was killed by shots from a passing car while driving near Colbert, Ga. Three Ku Klux klanmen were indicted; two were acquitted and the third not tried.

March 23, 1965—Viola Gregg Luizzo, 39, white, of Detroit, was killed while ferrying Negro demonstrators back to Selma, Ala., after a march to Birmingham. Three men were charged with killing Mrs. Luizzo, but only one has come to trial and that case ended in a hung jury.

Aug. 26, 1965—Johnathan M. Daniels, 27, an Episcopal (Anglican) seminary student from Keene, N.H., was shot to death in Hayneville, Ala. A Roman Catholic priest was injured. Thomas L. Coleman, 55, part-time deputy sheriff, was tried and acquitted of manslaughter Thursday.

Car Loadings Show Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—Cars of revenue freight loaded on rail lines in Canada in the seven days ended Sept. 21 numbered 87,262, a rise of 5.4 per cent from a year earlier, the bureau of statistics has reported.

This put the Jan. 1-Sept. 21 total at 2,85,433 cars, a decrease of 3 per cent from the preceding year but an increase of 9.3 per cent from the corresponding 1963 figure.

Volvo Plant At Dartmouth Successful

TORONTO (CP)—The Volvo (Canada) Ltd. automobile manufacturing plant established two years ago at Dartmouth, N.S. has been successful and "satisfied us in every way," says Karl Kohler, the company's president.

"The Dartmouth operation has presented no problems at all and we are there to stay." "Although some people were skeptical about our move into the Maritimes, it has satisfied us in every way."

The Canadian company, a subsidiary of A. B. Volvo Ltd. of Sweden, started the Nova Scotia operation by producing six cars a day but this number has now risen to 15, Mr. Kohler said.

Mr. Kohler said he foreses "a gradual expansion of our facilities" in the Maritimes.

He said that Volvo's Canadian sales have risen to an estimated 3,554 cars this year from 1,874 in 1961.

The only distribution problem for the company, he said, arises

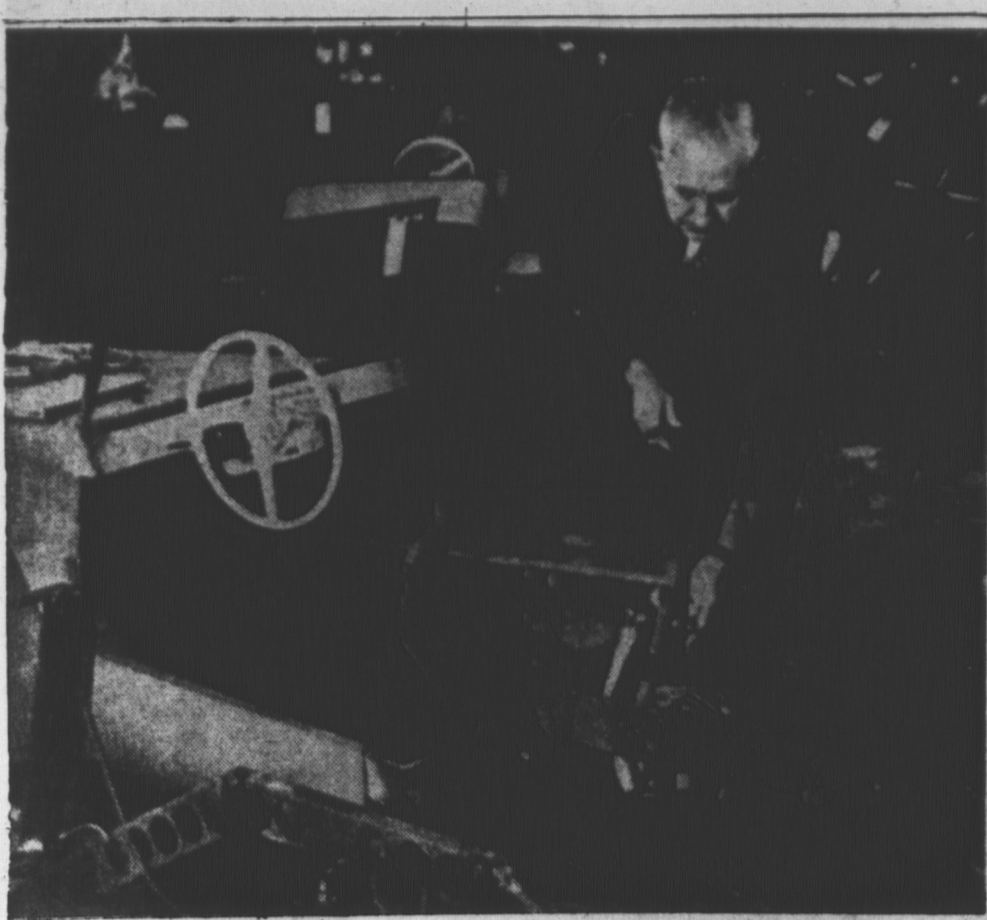
on the West Coast as it is cheaper to ship Volvos to Vancouver from Sweden than overland from Dartmouth.

Mr. Kohler said his company will consider exporting cars to the United States once the Canada-U.S. automobile agreement

is in operation. The agreement integrates the North American car-and-parts industry by abolishing tariffs for manufacturers.

N.B. Minister Heads Roads Association

SASKATOON (CP)—Andre Richard, New Brunswick public works minister and new president of the Canadian Good Roads Association, said here the federal government should pay 75 per cent of the capital costs of main provincial roads still to be built.

Mr. Richard said at the association's annual convention the federal government would "see the need for better highways" once the Trans-Canada Highway is completed.

"We believe the federal government should help provinces, especially the Maritimes, to build main highways to the standard of the Trans-Canada Highway," Mr. Richard said. "Federal contributions could quite logically be as much as 75 per cent, because the federal government now gets quite a lot of revenue from road users, including tax from automobile sales and revenue from road travellers through national parks."

He said the federal government should help highways, as it has helped air transport and the CNR.

Ontario Highways Minister C. S. MacNaughton invited the seven provincial highways ministers at the convention to a conference on a national highways policy in Toronto, set tentatively for Dec. 6-7.

Prices were lower in active trading on the Canadian Bond Market this week.

The short-term Canada market moved lower with prices generally off 10 cents. The 3 1/2 per cent, May 1, 1966 issue closed at \$99.28 bid and \$98.38 asked. The 4 1/2 per cent, Jan 15, 1968 issue was quoted at \$98 bid and \$99.20 asked.

The long-term market was under selling pressure near the close of trading Friday and most issues declined 1/4 to 3/4. The 5 1/2 per cent May 1, 1960 issue closed at \$97 1/2 bid and \$97 3/4 asked.

Day-to-day money was up 1/4 and closed at 4 1/2 per cent.
