Toronto Has Strong Call For War Stocks

TORONTO, Sept. 11—A strong market for the war stocks, led primarily the steels, led the industrial section of the Toronto exchange in a moderate advance today while the mining stocks were weak all through and the western oils closed narrowly higher.

Index losses of 204 for the golds and 184 for the base metals were chalked up while the industrials closed 34 higher. Volume was sizeable at 458,000 shares.

The steels alone reflected the boom in Wall Street and the day's best prices were shaded under profit-taking. National Steel advanced to 64 and closed at 62 for a net gain of a point and Dominion Foundries held 2 points of an early 2-1/2 point gain. The Steel of Canada issues finished 3 points up, Dominion Bridge 3 1-2 up, Hamilton Bridge 3 1-2 up and Canadian Car Common advanced to 64 and closed at 62 for a net gain of a point and Dominion Foundries held 2 points of an early 2-1/2 point gain.

Implement issues followed the steels and the paper stocks were in demand at substantial gains. Massey Harris stocks firmed 1-1/8 to 2-3/4 and Cookshut Plow added a point. Senior oils turned heavy. International Petroleum 1-1/4, Imperial Oil 3-4 and B. A. Oil 1-4. Liquefiers showed little change. Noranda closed 2-7/8 down at 71-5/8. Smelters dropped 3 points net. Hudson Bay 1-2 and Nickel 3-4. All closed well up from their lows. Pend Oreille and Ventures improved and Waite-Amulet and Sherritt eased off.

Dome sold actively at a loss of 1-1/2 to 23-1/2. The day's loss was 23, the smallest price in six years and McIntyre also set a new 5-year low but it recovered to close unchanged. Hollinger dropped a point, closing at 12. Buffalo-Ark. Erie and Bralorne lost 50 cents and recessions of 10 to 20 cents were boarded by Central Patricia, MacLeod-Cookshut, Powell, Rouyn, Sylvanite and Wright-Hargreaves.

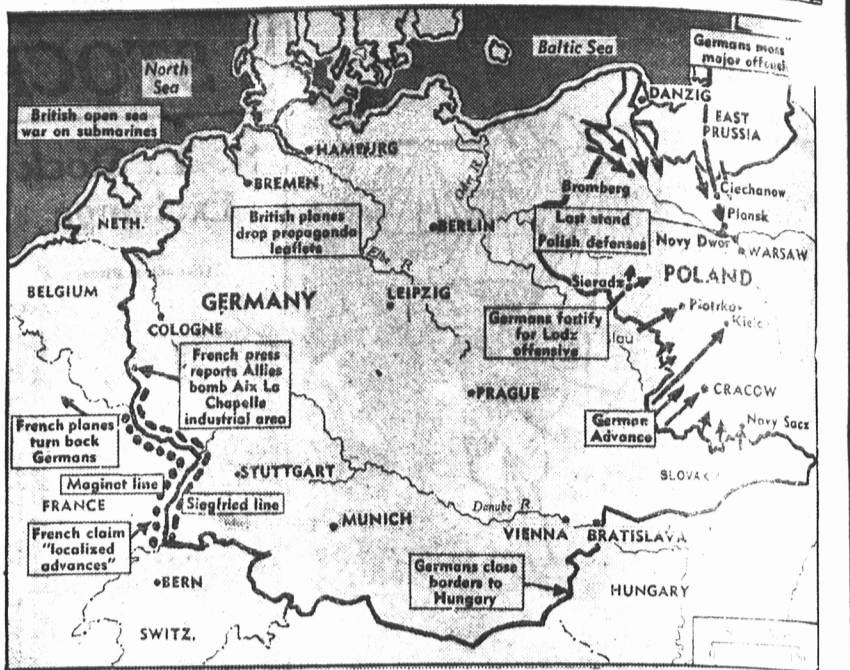

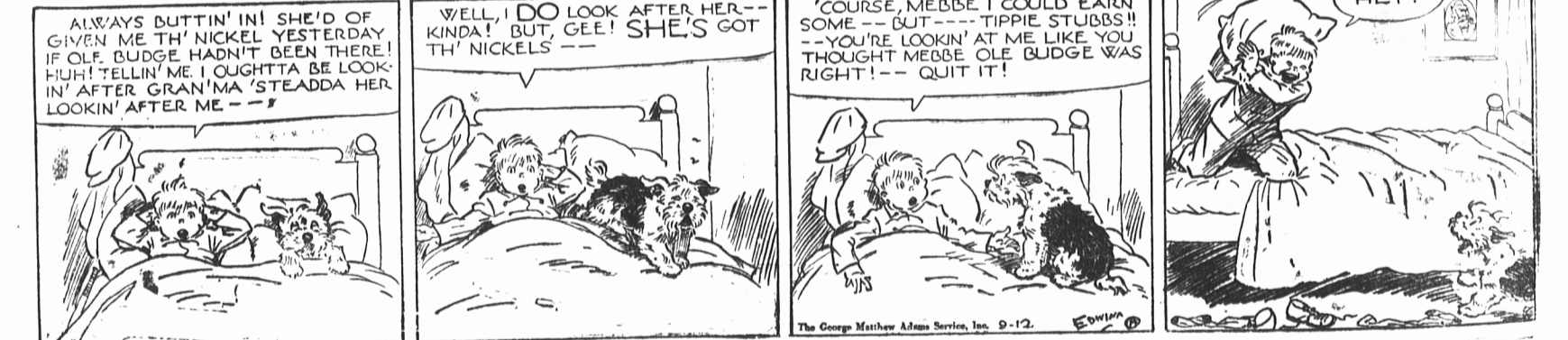
