## THE AMERICANS CAPTURE ILOILO

### And Make Combined Sea and Land Attack

#### THE INSURGENTS MAKE A FEEBLE RESISTANCE.

The American Losses are Thought to Have Been Heavy.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—A cable received by the Government announces the bombardment and capture of Iloilo on Sunday, and a combined attack by sea and land was made, the insurgents offering useless opposition.

There was serious fighting at some points and large loss of life on the insurgent side.

The absence of statement of the American loss is understood to mean that it was perhaps the heaviest since the hostilities began.

#### GREAT LOSS OF LIVE STOCK.

Result of Storms and Cold in the Western States.

DENVER, Col., Feb. 11.—J. W. Springer, secretary of the Continental Land and Cattle Company, received word from its Montana and Texas ranches that the loss of live stock would be very great as a result of the storms and cold. "The loss," said Mr. Springer, "will be general throughout the western country, from Montana down through Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas. In some places it will probably reach 50 per cent., and it will run, throughout the country between 10 and 35 per cent. The great loss of cattle is bound to make a high price during the year, as the last Government reports show that there is a cattle shortage, and the demand for foreign trade is greatly increased."

#### SIR JOHN ABBOTT'S HOUSE

Syndicate Pays \$40,000 for it for Club Purposes.

MONTREAL, Feb. 11.—The magnificent private residence of the late Sir John Abbott, at one time Premier of Canada, in this city, has been purchased by a syndicate of wealthy gentlemen, and it is now held in trust for them by one of their number. Those whose names are mentioned in connection with the new club and are now members of St. James' Club, are counted among the oldest and most prominent members of that organization. The price paid for the property is said to be in the neighborhood of \$40,000. The Abbott residence has had no permanent occupant since Sir John's death, in October, 1893. At different times it has served as a residence for Lord Aberdeen, and during the winter that their Excellencies spent in Montreal this was the home of the family. The house will be occupied as a political club.

## DISASTROUS FIRE AT DIGBY, N. S.

### Has Destroyed Most of the Town

#### ALL OF THE PRINCIPAL BUSINESS BLOCKS DESTROYED

The Fire Raged all Night—Fears of Further Damage.

DIGBY, N.S. Feb. 14.—Fire was discovered in Letteney & Bros dry goods store about 10:30 o'clock last night.

It spread very rapidly, burning the principal business portion of the town, and the buildings from Jenner's drugstore to Shree's block were all consumed at 12:45.

At one o'clock, the principal buildings burned were Jenner's drugstore, C. F. Stone's dry goods and hardware establishment, Letteney & Bros dry goods and general merchandise establishment, Burnham's grocery and the block containing the Waverly House and Lindsrom's jewelry store; the Shree block including the law offices of T & C Shree, the Town office and Short's boot & shoe store; the Turnbull Block including the Post Office, and ten or twelve buildings mostly residences and small confectionery stores, e. c.

Great fears are entertained for the Dufferin and Bank of Nova Scotia buildings.

The fire was still burning at 2 o'clock, but was thought to be under control.

#### DISTRIBUTION OF SEEDS.

Director of the Experimental Farms Sending Out Samples

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 11.—For the past ten years systematic efforts have been made to increase the average returns and to improve the quality of the cereals and other important farm crops grown in Canada by an annual distribution from the Experimental Farm at Ottawa of samples of seed of the best and most productive sorts. These varieties have been first tested at the Experimental farms, and only those which have proven to be the very best have been chosen for this distribution. The samples sent out have contained three pounds each, and every precaution has been taken to have the seed in every instance thoroughly clean and true to name, and the packages have been sent free through the mail. Those who have received such samples and grown them with care have usually had, at the end of the second year, enough seed to sow a large area, and in this manner careful farmers all over the Dominion have been gradually replacing any inferior and less productive sorts which they had been growing in the past with superior varieties possessing greater vigor.

By instruction of the Minister of Agriculture, another such distribution is being made this season, consisting of samples of oats, barley, spring wheat, field peas, Indian corn, and potatoes. These samples will be sent only to those who apply personally. Lists of names from societies or individuals cannot be considered, and only one sample in all can be sent to each applicant. Applications should be addressed to the director of Experimental farms, and may be sent any time before the 15th of March, after which date the lists will be closed, so that all samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Parties writing will kindly mention the sort of variety they would prefer, and then, should the available stock of the sort asked for be exhausted, some other good variety will be sent in its place.

#### Austria-Hungary.

HANOVER, Feb. 11.—The Hanover Courier prints a remarkable article, in which it says that Emperor Franz Josef had planned a coup d'etat against the Austrian Germans, which was prevented by the death of the Empress, but that Franz Josef still intends to extirpate or enslave the 8,000,000 Germans residing in Austria.

Their ruin, the paper alleges, would be followed by an invasion of Austria by Bohemian Slavs. The recent expulsion of Slavs from Germany has been a warning to Austria that the German Government knows it would be a fatal error to rely on the friendship of Franz Josef.

## SALMON CANNERS IN TROUBLE.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 8.—It is stated that the banks have shut down on 28 canneries in British Columbia, owing to their inability to carry on business under the present Dominion regulations. Three bank managers are quoted as saying that with the present regulations small canners cannot can and all the smaller concerns must go to the wall. It means a loss to the province of \$4,000,000 and a loss to Vancouver of \$500,000.

G. I. Wilson, the largest individual canner on the Fraser said: "I have sold two of my canneries in Canada, and am looking for a site in the United States. About 20 of the 50 canneries will move to the States should the blundering Canadian Government insist on enforcing the regulations with the idea of barring American fish and fishermen. The rest will go out of business."
