THE examination of the classes of Prince of Wales College has been proceeding for the past few days. The Rev. K. McLennan has completed the examination of the students in classics; F. Peters, Esq., in mathematics; and John Cayon, Esq., is now examining the students in French, English History, Literature, and Ancient History.

THERE was a very large market to-day—the largest for some months. Prices were lower than heretofore, as follows:—Beef, small, from 8 to 15 cents; do., by the quarter, from 7 to 10 cents; mutton from 7 to 12 cents; lamb, per quarter, 50 cents to \$1.00; veal, per lb., 3 to 7 cents; pork, by the carcass, 5 to 5 1/2 cents; butter, fresh, from 19 to 22 cents; eggs, 8 1/2 to 9 cents; potatoes, 20 to 25 cents; oats, 43 to 45 cents; hay, 50 to 65 cents.

A trespass case was tried before Theoph. DesBrisay, Esq., this forenoon, between James McCulloch vs. Patrick McGuirk and James McGuirk, of Drummond Settlement. The nature of the trespass was that the defendants, on the 26th ult., broke a road fence on the plaintiff's premises, and when the plaintiff remonstrated with them for doing so, they fired several longers at him, which struck and did him bodily harm. The trespass was proven, and the defendants were both fined \$1 and costs or 30 days imprisonment. Action will also be taken against them for assault.

WINTER RYE.—We have in our sanctum several stalks of Winter Rye, which were handed to us yesterday by a gentleman of this city, who says he plucked them in a field, on the Malpeque Road, belonging to Thomas Morris, Esq. The stalks measure about three feet long, and the ears, which are well formed, are some seven inches in length, and would likely ripen in about four or five weeks more. The seed which produced these stalks was probably mixed with other seed sown on the farm above referred to about June last. Would it not be well for some of our farmers to try a small crop of Winter Rye, and see if it cannot be cultivated here with success and profit?

THE Concert last night in connection with the Baptist Sunday School of this city was in every way successful. The Chair was occupied by Mr. G. McLeod, Assistant Superintendent. A piece in which fifteen of the scholars recited in concert, was very well rendered. We have not space to mention the names of all those who took part in the Concert; the number was large and the programme lengthy, but two who seemed to please the audience deserve special mention. Ada Hendly, a little child of about three or four years of age, sang and recited remarkably well for one so young. A recitation named "Now-a-days, or when I was young," by Miss Glover, was very amusing and elicited applause. Others, in our estimation, performed equally well, especially the younger children, whose artless simplicity gave an air of naturalness to what they uttered and sung. The singing by the whole school was fair. Miss Davies presided at the Organ and contributed largely to the success of the Concert. The Church was crowded to its utmost capacity and all present seemed to be exceedingly pleased and delighted with the evening's entertainment. Concerts like the one of last night form one of the most pleasing features of Sabbath School work. They tend to draw into more intimate connection teachers and scholars, parents and pastors, and we only regret that our Sunday Schools generally do not favor us more frequently with musical and literary entertainments. They tend to develop the mental faculties of children and promote happiness in connection with religion. A collection was taken up at the Concert, the proceeds to be used for some charitable purpose.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, May 30.

Various dispatches mention Count Andrassy, Count Schouvaloff, Lord Lyons, M. Waddington, Count Cortis and Sadeck Pasha as representatives of their respective Governments at the Congress.

The Pall Mall Gazette telegram from Berlin says that Prince Bismarck and Count Von Bismarck will be representatives of Germany. Herr Von Radouitz, nominally Minister to Greece, but permanently employed in the Prussian Foreign Office, will take notes and make daily reports of the proceedings; and M. Viby, formerly Secretary of the French Legation in Berlin, and now Minister at Copenhagen, is expected to draft the final result pending the decision of the Congress.

It is believed in Berlin that Greece will be invited to send a representative to the Congress.

It now seems probable that some scheme for a British protectorate over Asiatic Turkey has really been put forward by the Government.

The extra edition of the "Globe" this evening contains the following:—"We have good reason to believe that the assembling of Congress is definitely settled.

"England and Russia have arrived at an understanding, subject to the decisions of the Congress on the following points: 'Bulgaria is to be divided into two provinces—one north of the Balkans, under a prince; and the other south of the Balkans, but not touching the Aegean Sea, with a constitution, governor, and a government similar to that of an English colony.'

JOHN O'BRIEN, a brakesman, who was jammed between two railway cars at Point du Chene, on Tuesday, while coupling, died yesterday. His injuries were in the chest. O'Brien belonged to the Upper Provinces, and had been engaged in railroading for 11 years. He had a wife and children in Boston, and while he lay unconscious and dying at the Point a letter from his wife arrived for him. He was attended in his last moments by Father Foley, his medical attendants being Drs. Leger and Ross.—Moncton Times.

On the 16th inst., John Kelly, Jr., of the firm of John Hickler & Co., contractors on the Lachine Canal, Montreal, mysteriously disappeared with a large amount of money in cash and drafts in his possession, which he was seeking to invest, and of his private funds. Every possible enquiry has been made by the detective force and his friends, but no clue to his whereabouts has been discovered. He left with the intention of going to Ottawa. Mr. Kelly is about forty years of age, stout, medium height, light moustache and gray hair; he is a large real estate owner in, and a man of wealth and of prominence of the City of Buffalo, N. Y., and well acquainted in the United States and Canada. Foul play is suspected.

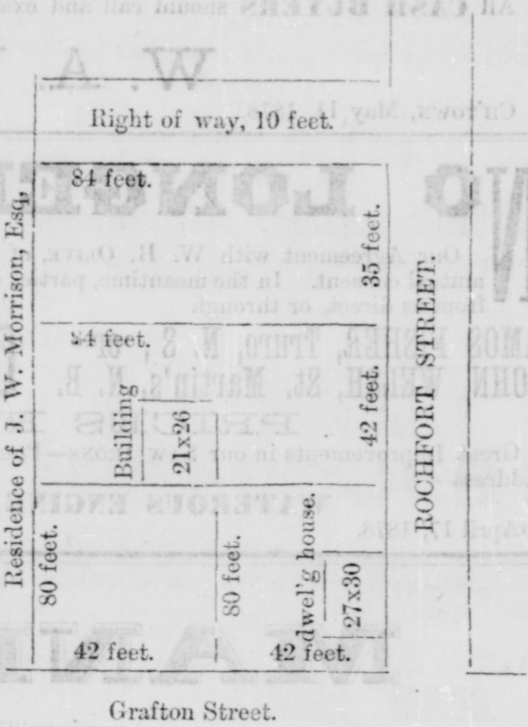

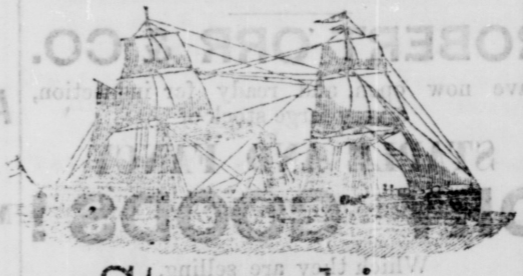
