

Child Killed At Tignish In Fall Under Farm Wagon

A three-year-old child, Austin Peter Handrahan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Handrahan of Tignish, was fatally injured yesterday morning when he fell beneath the wheels of a farm wagon driven by his thirteen-year-old brother, Hugh. The little boy suffered a fractured skull in the accident which occurred when the horse became startled by a piece of paper blowing across the road. The accident victim was taken to the Western Hospital and later transferred to the Prince County Hospital at Summerside where he passed away about four thirty in the afternoon. Chief coroner Dr. L.E. Prowse was called and decided that an inquest would not be necessary. Besides his sorrowing parents the deceased is survived by ten brothers ranging in age from one month to nineteen years. This is the second fatality this month involving a farm wagon. On August 2 Mr. Anthony Perry of Fortune Cove was killed in a similar manner.

S'ide Man Is Sentenced To Two-Year Term

Following a plea of guilty on a charge of breaking, entering and intent to commit an indictable offence, Donald Joseph "Wickey" Gallant of Summerside, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary Tuesday morning. The offence took place at the feed plant of Canada Packers at Summerside where Gallant was arrested Monday night.

Lobsters In West Prince Said Scarce

South side lobster fishermen in West Prince appear to be in for a poor season if small catches of the last two days continue for any length of time. Although one or two large catches were reported the overall average is away down from other years. Hubert Gallant brought in thirteen hundred pounds at Skinners Pond on Monday, considered an above average catch, but was down to eight hundred pounds yesterday. High winds and rough seas hampered the fishermen on Wednesday and only a few were able to overhaul all of their traps.

Tension Mounts In War Of Nerves At Formosa Strait

TAIPEI (Reuters) — Tension mounted Wednesday in the war of nerves across Formosa Strait as Communist Chinese shore batteries pounded a Nationalist-held island and rival jet fighters clashed in dogfights. Communist field artillery in Amoy port bombarded Little Quemoy island with 44 shells, the Nationalist Chinese defence ministry announced. There was no mention of damage. The Quemoy, Matsu and Pescadore groups have been in a state of alert since Aug. 6. Armed forces and air raid precautions on Formosa were strengthened.

FRANZ STAMPL, Austrian coach of such famous milers as Roger Bannister, Chris Chataway, and Merv Lincoln, addressed the Rotarians at Mulberry Lodge in Summerside Tuesday at the noon hour. Mr. Stempel emphasized the fact that Canada has not been able to compete successfully with other world athletes. He said this was due to lack of sufficient coaching and training. Canada hadn't taken this business of training for track and field seriously enough.

Coach Stresses Value Of Track And Field Training

Mr. Stempel stressed the value of participation in track and field events. He said these games tended to promote better international relationships. Training played a much larger part in track and field today than it did years ago, when natural ability was the only important thing. Today an athlete's success depended to a great extent on the way he trained and how much work he did.

In the last few olympic games Canadians had fared badly as compared with other countries of comparable size, and even in hockey, the speaker pointed out, Canada was in fact beaten on one occasion by the Soviet Union. In industry, commerce and national health are bound to suffer if boys

and girls are not developed in physical fitness. In a recent survey the United States and Canada were found to be below the standard in physical fitness of war-ravaged countries of Europe.

Mr. Stempel said it would cost a lot of money to carry on successfully a track and field program for Canada, and that it would mean a real concentrated effort on the part of the nation. He told how he had taken a school in England totally unversed in track and field, and had built them into a championship team. It was found that good athletes, as a rule, also made good scholars. He complimented the Canadian Legion for their efforts to develop track and field in Canada.

Mr. Lowell Hancock, on behalf of the Rotarians and visitors, thanked the speaker for his inspiring address. Mr. John W. Arnold was chairman of the meeting.

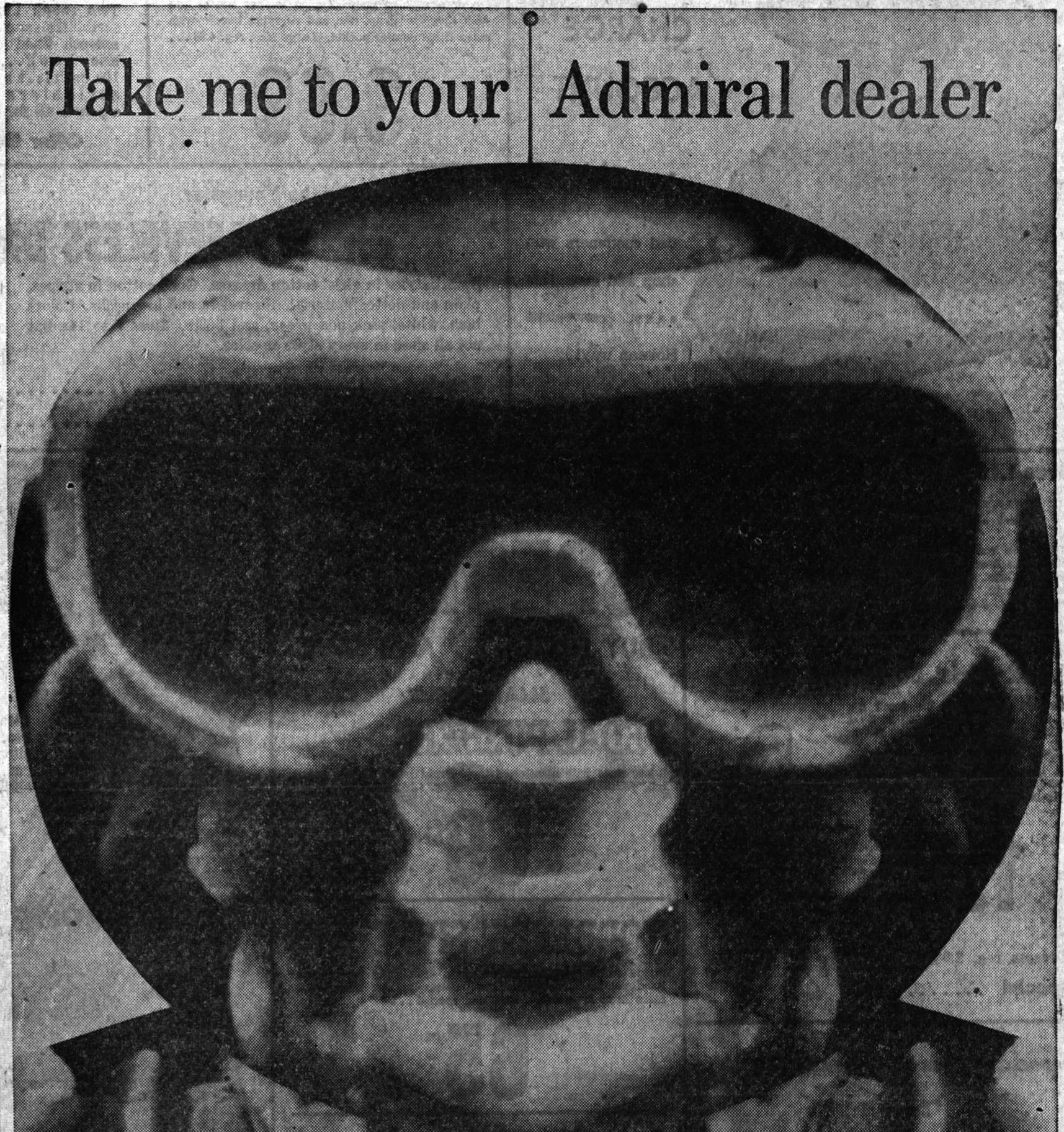

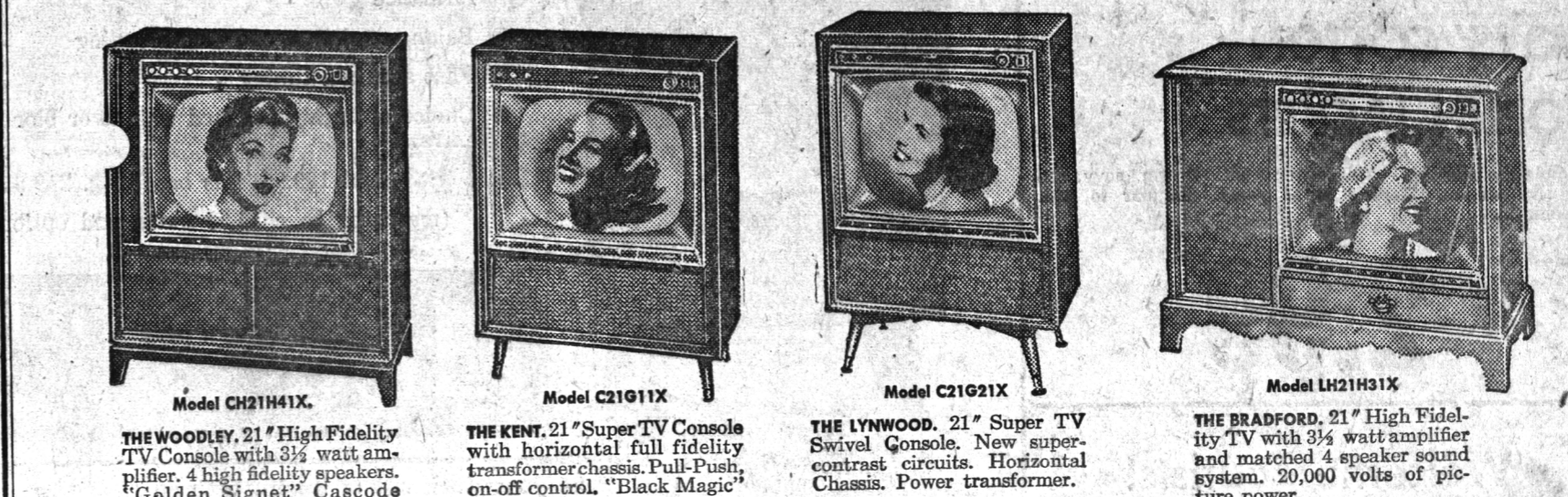
