MONDAY

Christopher Lynch, world famous lyric tenor, captivated an audience of upwards of 1,000 music lovers who came from all parts of the province to hear him sing a Centennial Concert in St. Dunstan's College Auditorium Saturday night. Music critics were agreed that it was one of the finest concerts of its kind ever heard here.

Mr. J. Henry Gallant, who has long enjoyed the esteem of the business and professional men of the city, with whom his occupation required daily contact, was tendered a party and presentation function by his fellow workers with the Canadian National Express on Saturday evening, prior to his retirement, effective today, as City collector for the company.

Dianne Fanning, 10-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Fanning, of Pleasant Grove, was burned to death in an early morning fire yesterday which completely destroyed the two-storey, six-room home of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McCormack.

In the Charlottetown Hospital as a result of the fire are two-year-old Ruby Fanning with burns to her legs, hands and face; Mr. McCormack, burns to his hands and head, and Mrs. McCormack with painful facial burns. None is in serious condition.

The death occurred at his home, 321 Glen Lake Avenue, Toronto, on Friday, May 28th of Rev. Harry C. Rice, D.D., retired minister of the United Church of Canada and until 1950, visiting minister at Trinity Church here.

He was the son of the Rev. Stephen Rice, part of whose ministry was in Charlottetown and a number of years of his boyhood were spent in this city. He attended Mount Allison University and was ordained to the ministry in 1900.

Mr. Vic Runtz, editorial cartoonist for The Guardian, was elected president at its annual convention held this year at Dalhousie University, Halifax. From its twenty-nine member bodies in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island a good representation was in attendance, to draw up plans for the coming year.

An enlarged selection of exhibitions for showing in all the major centres of the Maritimes was made available, including a new feature in the yearly exhibition of children's art, originating this year in Fredericton.

Montague Trinity United Church Y.P.U. Players walked off with major honors in the rural section of the Provincial Drama Festival on Saturday evening, when they were awarded the Smallman Trophy for the best rural play in the Festival, and the Boehmer Trophy for the best play from King's County.

Professor A. J. Shaw, adjudicator for the Seventh Annual Festival, awarded the C.W.L. Trophy for the best three-act play in the Festival to the Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild for their production of J. B. Priestley's "Summer Day's Dream," produced by Elizabeth Willett, and directed by Hazel Hunter.

St. Peter's A.Y.P.A., of Charlottetown, received the Festival's Rose Bowl for their presentation of Dorothy Clark Wilson's "This Night Shall Pass," directed by A. Stuart Dickson, and judged the best one-act play in the city entries.

Runner-up in the rural class was "The Light Eternal" by the Tignish Players, directed by Rev. Denis Gallant, and this group received the W. N. G. Trophy.

Named as best actress in the entire Festival was Miss Mary Shaw of Summerside, who received high praise from Prof. Shaw for her comedy interpretation of Veronica Day in Norman Macdonald's "Apron Strings," and Elizabeth Willett was named runner-up for her sustained and intelligent performance as Iris Shawova in "Summer Day's Dream."

Ivan Dowling, who played the elderly character role of Stephen Dawlish in "Summer Day's Dream" was named top actor of the Festival and Arthur MacLean was different roles in "Summer Day's Dream," and "This Night Shall Pass."

TUESDAY

OTTAWA, (CP) — Eight young Oblates were ordained by the priesthood here Saturday by His Excellency Archbishop Giovanni Panico, apostolic delegate to Canada, in an impressive ceremony.

For the first time in Canada, television cameras televised the ceremonies. It also was Archbishop Panico's first ordination since his appointment here as personal representative of the Pope.

The new priests include Rev. Donald Blaquiere, North Rustico, P. E. I. and Rev. James Trainor, Charlottetown. Father Blaquiere is a son of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Blaquiere and a graduate of St. Dunstan's University. He will celebrate his first Solemn Mass in Stella Maris Church, North Rustico on Sunday, June 13th.

Dragging operations were carried out yesterday afternoon and are expected to be resumed today in an effort to locate the body of the Peters of Tignish Shore who was lost overboard about 9:30 in the morning while running lobster lines with his brother Alyre. Mr. Peters, who was 24, was playing the rope when it slipped over the engine housing and became caught in the throttle, speeding up the boat and throwing him overboard in a nine-fathom depth of water.

Although Alyre quickly brought boat under control and pulled up the rope no sign of his brother could be found. Help was quickly

summoned from nearby boats but nothing could be done. Until dusk seven fishing boats searched the area, three miles off shore from Tignish Run, but were greatly hampered by the large amount of lobster gear in the vicinity. To aid in dragging operations the fishermen are taking up their gear today before the search is resumed. Two members of the Alberton detachment, went out with the search boats. Fishery patrol boats joined the search.

WEDNESDAY

John Billard of the teaching staff of the Summerside High School was the guest speaker yesterday at the noon luncheon of the Summerside Rotary Club held at Howard's Restaurant.

In his address to the Rotarians Mr. Billard dealt with the general projects and industries of the province of Newfoundland, giving also a brief outline of the history of the province since it was first discovered by John Cabot down to the time it entered confederation.

Speaking briefly of the various industries of the province he said that fishing ranks first, pulp and paper second mining third and with some agriculture being carried on mostly for home consumption.

Stewart, Nine Mile Creek, Covehead Road, Souris, Georgetown, Rocky Point and Kensington. At least 338 donors will be required today to meet Charlottetown's quota of 600 donors.

A Conway mother yesterday afternoon rescued her three small children before turning in the fire alarm that also saved the house.

Mrs. Harry Ramsay of Conway Village, started a wood fire in the kitchen stove about 4 p.m. Leaving her 7-month-old baby, and a son Barry, aged about 5 years, in the kitchen she went up stairs to get another daughter, Marjorie, 2 1/2 years of age.

About five minutes later as she descended the stairs with the little girl in her arms she discovered the kitchen was on fire. Dropping this child through the window of the ground floor she rushed into the kitchen to carry the baby to safety and returned for the little boy, who was so frightened he had crawled under a couch in the sunporch.

Mr. Rempel thrilled the audience as he disclosed many of the very interesting and gripping details of Indian life.

A fire of undetermined origin last night quickly leveled the store and dwelling of Mr. Douglas Rhynes of Parkdale in a blaze that spread so rapidly that members of the household, including Mr. Rhynes' wife, his father and two small children barely escaped the burning building.

Mr. Robert Rhynes, 33, was obliged to jump from an upstairs window but was uninjured whereas his son Douglas broke his fall. The older Mrs. Rhynes with her husband are patients in the Prince Edward Island Hospital suffering from shock while Douglas suffered minor facial burns and his daughter, Marlene, had burns to her hand.

The loss, which could not be estimated last night, will run into several thousands of dollars. Included in the loss were 12 pairs of chinchillas valued at \$12,000. Three pairs belonged to Mr. Rhynes and the remainder to Mr. A. B. Hubley of Petticoat, N. B. It is understood that there is some insurance on the property and store contents but there was none on the chinchillas.

An enthusiastic canvass for donors resulted in Summerside's minimum objective of 200 being exceeded by 131 at last night's

295 donors actually gave their blood, but unfortunately, the remaining 28 could not be taken due to a shortage of equipment since both the R.E.A.F. Station and Summerside secured so many more than expected.

LONDON, (CP) — Roman Catholic church officials made arrangements Thursday for the return to Canada of the body of Most Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, who died in St. John and Elizabeth Hospital here after an illness of several days.

The body of the 68-year-old cleric is expected to be put aboard a plane shortly although the exact time was not made known. Aboard the plane will be Monsignor Patrick McMahon of Charlottetown, who has flown to London to be with the Bishop during his illness.

The Bishop died suddenly Thursday after two operations. Only days before his death his condition was reported to have improved and hopes were held that he would eventually recover.

(Funeral services will be held in Charlottetown. Both officials at the Basilica and Rt. Rev. G. J. McLellan, Vicar General at Summerside last night were awaiting details from Msgr. McMahon.

The late Bishop Boyle was born in Afton, in Antigonish County, N. S., August 9, 1885, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Boyle. He came here as Bishop of Charlottetown in 1944 from his post as parish priest at Holy Redeemer Church, Whitney Pier, N.S.
