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Tuition Fees Not Answer To Worsening Financial Bind

ST. JOHN'S (CUP)-- The only solution to the financial squeeze at Atlantic universities is to relate government grant and tuition fee increases in operating costs, according to John Anderson, president of the University of New Brunswick.

Speaking after a meeting of the executive of the Association of Atlantic Universities here Oct. 19 Anderson said that even substantial fees increases would, however, have little effect on total university budgets.

Anderson said doubling fees would leave that portion of the revenue insignificant at UNB, where tuition represents about 15 per cent of the total, down from 40 per cent a few years ago.

Father Malcolm Macdonnel, retiring president of St.

Francis Xavier University and AAU chairperson, said he hoped other potential revenue sources would contribute more to the financing of post-secondary education, particularly the private sector.

Macdonnel said the AAU executive wanted to stimulate universities to provide adequate training in both official languages in response to what he said was heavy pressure on French departments recently. The executive will encourage French departments to increase programs and accept as many students

With the loopholes now existent in the sale of land to foreigners (re: sale of 800 acres in French River to one company) and the growing rumors of financial problems at Dundas Farms, many Islanders will have plenty of time to wonder where community spirit, young Islanders and dignity have gone. The prostitution of P.E.I. has been completed - at our expense.
