

## Routine Business Transacted At Meeting Of S'side Council

Mayor W.A. Currie presided last evening at the final meeting of the Summerside Town Council for 1956. All councillors were present.

Councillor MacAusland presented a financial report of the rink committee which showed receipts amounting to \$4,013 and expenses of \$1,703. He pointed out, however, that the figures quoted to date could be misleading due to the fact that as yet, the statement did not include expenses such as light and water, interest and insurance which have yet to be computed.

The council passes a resolution authorizing the purchase of a potato peeler for use in the canteen at the Civic Stadium at a price of \$175.00.

### HOLIDAYS DECLARED

Another resolution submitted by Councillor MacAusland and passed declared December 25th (Boxing Day) and also January 2nd to be public holidays in the town of Summerside.

Councillor Jenkins submitted a resolution which approved the application of Joseph I. Gallant as a member of the Fire Department provided that the application met with requirements of the by-laws of the Fire Department.

Councillor Jenkins also introduced a resolution which provided for an amendment to a resolution which was passed by the Council on October 11th which read in part "Resolved that the firemen be not penalized for non-attendance at fires for the period January 1st, 1956, to September 30th, 1956."

Councillor Clark asked if this resolution referred only to non-attendance at fires and not at monthly meetings and it was explained that the resolution referred only to non-attendance at fires and that any fireman who did not attend the meetings would be subject to penalty.

Regarding the matter of the request from the Fire Department that the Town Council consider the matter of having the accident insurance covering the fire brigade increased, Councillor Jenkins brought in a resolution which was passed that the Insurance Company

be requested to increase the coverage to provide the following principal sum, \$5,000.00-weekly indemnity \$40.00 and blanket medical coverage \$1,500.00 at an annual premium of \$9.00 per man.

Councillor Lidstone reporting on the cost of removing the Brennan house said that it amounted to \$1,473.61. Mayor Currie said in regard to this figure that there were still credits to go against this figure before the final cost is estimated.

Councillor Lidstone moved a resolution that the Public Library be moved from its present location on Central Street to the space provided for it in the new Civic Auditorium.

### STREET LIGHTS

Councillor Clark in his report on street lighting said that the lights on Water Street have now been hooked up and would welcome the opinion of the citizens regarding them. He said that there had been some criticisms by ardent people to the effect that they were not bright enough but he felt that this was a matter for the general public to decide.

Speaking on this matter Councillor Cannon said that he felt that the Water Street lighting was very good. He said he had occasion to drive through the street at times when all the neon lights were out and found the lighting quite adequate.

Councillor Clark said that while there were a few lights at Summerside East on Water Street not yet energized that this would be done soon.

Councillor Clark also expressed his appreciation to the citizens of the town for the fine cooperation they had given in the matter of conserving electric power at peak load time. He said that the chart had reflected the response of the citizens in this regard and hoped that the fine cooperation would continue.

Councillor Perry, reporting for the street committee, said that at present the machinery was being prepared and put in order for the time when the snow came.

A resolution of sympathy to the mother of William Clement, who met an untimely death as a result of a cave-in while digging a ditch on December 3rd at Summerside East, was moved by Councillor Cannon.

Councillor MacAusland called the attention of the council to an article which appeared in MacLean's Magazine by Blair Fraser in which it was claimed that the causeway across the strait would be a convenience but not an asset.

Councillor MacAusland was supported by Councillor Cannon when he said that such publicity would be detrimental to the project and Mayor Currie said that he would be glad to prepare a reply expressing disapproval of the article.

Before closing the meeting Mayor Currie took the opportunity of extending the greetings of the season to all the citizens of Summerside.

## Town Manager Explains Cost Of Garbage Disposal Machine

Addressing the Summerside Council last evening on the matter of the purchase of the garbage disposal unit by the town of Summerside, the town manager, Mr. Joseph Brophy said that there had been some criticism of the purchase and wished to correct some errors, which had been circulated regarding the machine.

Mr. Brophy said: "The Town Council for some time past recognized the need for some more modern method of garbage disposal. As a result of continued complaints from residents at and near the dump area and after due study and investigation the sanitary land fill method of garbage disposal was accepted which necessitated the purchase of a bucket type tractor. The Caterpillar tractor was chosen due to this company's pioneer activities in the matter of garbage disposal as well as some thought being given to the fact that this was the only company having service and stock of parts in this Province.

"As a result of quite heavy expenditures being necessary the past few winters for the rental of dozers for town snow removal purposes it was felt justified and agreed to add to the shovel equipment, an angle dozer blade for thoughts in their minds to make suitable subjects and a person cannot be hypnotized unless prepared to cooperate with the hypnotist."

the dual purpose of snow removal in winter and rental purposes throughout the year, thus enabling the machine to repay its capital cost through earnings. To utilize this more versatile combination for winter snow removal purposes other accessories had to be purchased, a closed cab, heater, defroster, snow sprockets, and a set of grouzers. This combination was purchased for a sum of twenty seven thousand dollars to be paid over a three year period at the rate of nine thousand dollars per year. As a result, this purchase figure included an insurance carrying charge of \$2,400.00 - meaning that if the town had been in a position to pay spot cash for the combination the cost would have been \$27,000 less \$2,400 or \$24,600.

"This tractor combination has worked on various projects both in town and otherwise for a total of 462 1/2 hours to November 30th, 1956, grossing an earned revenue of \$4,622.50 in two and a quarter months, the net of which continued operation will go a long way to defray the first payment of \$9,000 due in 1957."

"Some criticism has been directed to the Town Council because of the purchase of this combination at a price paid and a comparison has been made with a presumably identical Caterpillar machine purchased by a local general contractor in August, 1955."

"The council, as a result, has investigated and find that the con-

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tracting firm referred to did purchase in August, 1955, a Caterpillar D6 traxcavator — a D6 tractor with 2 cubic yard bucket, total shipping weight 28,820 lbs. For the sum of \$21,800 cash. During the interval from August, 1955, when this purchase was made, to September, 1956, when the town purchased its tractor, prices had increased on two different occasions.

"In September, 1956, the town purchased a Caterpillar 977 traxcavator with a two and a quarter cubic yard bucket, angle dozer blade, closed cab, heater and defroster, two snow sprockets, one set of grouzers for the sum of \$27,000.00 including \$2,400.00 for insurance and interest carrying charges for three years on \$24,600 an average rate of 6.956 per cent.

"To equip the 1955 machine purchased by the contractor for \$21,800 with the additions necessary for the town tractor would cost them an additional \$4,225.00 making their total past payment \$26,025.00. To this add the insurance charges for the three year time payment and the contractors machine would have cost \$28,425.00 in 1955 prior to two price increases.

"The town machine was purchased for \$27,000 a difference in favor of the town of \$1,425.00 for a later and heavier model."
