LARCENY CASE.—The case of Lemuel Mellett, of Point Pleasant, vs. Catherine McMillan and Donald McIsaac of the same place, for the alleged larceny of onions, came up for hearing before H. James Palmer, Stipendiary Magistrate, at the Queen's Court, to-day, but was adjourned until Monday.

CERTIORARI GRANTED.—An application was made to Chief Justice Sullivan this morning by Mr. Stewart, Q. C., and Mr. Blanchard, on behalf of John Hughes, to quash a conviction made against him by the Stipendiary Magistrate of Charlottetown, for a breach of the Scott Act. The grounds alleged by the counsel was that no summons had been previously served on Hughes. A writ had been given him by the City Marshal, but the counsel said it was no summons, as it was not signed by any one, and it was upon this writing that the conviction had been obtained, as Hughes did not appear at the trial. The Chief Justice at the conclusion of the argument gave an order for a certiorari, returnable next Michaelmas term.

GOSPEL TEMPERANCE.—Despite the rain-falls last evening there was a large meeting in the Philharmonic Hall. The interest is increasing at every meeting. Since leaving Charlottetown some three years ago, Mr. Hughes has been in the telegraph service of the C. P. R., formerly at North Bay and latterly at Amoy. His many friends are glad to see him.

George J. Gould, owner of the American yacht Vigilant, has arrived at New York. Gould said he was treated with every courtesy by the Prince of Wales, and indeed by all with whom he came in contact. "We were treated well, very well, in all the races. Not a single objection could be raised by the most loyal Vigilant man. He thought Draper to blame for the Vigilant accident, but not intentionally. He believes that while Draper was the cause of the Vigilant's running on the shoals he did not know of such shoals being in existence, and there are many pilots in England who, while considered first-class, are as ignorant of shallow places in different inside yacht courses, as he is or was. The English press treated him splendidly and gave them everything that was due. Asked if he was going back to England he said: "Heavily I don't know whether I shall go back or not. I have made absolutely no plans for the future. The Vigilant is, of course, out of commission, and I have not yet made up my mind what I shall do with her."
