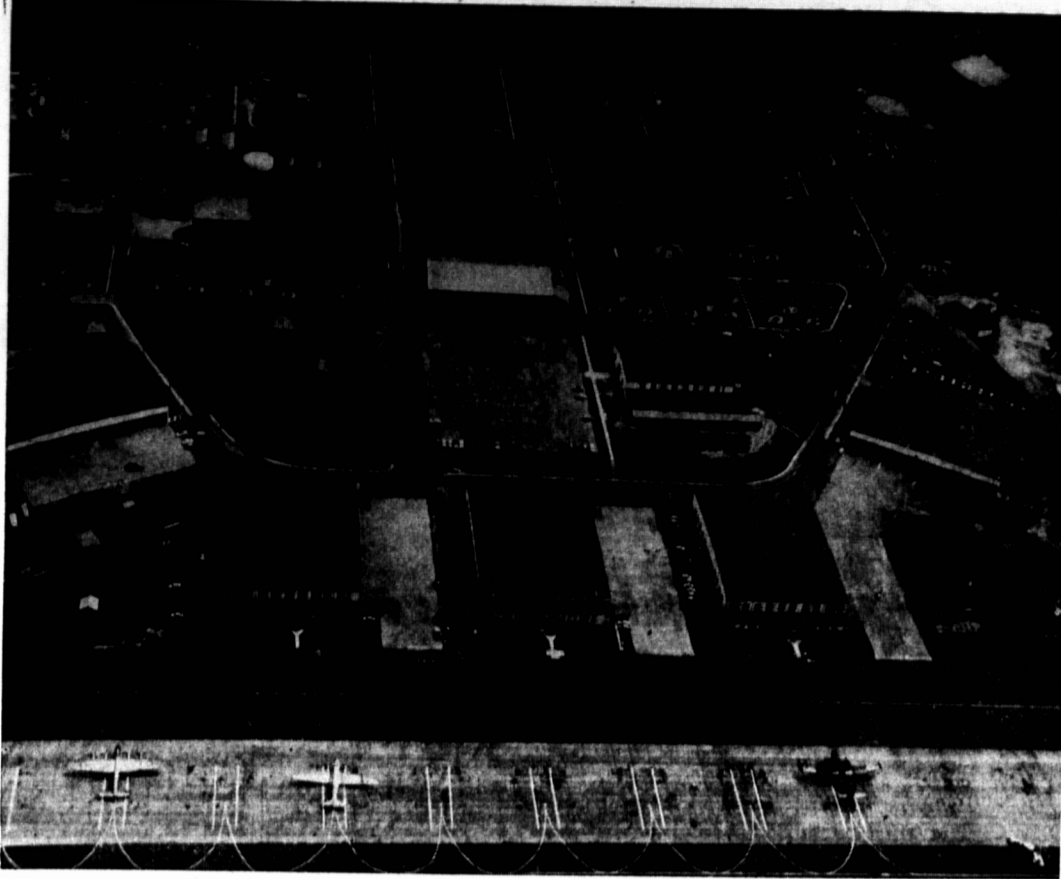
KILLED BY BALL

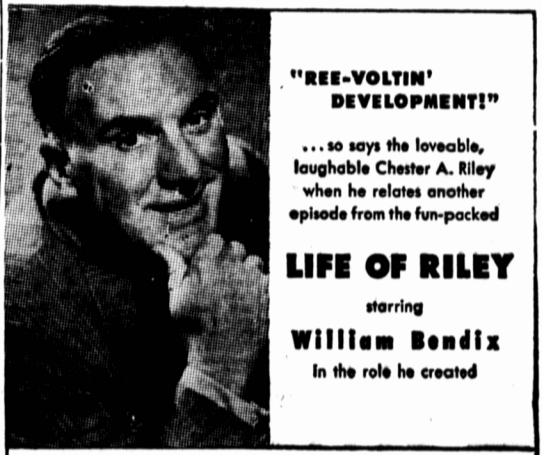

The first job to be done is the completion of the highway from Kensington to Malpeque, this is a distance of four miles and this work is starting immediately. The other job will be a further development in the project to eventually hard service the road to the national park at Cavendish from Kensington. 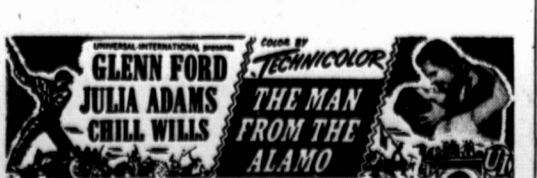
The Association plans to hold an auction sale of livestock on Thursday, August 22nd at 2:30 p.m. and have drawn up the following rules and regulations:—
