RCHA Reg't Goes To Gagetown
HALIFAX (CP)—The army's Eastern Command announced Friday the third regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery will begin moving to Camp Gagetown, N.B. from Camp Debert, near Truro, Nov. 12.

The move into new headquarters is expected to be completed by early December.

The unit will join the Eighth Canadian Hussars which moved into the nation's biggest army camp between Fredericton and Saint John, N.B. earlier this year.

Formed as the 79th Field Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery in 1941, the RCHA unit saw service in Germany and Korea before moving into Camp Debert in 1954.

"The move to Camp Debert was never foreseen as being a permanent one," an army statement said.

"Training facilities were limited and it was necessary for the regiment to move by batteries to Truro, N.B. to carry out field firing exercises until this past summer" when the regiment took part in Gagetown exercises.

Health Certificate Presented To CNR

MONCTON. — A banquet attended by distinguished members of the medical fraternity in New Brunswick was held yesterday at Moncton to mark the presentation of a certificate of health maintenance to The Atlantic Region of Canadian National Railways.

The certificate recognized by the medical profession generally as the official accreditation of employee health services, was awarded the region by the Occupational Health Institute Inc. of the United States. The citation says in part that the regional employees have been provided with "the best kind of constructive health service, aimed at main-

taining good standards of health among workers and cutting the incidence of accident and disease."

The presentation was made to Dr. R. J. Brown, chief medical officer for the region, by Dr. D. C. Bews, district counselor of the industrial medical association for Eastern Canada. Dr. Bews comes from Montreal, where he is medical director for the Bell Telephone Company of Canada.

Withdraw Whip From Lib. MLA's

TORONTO (CP)—Ontario Liberal Leader Farquhar Oliver announced Thursday he will instruct the chairman of the party caucus not to invite two legislative members, A. J. Reaume and Albert Wren, to future meetings of the caucus.

In a statement, Mr. Oliver accused Mr. Reaume, member for Essex North, and Mr. Wren, member for Kenora, of "disloyalty and insubordination."

He said he is recommending to the executive of the Ontario Liberal Association that a leadership convention be held in conjunction with the association's next annual meeting, set for April 18-19, 1958, in Toronto.

Mr. Oliver said in Fleisherton he has made an announcement "as to when I will resign." But he indicated he will continue as leader during the legislative session expected to open in February.

A party spokesman said the expulsion of the two members from the caucus means they will take no share in consideration of any party business and will be barred from discussion of any matters to be brought before the legislature by the liberal opposition.

The Liberal Opposition leader said: "I have been deeply concerned with the publication in the newspapers from time to time over the last two weeks of statements by two Liberal members of the legislature, bearing upon my position as leader."

"I have been especially concerned, as have other members of the Liberal caucus, by the fact

that those statements have been given out in such a way that the assumption is they carry the support of a majority of the caucus members. This is entirely erroneous."

Dosco To Have New Directors

MONTECALM (CP)—Shareholders of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, now controlled by A. V. Roe, Limited, are to meet Nov. 1 to select a new board of directors.

A Dosco notice to its shareholders said today the meeting was called to "remove any or all the present directors of the corporation and to elect another person or persons in his or their stead."

Control of Dosco, whose main interests are in Nova Scotia, re-

cently passed to A. V. Roe, Toronto-based industrial giant. Roe is reported to have acquired more than 60 per cent of Dosco common stock.

The Dosco announcement said the special general meeting was called following receipt of a requisition signed by shareholders who own more than one quarter of the corporation's issued and outstanding capital stock.

SUES FOR DAMAGES

MELBOURNE (AP)—The widow of Dr. Cecil Ernest Eddy, a leading Australian atomic scientist who died following atomic bomb tests at the Monte Bella islands last June, is suing the federal government for unspecified damages, claiming that Eddy's death was caused by his employment and aggravated by overwork.
