Maritime RCAF Ass'n Slated To Gather Here June 22-24

Members from across the Maritime Provinces meet here June 22-24 for the Maritime Air Force Association group convention. It was learned from Harvey Campbell, chairman of the convention committee.

The convention gets underway Friday June 22 at 7:30 with meetings scheduled at the RCAF Wing rooms on Graham Street.

The group members go to the Charlottetown Hotel for a get-together and entertainment from 9:30 until midnight.

Meetings resume Saturday morning until 11 a.m. The group will assemble for a parade to the Cenotaph for laying of wreaths and a fly past at 11:30.

Hospital Unions To Get Directive

Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge yesterday prepared a directive which will be sent to union locals of two Charlottetown hospitals, setting out the procedure to follow in the union negotiations for 1962 contracts with the hospital boards.

The hospitals are Charlottetown Hospital and Prince Edward Island Hospital, making up locals 853 and 828 respectively of the National Union of Public Employees.

Difficulties arose in contract negotiations when the union was advised by the boards that the boards did not feel that they may be able to honor contracts involving increases as a hospital budgets are a commission.

Union representative John F. MacMillan, Saint John, said last week that the union was seeking wage increases of 20 per month for non-professional workers at the hospital.

REPORT SUBMITTED

The provincial labor relations board investigated the matter and submitted a report to Mr. Wedge.

It was indicated this morning that if the procedures Mr. Wedge suggests the union in settling the dispute do not work, the matter will go to conciliation.

Commenting on conciliation proceedings on the long dispute between local 1279 of the Electrical Workers Union and the provincial Electrical Contractors Association, Mr. Wedge said that progress is being made and that it is hoped that within 10 days the conciliation board will submit a report to the minister.

Drivers Fined At S'side

SUMMERVILLE - A relatively heavy docket composed the Prince County court before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald yesterday.

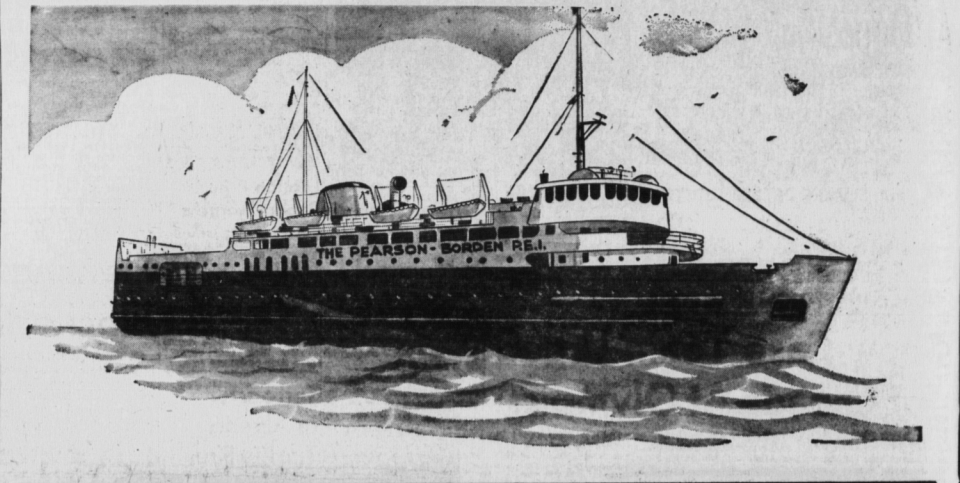
