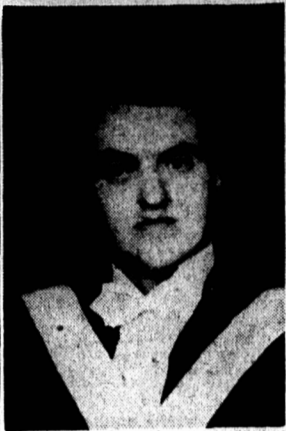

"PLANES DROP LEAFLETS—Yesterday afternoon an aircraft from the Summerside R. C. A. F. station, flew over Montague and dropped a large number of leaflets that for six persons on the province who collect the most will have a free plane ride in an R. C. A. F. Dakota aircraft. Over the island some 40,000 leaflets have been dropped, with approximately 3000 being over Montague yesterday. It is understood, that the same plane also flew over Souris yesterday to drop another 3000 leaflets. New-type Road Being Built At Murray Harbor

"Truckmen are busily engaged hauling gravel to the Murray River-Murray Harbor Road, laying the base for the new pavement which is to be laid down by the government this year. Earlier this week the road was scraped and levelled by the maintainer, and at present gravel is being laid to a depth of six inches which will, it is understood, be itself the pavement base. It is thought that this base will be impregnated with an oil composition which will gradually infiltrate through the whole base, and eventually result in a hard-top pavement. This composition, it is understood, is a new experiment, which has proven successful in Quebec, and is now being given its first test on the Island.
