News In Brief

QUEBEC, June 15 (CP)—The crippled collier Wabana, aground on a sandbar in Quebec harbor, was refloated Saturday. Three tugs yanked the collier free.

LONDON, June 15 (Reuters)—The Agriculture Ministry Saturday reported two new outbreaks of foot-and-mouth disease, both in Sussex. The total cases reported since November now stand at 441.

DALHOUSIE, N. B., June 15 (CP)—Spraying operations by 22 planes over a 300-mile tract of virgin softwood timber in the Upsalquitch River area commenced Saturday morning. Today's scheduled flights were postponed because of weather conditions.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, June 15 (Reuters)—Fishermen from Bornholm, Denmark's island far out in the Baltic, report that large-scale naval exercises are being held by the Russian navy and airforce between Danzig Bay and the Bornholm area. One fishing boat reported seeing large numbers of planes, including jets, which repeatedly flew over it.

Later, newspaper men climbed the Korean hills and viewed forward positions with Alexander. In the group were photographer John Foster of Ottawa, of the National Film Board, and Sgts. Paul Tomalin of Calgary and Leonard Stevens of Vancouver, Canadian Army photographers.

The press corps had quite a time keeping up with the Defence Minister. When he took to a jeep, correspondents followed, swallowing dust into the bargain. When he flew in a Beaver aircraft to his next point of inspection the jeep-riding newspaper men raced ahead to meet him.

Correspondents admired the way Alexander answered straight questions with straight answers; and how he deftly parried others. But they were still groping for the real reason for his visit.

Even if it was just window-dressing for possible British concern over the stalled truce negotiations at Panmunjon, the Korean commandment on Alexander's program was exhausting in itself.

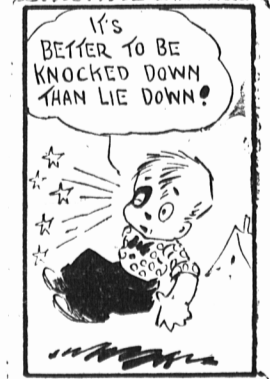
