THE Mail announces that it is Sir John Macdonald's desire that a Provincial Liberal Conservative Convention should be held at noon on Tuesday, the 22nd day of November instant, in the city of Toronto.

QUEBEC is having its election campaign. It seems pretty certain that the Government will be sustained. Our friend Mr. L. G. Desjardines, of Le Canadien, has accepted and will be the only Government candidate in the county of Montmorency.

WE regret to learn that Mr. Charles Brennan, a broker of the proprietor of the Summerside Journal, was killed by jumping from a train while in motion, on the St. Paul and Duluth Railway. He was a young man about twenty-four years of age, and a native of Kentucky, though he had resided some time in this island.

COL. ROBINSON'S Humpty Dumpty Troupe appeared last evening at the Academy of Music. It was the most extensively advertised company that ever performed in the city. Hence the very large audience, chiefly composed of men and boys, which greeted the first show. No less than six hundred were present; and we believe that in the number not one person could be found who would express a favorable opinion of the pantomime. It was badly acted, low, and without an apparent point. The boys, of course, laughed heartily; but, if questioned, could not tell at what—other than the ludicrous performance of two third class clowns, the worn out exhibitions of "trick" dogs, the slovenly performance of an Egyptian juggler—which the public are led to believe is wonderful—or the disgusting and smutty jokes of a pair of pseudo-Irish comedians. Variety shows such as this should receive every mark of disapprobation from a respectable community such as Charlotte-town. We feel sure this one will; as the writer heard many a husband remark on leaving the "show" last night: "I am glad I did not bring the Misses, and I pity those who did."

STREET IMPROVEMENTS.—The energy and close application with which the Street Commissioner, H. B. Smith, Esq., has performed his responsible duties during the past summer and autumn, are commendable. A few years ago Mr. Smith was engaged in like capacity, when the grading of Water Street, the successful construction of a drain leading from Walker's Corner to Brighton Bridge, the drain leading from Hillsborough Street through the Railway Works to the river, and other prominent improvements were made. At that time his valuable services were rewarded by dismissal without pay. We trust that the present City Council are capable of appreciating the services of an efficient officer, and that they will show their appreciation by giving Mr. Smith a fair remuneration. During the past summer a portion of Euston Street has been macadamized, great and lasting improvements have been made on Prince, Grafton and Sydney Streets, and now Great George Street is receiving attention. The much neglected crossing between the Union Bank and St. Pat-ick's Hall is being rebuilt, with proper regard to drainage. Two unsightly and dangerous pumps have been removed from Great George and Prince Streets, and six condemned wells have been closed up. The city property at the head of Queen Street has been substantially fenced and neatly whitewashed. All these improvements have received the constant and personal supervision of Commissioner Smith, who, from early in the morning to late at night, never forsakes his post or neglects his duty. The result of his watchful attention is that a great deal of work has been performed with very few hands. We venture to say that more work has been performed by Mr. Smith this year on the streets than has ever before been accomplished in the history of the Corporation.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

IRISH NEWS.

DUBLIN, Nov. 3. Several hundred fresh cases for adjustment of rents were referred to the Land Court to-day. The block of business before the Court has increased.

Branches of the Ladies Land League throughout the Provinces complain loudly that their meetings should be dispersed, while the central League in Dublin is permitted to meet unmolested.

Miss Parnell, wishing to test the legality of the proceedings of the Ladies League, publicly announced in the newspapers of Wednesday that the meeting of the League would be held that day. No attempt was made to interfere with the meeting, although detectives watched those who entered the League rooms.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

A despatch from Loughrea, County of Galway, says a tenant farmer named Doherty was shot dead.

Right Hon. Hugh Law, Attorney General for Ireland, has been appointed to succeed Lord O'Hagan, Lord Chancellor of Ireland. Wm. M. Johnson, member of Parliament for Mallow, and Solicitor General for Ireland, will succeed Law as Attorney General. Patrick Egan will contest Mallow against Johnson, whose appointment to the Attorney Generalship necessitates a fresh election.

EUROPEAN.

VIENNA, Nov. 3.

The King and Queen of Spain visit Vienna in January.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

The Central News states that it is contemplated to summon Parliament to meet for the despatch of business on the 19th of January, to give additional time to discuss the rules of procedure and the parliamentary oath difficulty.

ROME, Nov. 3.

At a recent consistory, on Monday, the Pope strongly blamed the Emperor Francis Joseph for receiving King Humbert and said something must be done to shake off the yoke of the church.

BERLIN, Nov. 3.

The Nihilists have issued threats that they will prevent the Czar's coronation unless he grants specified concessions.

VIENNA, Nov. 3.

The Franco-Italian Treaty of Commerce has been signed.

VIENNA, Nov. 3.

The floods have caused enormous damage in Austria and Servia.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

The Times says that the Treaty negotiations with France are not broken off; that the English commission is merely returning for fresh instructions.

The Times Paris correspondent says that at the interview between the Prince of Wales, Sir Charles Dilke and Gambetta, the Prince of Wales asked Gambetta whether he had seen Bismarck. Gambetta affirmed not only that he had not seen him, but that his recent visit to Germany was his third visit there incognito.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 3.

There is much anxiety here about affairs in Arabia. The sheriff of Mecca, it is reported, has declared himself unable to hold Khalif, and to have liberated Midhat Pasha. Some tribes in the vicinity of Mecca are in revolt. The Turkish commander has been instructed to arrest the sheriff if necessary.

The Times says: "We are to state that the Bank of England does not hold a penny available for the payment of Confederate bonds. The public should beware of buying bonds, intrinsically worthless, on the faith of such rumors."

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.

The annual report of the United States treasurer shows the net revenues for the year were \$360,782,292.37; net expenditures, \$260,712,887.59. The public debt was reduced \$90,872,261.05, and there is a balance in the treasury of \$253,453,928.81. The excess of assets over the liabilities is \$140,443,491.77.

HAVANA, Nov. 3.

The prospects of the sugar crop are splendid.

DETROIT, Nov. 3.

There was snow in this city and Grand Rapids to-day.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.

Dr. Benjamin Franklin Rache, aged 81, a great grandson of Benjamin Franklin, and an officer in the United States navy for nearly sixty years, died at his residence in Brooklyn yesterday, after an illness of two weeks.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.

It is reported that a despatch was sent by the United States Government to the U. S. Minister in Peru, directing him to continue to recognize the Government of Prudent Calderon.
