[SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] THE RIOT AT HARBOR GRACE. SIX ARRESTS MADE. Serious Disturbance Anticipated. ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 28. Six arrests have been made by the police at the river head of Harbor Grace. The names of those arrested are Quirk, Shanahan, Duggan, Coady, McCarey, and Sullivan. Harper, the man who shot and killed James, and wounded Lilly, also shot Callahan, one of his own party, by mistake. The country around Conception Bay is in a state of uproar. Serious disturbances are anticipated at the obsequies of the dead Orangemen to-morrow.

AN ATTEMPT TO ABDUCT McBride—Invincibles Making Threats. BUFFALO, N. Y., Dec. 27. McBride, the Fenian, claims to have been induced to enter a carriage by two men who he had been drinking at a saloon with, and that they attempted to abduct him. He states they were Canadian detectives. He says he made his escape from them near Tonawanda where they intended taking him to Canada. The invincibles met again last night at Joseph Schividi's saloon and made many threats while indulging in beer. It is not thought they could accomplish anything even if they had the courage to try.

BRADLAUGH AGAIN. LONDON, Dec. 28. Charles Bradlaugh announces his intention of forcibly taking possession of his seat as member of the House of Commons for the borough of Northampton at the next session of Parliament. He says that having been re-elected to the House when he was declared ineligible, and again when he was expelled for not taking the oath, his duty toward his constituents requires that he should insist upon his seat, but he has refused the offer of some thousands of his supporters to come in procession to the palace yard and demand his admittance.

SUPPOSED LOSS OF TWENTY-NINE MEN. PENSACOLA, Fla., Dec. 28. The ship Cornelius, Wrecker, and the barques Waterloo, and Anglo-Fillmore, from this port for Liverpool, Amsterdam, and Brest, respectively, with lumber, are supposed to have been lost with all on board—some twenty-nine men.

A BANK TREASURER MISSING. PROVIDENCE, R. I., Dec. 28. Samuel B. Blodgett, recently dismissed from the position of Treasurer of the Providence Institution of Savings, proves to have embezzled funds of the Bank to the amount of \$27,136. Blodgett is now missing. His bondsmen are responsible for \$15,720.

PUNISHED FOR HIS FAULT. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 28. The trial of George W. Leviex, chief of the fire department, charged with defrauding the city of its revenue while in the tax department, has terminated in his conviction and sentence to three years in the States Prison.

A STEAMER OVERDUE. NEW YORK, Dec. 28. The New York Agent of the White Star Steamer "Celtic" says that the vessel is now some days overdue at Liverpool, and that an accident must have happened to her machinery.

ORANGE MEETINGS IN IRELAND. DUBLIN, Dec. 29. placards signed by Lord Rossmore have been posted throughout the county Monaghan summoning the Orangemen to oppose the proposed Nationalist meeting at Coolehall.

DUTIES TO BE REDUCED. WASHINGTON, Dec. 28. Mr. Morrison, Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, will report a bill making a pretty general reduction of existing duties.

A \$75,000 BLAZE. WILMINGTON, Dec. 28. A fire this morning in the Dieport powder works destroyed \$75,000 worth of property.

FRENCH REINFORCEMENTS. PARIS, Dec. 28. Further French reinforcements are to be sent to Tonquin. Affairs at Tonquin remain unchanged.

THE KHEDIWE CONTEMPLATE ABDICATING. LONDON, Dec. 28. Rumor states that the Khedive of Egypt contemplates abdicating his throne.

CANADIAN NEWS. OTTAWA, Dec. 29. The Official Gazette contains the appointments of C. P. Lelacher, of West Arichat, Nova Scotia, as preventive officer in Her Majesty's Customs, and of Captain John Stapleton to be shipping master, Port Hawkesbury, C. B.
