GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE.

A War Would be a Naval Duel.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—The London correspondent of the New York Post telegraphs:—"A war with England would resolve itself into a naval duel, in which the French fleet would be annihilated in a fortnight and all the French colonies forfeited forever. Moreover, French commerce would suffer a terrible blow; considering that of the entire exports of France, amounting to something like 3,500,000,000 francs, 1,350,000,000 are taken by England, nearly as much as Belgium, Germany and the United States together take."

"In holding out, therefore, in this matter of Fashoda the French Government must either rely on a yielding disposition such as England displayed in the Siam, Madagascar, and West Africa disputes, or they must be acting on an understanding with Russia. If the first supposition is correct, they must be very badly informed of the temper of this country in respect to the whole matter of Egypt. If the second, then we must be prepared for the long expected turning point in the affairs of the Old World."

Idle Money.

MANILA, Oct. 25.—The British consul at Manila convened a meeting of merchants to discuss the commercial dead-lock. British capital to the amount of £40,000,000 has been lying idle here for six months. In the existing conditions business relations with the provinces have been in many cases entirely suspended. The meeting resolved to make an urgent appeal to the British government to endeavor to hasten a settlement of pending issues.

Lord Minto's Reception.

QUEBEC, Oct. 27.—The arrival of Canada's new governor-general and Lady Minto and their first landing on Canadian soil, which will take place here on the 12th proximo as nearly as can be judged, is to be made the occasion for an imposing military demonstration. All of the local corps are to be ordered out. The Hussars will turn out in full strength to form the escort for the lieutenant-governor and the new arrival.

ROYAL RECEPTION FOR KITCHENER.

Received an Unprecedented Welcome.

RECEIVED BY COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF AND GUARD OF HONOR.

A Most Enthusiastic Crowd—Police Were Powerless to Control it.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Sir Herbert Kitchener arrived here yesterday and was greeted by the Commander-in-Chief of the British forces and other high military officials. The Grenadiers formed a Guard of Honor at the railroad station and General Kitchener received an ovation from enormous throngs of people.

The scene of enthusiasm was almost unprecedented.

The crowds at the Victoria station were so dense that the police were unable to cope with them.

Barriers and the police cordons were carried away together and multitudes surged into the reserved portion of the station.

As the Sirdar issued from the royal waiting room expecting to step into his carriage he found himself confounded with an impenetrable mass, cheering and gesticulating "Bravo" Herbert,—"God bless you my boy," "cheers for the avenger of Gordon," and kindred cries. His face beamed with pleasure at the popular greeting.

When he attempted to make his way through the crowd his hat was bashed in and the police had to save him forcibly from the attentions of the enthusiastic guardsmen who desired to carry him on their shoulders through the throng.

Attempts to clear a passage were futile, and he Sirdar was forced to retire and was finally smuggled out of the station through a distant corner of the building.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Meetings of the Missionary and Special Committees.

The missionary committee of the N B and P E Island Methodist Conference met on Wednesday morning in one of the parlors of Centenary church Sunday school house, St John. Rev Dr Brecken presided.

The committee on appropriations submitted their report, which was adopted. The basis of allotment was fixed at \$750 for ordained married men, \$400 for ordained single men and \$350 for unordained men. The amount granted was only sufficient to pay to the missionaries an amount leaving a deficit of first class, \$300; second class, \$185; third class, \$117.

The following amounts were granted the districts of Charlottetown and Summerside:

Another meeting was held in the afternoon, at which Dr. Evans resigned his position as treasurer, but was subsequently prevailed upon to continue in office upon the understanding that he would be aided in his work by Secretary Marshall.

In the evening there was a meeting of the board of trusts, at which action was taken regarding properties held by the different committees.

At a meeting of the conference special committee deputations were appointed to visit the missions of the conference in order that they might be stimulated to increase their contributions to the ministry and report to next annual conference.

Following are the committees for Charlottetown and Summerside:
Charlottetown—Chairman, R Opie, W Kirby and G W Dawson.

Summerside—Chairman, Geo C P Palmer and F A Wightman.

It was understood that these committees should make complete arrangements for visiting all the missions.

Rev G M Campbell, of Charlottetown, and Dr Sprague, of Summerside, attended the meetings.

St. John, Oct. 27.—The fifty first session of the grand division Sons of Temperance, opened here yesterday, 65 members present. The scribe reports the membership about the same as last year. The retiring president, J. Q. Woodbury, spoke of the conflicting reports about the result of the plebiscite and of the duty of the government in the provinces adding: "It ought to be a sufficient answer to all such counsellors to say that we in the Dominion live under the British constitution where majorities rule, and where the will of the people as expressed at the polls is respected." He concluded by saying that the death knell of the liquor traffic has been sounded from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and those in the business, if they are wise, will at once set their house in order."
