The selections made were excellent, embracing representative young men of both Catholic and Protestant denominations. One received a letter last week from a leading cattle raiser in the Sackville district, stating that Canadian buyers purchase everything they can get. They ship the best to the English markets and take the bad to be made ready. Sales have recently been reported at 13 cents dead weight. COOL.—A printer residing in Prince Edward Island recently wrote to the railway department here for another pass over the I. C. R. via Pictou and Georgetown. His name couldn't be found on any of the books of the road, and enquiry showed that he was a fraud on the pass. He said he intended going to Ottawa. He has recently been in correspondence here with parties in regard to work, but if he waits for that pass he will wait for a long time.—Moncton Times. THE FASTEST YET.—The new Guion steamer "Alaska," which had already beaten the best time on record, coming west as well as going east, arrived on the 24th, making the passage from Queenstown to Sandy Hook in seven days, four hours, and forty-two minutes, allowing four hours and twenty-two minutes difference in time. Her last trip coming west was made in seven days, six hours, and eighteen minutes, so that she has now beaten her former time by one hour and thirty-six minutes. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SIR JOHN IN THE FIELD

Liberal-Conservative Enthusiasm and Unanimity.

Differences Among the Grits.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, May 27.

Sir John McDonald opens the campaign in Lennox to-day.

It is hoped now that the Hon. Mr. Mason, whose health has improved, will again enter public life. He is expected home in a few days from France.

At Hamilton, last night, the two Liberal Candidates differed. Mr. Moore declared himself to be in favor of Protection; Mr. Irvine in favor of Free Trade. There is a plotting amongst their supporters in consequence.

Mr. Beatty, M. P., has received the unanimous nomination of the Liberal-Conservatives in Toronto West.

Mr. Hesson, M. P., has been unanimously nominated the Conservative Candidate for North Perth.

The list of Conservative Candidates is rapidly filling up; and the greatest enthusiasm prevails amongst the Liberal-Conservative Party owing to the reception which the present representatives receive in the constituencies.

It is said that an amicable arrangement is in progress between Stevenson and Pulman, the two Conservative Candidates for Montreal West. No Liberal Candidate has yet appeared.

Hon. Mr. Laflamme is the Liberal Candidate for Jacques Cartier.

LONDON, May 26.

Parnell made a very moderate speech in the Commons, this p. m., during the debate on the Repression bill.

Mr. Trevelyan admitted that the Government sent simultaneously messages of conciliation and coercion, but pointed out that the messages were not sent to the same address. He said Earl Spencer had determined in all cases of interference with huts for shelter of evicted persons should be submitted to him before the police were allowed to interfere. Mr. Trevelyan stated that Clifford Lloyd will not sit in any court under the bill (cheers by the Irish), as the powers of the act could only be exercised by special magistrates.

Mr. Cowen's amendment, declaring that while the House is desirous of aiding the Government in the detection of crime, it disapproves of the restriction upon free expression of public opinion in Ireland was repealed by a vote of 344 to 47. The house then went into committee on the bill.

VIENNA, May 25.

Four hundred houses belonging to Jews were recently destroyed by fire at Vasilshki, in the Government of Grodoro.

BERLIN, May 25.

Reports have reached here of a terrible conflagration in Kieff. The flames have been raging since Tuesday.

PIITTSBURG, Penn., May 25.

A strike of iron-workers, involving 40,000 men, is considered imminent. No terms of settlement of the difference seems probable, and it is believed the crisis will not be reached by June 1st.

WASHINGTON, May 25.

A banquet was given by the British Legation last night in honor of the 63rd birthday of Queen Victoria. A distinguished company was present, including the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, the Secretary of State, the Secretary of War, and the Secretary of the Navy.

NEW YORK, May 25.

A Lima letter, 3rd inst., states Trecoot's interview with Montero, at Huarez, resulted in nothing of a final failure. It is stated Montero still believes the United States will afford some assistance to Peru.

LONDON, May 25.

A letter from Davitt to the Most Rev. Thos. Nulty, Bishop of Meath, violently denouncing the landlords and demanding home rule, has been published. Bishop Nulty read the letter to the assembled clergy of the diocese who received it with enthusiastic applause.

The Times says it can't be doubted that the speech of Dillon in the Commons, yesterday, was intended to prove to his disaffected countrymen that he is no party to the Kilmainham compact.

THE NEW FISHING VESSEL ACT.—An Act was passed at the last session of the Dominion Government exempting vessels both British and Foreign engaged in fishing, from being compelled to pay into the fund for sick mariners. This Act applied only to vessels actually engaged in fishing or fitted for a fishing voyage, and not to vessels trading in fish. The rates paid by other vessels are two cents per ton on those over one hundred tons, to be paid three times per year, and two cents per ton on vessels under one hundred tons, to be paid once a year.
