## You Figure 'Em Out

Claude Gaudet, playing the best we've ever seen him perform, rapped in five markers for the understaffed Summerside crew.

We've never seen the Summerside lads play better hockey than last Thursday night. They never seemed to tire as they pushed the Penguins all over the place.

It was a courageous performance by the westerners who were given no chance whatever, especially after what happened Wednesday night at home.

WE mustn't forget the great stand of the Penguins on Wednesday. After all, they won a battle on "foreign territory" with a very small force. The way they conquered the enemy that night left little doubt about their superiority.

All of which leaves us in a mixed up state of mind in regard to these Birds and Aces. Last week's occurrences were so unexpected that we dare not do any predicting on 1962 performances. Both squads surely have the element of surprise and they need that most effectively last week at Civic Stadium and The Sports Arena.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — The initial furor has subsided but this football — crazy community will long remember New Year's Eve, ringing in 1962, for the celebration hailing the small town boys' victory over the invaders from the big city.

Green Bay Packers, displaying a precision offence and an awesomely tough defending unit espoused a three-year struggle under Vince Lombardi to win the New York Giants 37-0 Sunday for the championship of the National Football League.

Green Bay blew the lid off in appreciation of the victory that brought the Packers their seventh NFL title. It marked the culmination of an intensive effort to regain the stature the Packers had lost in many a lean year since their last title in 1944.

## Joe Brown, Davey Moore Are Awarded Top Honors

NEW YORK (AP) — World lightweight champion Joe Brown and featherweight king Davey Moore were awarded top honors today in Ring magazine's copy-righted boxing rankings of 1961.

Brown, 35, from Baton Rouge, La., and Moore, 28, of Columbus, Ohio, are the only champions placed alone in their respective divisions. Each defended his title twice during the year.

Brown stretched his record of lightweight defenses to 11, while Moore was the most active champion with nine fights.

In its annual ratings, Ring separates boxers into groups within each division, with the higher-ranking fighters in the top category.

Two Canadians are on the list. Canadian heavyweight champion Bob Cleroux of Montreal is fifth in the No. 1 list of heavyweights behind champion Floyd Patterson of New York, Sonny Liston of Philadelphia, Eddie Machen of Portland, Ore., and Zora Foley of Chandler, Ariz.

George Chuvalo of Toronto is fifth in the second heavyweight grouping. He trails Alejandro of Argentina, Ingemar Johansson of Sweden, Henry Cooper of England and Cleveland Williams of Houston, Tex.

Ring editor Nat Fleischer rates three fighters behind other men in their divisions: Light — heavyweights Archie Moore, recognized by New York, Massachusetts and Europe as champion of the 175-pounders, is second behind Harold Johnson of Philadelphia, hailed as king by the National Boxing Association.

Gene Fullmer, the NBA-recognized middleweight champion from West Jordan, Utah, is on top of the 160-pounders, with Paul Pender of Brookline, Mass., second and Terry Downes of England third. Downes won recognition as champion in New York, Massachusetts and Europe by dethroning Pender in London, despite this. Ring still looks on Downes as world champion.

Emile Griffith of New York, who won and then lost in welterweight title fights with Benny (Kid) Paret of Cuba, is rated first ahead of the reigning champion, Paret, in the 147-pound class.

Ring's survey of boxing fatalities shows eight in the world this year, the lowest figure since eight were recorded in 1957. There were 10 last year.

Louisiana State University throttled Colorado Buffaloes' offense and scored a 27-7 victory in the Orange Bowl at Miami before a crowd of 62,391.

LSU blocked two punts by Chuck McBride for a touchdown and a safety, and set up the clinching score, Wendell Harris, who scored 34 points during the season for the Southeastern Conference co-champions, kicked a 36-yard field goal and got two converts.

Texas intercepted five passes to score a 12-7 victory over Mississippi in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas.

UNDERDOG WINS  
A three-point underdog, Texas threw up a strong defence in paving the way for the first victory by a Southwest Conference team in the Cotton Bowl in five years.

Tommy Ford intercepted Glynn Griffing's pass to set up the first Texas touchdown in the opening quarter, scored by Jim Saxton, an all-America half-back. Jack Collins got the second Texas touchdown before Reed Davis took a Mississippi pass in the end zone.

In the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, Alabama beat Arkansas 30-3 on the crushing line play of Billy Neighbors and Lee Roy Jordan and the quarterbacking of Pat Trammel. Trammel got one touchdown while Jim Davis kicked a 32-yard field goal for Alabama. Mickey Cissell kicked a field goal for Arkansas.

FIVE SATURDAY  
The post-season contest among college teams opened Saturday with five games.

Sparked by the performance of quarterback Galen Hall, Penn State bounced back from the short end of a 9-0 score, to hand favored Georgia Tech a 30-13 beating in the Gator Bowl at Jacksonville, Fla.

In the East-West clash, the West-picked to lose—rumped to a 21-6 win at San Francisco.

## Minnesota Turns Tables On UCLA

NEW YORK (CP) — The U.S. college football season was officially wound up Monday with Minnesota's 21-3 victory over UCLA in the Rose Bowl game—the top sporting event of New Year's Day.

A total of 88,214 spectators attended the classic in Pasadena, Calif., where Minnesota's powerful running and passing attack was led by all-America quarterback Sandy Stephens, a senior who scored two touchdowns.

UCLA was first to get on the scoreboard when fullback Bobby Smith booted a 29-yard field goal to give his team a 3-0 lead after UCLA was thrown for a loss from the Minnesota six.

Stephens dived for a touchdown from the one-yard line a couple of plays after UCLA fullback Almo Thompson tumbled and Minnesota recovered on the UCLA six.

The 212-pound quarterback then led the club 75 yards to set up Bill Munsey, who plunged the final three yards for Minnesota's second touchdown. Stephens got the last one. Tom Lochner converted—all three TDs.

The Rose Bowl was one of four bowl contests on Monday's program.

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# Rangers Trounce Bruins; Chicago Blanks Canucks

BOSTON (CP) — New York Rangers pulled away from a 2-2 deadlock after the first period Monday night to hand Boston Bruins a 4-2 loss in a National Hockey League contest.

Defenceman J. v. Spencer's first goal of the season was the deciding tally in a ragged game.

Spencer's 40-foot score came midway in the second period with the score tied 2-2 and held up until Andy Bathgate netted an insurance goal in the final minutes.

The Rangers, playing without defenceman Doug Harvey, also got goals from defenceman Al-Langlois and Camille Henry in the opening period. Charlie Burns and Doug Mohs scored for Boston in the first period.

Player-coach Harvey was dressed but did not take a turn. He injured his right knee Sunday night and Bruins topped the Rangers at New York 7-4.

New York goalie Gump Worsley gave up two goals in the first period but was unbeatable after that. Worsley had 27 stops while rookie Don Head of the Bruins kicked away 30.

Henry's goal was an unassisted tally at 13:05 of the first period and his 20th of the season. It was the fifth time the little winger had reached the 20-goal mark during his NHL career. Spencer's score was only his third in three NHL seasons.

Play was hampered because of poor ice surface. A hasty change was made following an afternoon ice show performance at Boston Garden.

CHICAGO (AP) — Goalie Glenn Hall kicked off 32 Montreal Canadiens shots Monday night as Chicago Black Hawks blanked the National Hockey League leaders 2-0.

The shutout was the fourth of the year for the Chicago net-minder and by all odds his outstanding performance. The 30-year-old veteran began turning away the hard-skating Canadians early in the first period when he stopped Claude Provost from five feet out.

His best stop of the night came midway in the second period with Chicago ahead, 1-0. Gilles Tremblay of Montreal took a pass out from behind the Chicago goal and cut loose from three feet in front of Hall. However, the Hawks goalie lashed out with the huge pad on his right leg and sent the disk spinning into the righthand corner of the rink.

The victory ended a Chicago string of four consecutive ties, including a 4-4 deadlock with the Canadiens Saturday night in Montreal, and pushed the Hawks into sole possession of fourth place, which they had previously shared with the idle Detroit Red Wings.

Taylor's leadoff goal and one by Sandy Fitzpatrick sent Guelph off to a 2-0 lead but Peterborough fought back until a goal by Bob Jamieson with eight seconds to go ended the game in a tie.

The consolidated Guelph's hold on fourth place giving them a two-point edge over fifth-place Niagara Falls and a four-point spread over the last place Petes.

Winnipeg (CP) — A rink skipped by Jim Wilcox of Flin Flon won the Manitoba schoolboy curling title here Monday with an 8-7 victory over Rick Borland of Winnipeg in a sudden-death final.

Wilcox will represent Manitoba in the national schoolboy curling final in Halifax Feb. 19-23. Borland and Wilcox were the survivors of a record total of 307 rinks that began play in the Manitoba high school bonspiel last Tuesday.

Detroit's magnificent Gordie Howe, playing his 16th season in the NHL, pulled off his first hat trick in five years Sunday night to give the Red Wings a badly-needed 4-2 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs.

One of the venerable Howes' goals came on the NHL rarity, a penalty shot.

The loss protected Montreal Canadiens' four-goal lead over the Leafs for first place. Just the day before, two double-goal performances by old-timers Bert Olmstead and George Armstrong helped the Leafs beat Detroit 6-4.

In New York Sunday, Murray Oliver scored two goals and Cliff Pennington, Andre Pronovost, Jerry Toppazzini, Don McKenney, and Charlie Burns once each for one of Boston's rare victories.

Andy Bathgate, the NHL's scoring leader this season, got two goals and Camille Henry and Pat Hannigan one each.

The results left Boston in the cellar and New York in third place.

Canadians must have wondered what possessed them to sell McDonald to Chicago. McDonald killed off Montreal's three-goal uprising that gave the Canadiens a brief lead and assured Chicago of a fourth-place tie with Detroit.
