A CHILDREN'S SAVINGS BANK.—We are asked to state that a Savings Bank for children will be opened in St. Paul's School room to-morrow (Wednesday) forenoon, and will be open once a fortnight from 3.30 to 4.30 p. m. Wrecked Crew Rescued. LIVERPOOL, Feb. 23. The steamer St. Francis, from New York, arrived at Liverpool yesterday. She had on board the crew of the schooner Petrel, found abandoned off Minehead, and towed to Queenstown. It was supposed the Petrel's crew were drowned.

Perils of the Deep. LONDON, Feb. 23. Information from Penzance shows that the steamer lost off that port was the Violante, of Rotterdam, for Liverpool. The Norwegian bark Varrs, and the British brig Esther are ashore near Westford. Their crews have been landed safely.
