While standing near a stove her dress caught fire. She rushed out into the snow, and then had considerable difficulty in extinguishing the flames. Fortunately her brothers were near at hand or the accident might have been very serious.

ACCIDENT THIS MORNING.—This morning, while Dr. Conroy and Stipendiary Magistrate Blain were driving up "Gallop Hill," a horse and sleigh, driven at a rapid rate by two young lads, collided with their team, throwing the doctor and Mr. Blanchard out. Dr. Conroy, although struck and somewhat hurt on the shoulder, pluckily held on to his reins, and after being dragged about a hundred yards, brought his horse to a standstill. The boys in the other sleigh were not hurt, but their horse was thrown down, breaking the shafts and becoming so tangled in the harness that he could not be freed until it was cut away. Some eyewitnesses affirm that the sudden stop caused the horse to turn a complete somersault.
