

Phillies Trounce Dodgers; Pad Braves Edge Full Game

Philadelphia's Phillies, the club that tumbled Milwaukee out of the National League lead 11 days ago, padded the Braves' first-place edge to a full game Wednesday, bouncing back from Sal Maglie's no-hit shutout Tuesday night to clobber 26-game winner Don Newcombe and Brooklyn's second-place Dodgers 7-3.

The Phils rapped Newk, working with just two days rest. Don Bessent and Clem Labine for 10 hits, while Robin Roberts, gaining his 19th victory, checked the Dodgers on five hits — three by Duke Snider, who socked his 40th and 41st home runs.

With Milwaukee and third-place Cincinnati idle, the race now looks like this:

With that one-game edge in the lost column, Milwaukee can win it all by sweeping its three-game series at St. Louis, no matter what Brooklyn does in a windup three against Pittsburgh in Ebbets Field.

THE POSSIBILITY

The Brooks need two Milwaukee defeats and a sweep of the Cubs to take it all. A Brooklyn sweep and one Milwaukee loss makes it all.

Cincinnati? The Redlegs must win their remaining two at Chicago plus three Milwaukee defeats and two Dodger losses to gain even a tie.

In the only other National League game, the Chicago Cubs defeated St. Louis 3-2 on Solly Drake's 13th inning single despite a five-hitter by loser Murry Dickson.

In the American, 21-year-old righthander Charlie Beaman fourth hit New York's pennant-winning Yankees and beat 19-game winner Whitey Ford 1-0 in his major league debut with Baltimore. Boston thumped Washington 8-4 and Detroit defeated Chicago 4-1.

OUT IN FIFTH

Newk was tagged for half the Phillie hits, leaving with a 4-2 deficit in the fifth. Newcombe now has lost seven.

Del Ennis had a homer and two singles for the Phillies, with Jones cracking a two-run single.

Roberts walked only one and struck out 10, his best one-game total of the season. He fanned Jackie Robinson three times. Snider's first home run, a crazy bouncer off the right-centerfield wall, was the 42nd hit off Robin this season—breaking the major league record Roberts set last year with 41 gopher pitches.

Ford had two of the hits, all singles, the Yankees managed off Beaman, just up from Vancouver. The rookie walked seven, struck out nine, winning when Ford tossed a wild pitch following two singles in the third.

Ted Williams and Mickey Vernon drove in two runs each for the Red Sox as Frank Sullivan won his 14th. Washington's Jim

Lemon, fanning with the bases loaded in the seventh, set a major league record for strikeouts. It was his 135th of the year, topping Vince Dimaggio's 1939 record with the Boston Braves.

Williams, 2-for-4, needs nine at-bats in his three remaining games for the 4000 necessary in the league's bat crown race. His average now is .350, while Yankee Mickey Mantle, hitless in a pinch role, is at .354.

Paul Foytack had a three-hitter for the fifth-place Tigers, winning 80 games for the first time since their second-place finish in 1950.

Kansas City was at Cleveland for a night game.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Vic Wertz hit a single and four consecutive doubles and Herb Score won his 20th game as the Cleveland Indians clinched a tie for second place in the American League with an 8-4 victory over the Kansas City Athletics Wednesday night.

Score, a 23-year-old southpaw who has lost only nine games, fanned 12 to run his league leading total to 263. He became the Indians' third 20-game winner and fifth in the league.

Brooks Feel Confident Of Victory Despite Setback

BROOKLYN (AP)—"That was a lousy exhibition—if we played like that all year we'd be in the cellar," growled Jackie Robinson.

The brooding silence in Brooklyn's dressing room, after the penultimate 7-3 loss to Philadelphia Phillies Wednesday, was so enveloping you could hear the gnashing of angry Dodger teeth.

But if the old pros of Ebbets Field were beginning to crack under the pressure of the National League stretch run—which now finds them a full game back in Milwaukee with three games for each to play—it wasn't evident.

"Don't worry, we'll win it," said Duke Snider, whose two home runs and booming double accounted for three of the Dodgers' five hits off the Philly pitching ace, Robin Roberts.

"Our big game is Friday night. If we can beat Bob Friend (Pittsburgh), I think we'll win the next two games. And I know Milwaukee will lose at least one to St. Louis Cardinals."

The Dodgers have three games left with the pesky Pirates, who stalled their pennant express last weekend in Pittsburgh, while Milwaukee has three week-end games, starting Friday, with the Cardinals in St. Louis.

The "goal" of Wednesday's game was leftfielder Sandy Amoros, who dropped an easy fly ball in the second inning which ultimately opened the door for the Phillies' three-run inning; who misplayed another fly ball and who made two errors in throwing judgment which accounted for other Philadelphia scores.

Amoros, a Cuban who can't speak English, was disconsolate

after the game, explaining with gestures that the sun got in his eyes when he parked under Ebbets' field's easy fly ball in the second inning.

Walt Alston, Brooklyn's manager, was quick to come to the young outfielder's defence.

"He had a bad day, sure," said the grip Alston. "But remember a year ago in the seventh inning of the seventh game of the world series, he made the great catch and saved the game and series for us."

"He was a hero then. Now he's a goat. That's the way it goes. But he's been a great help to us all year. We've got no gripes."

Alston smiled when asked if he'd seen any signs of panic or "lightening up" of his athletes in the late pennant drive.

"There's not a man out there who doesn't think we're going to win this thing," he said. "We've got our backs to the wall, sure, but these guys are old pros. They don't choke."

N.F.L. Cardinals Acquire Jim Rost No. 1 Quarterback

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Cardinals of the National Football League Wednesday re-acquired Jim Rost, their No. 1 quarterback in 1953, on waivers from the Cleveland Browns.

Released by the Cards in 1954, Rost played Canadian football with Ottawa Rough Riders that year. After an army hitch, he signed with Browns. In 1953, Rost ranked ninth in the NFL with 89 completions in 192 passes for 1,149 yards and eight touchdowns.

Eskimos Pay \$100 Fine For Breach Of Waiver Rule

WINNIPEG (CP)—Edmonton Eskimos of the Western Interprovincial Football Union have been fined \$100 for breach of the union's waiver rules by Commission G. Sydney Halter of Winnipeg said Wednesday.

The breach involved Harold Krebs and William Smith, now playing with London Lords of the Ontario Rugby Football Union.

The two players are on loan to the Lords and will report back to Eskis at the end of the year. Halter said Eskimos apparently did not believe the waiver rule was involved under such a move so he had levied only a nominal fine.

SPORT ECHOES

MAHA Meeting At Halifax

We sat in on an M. A. H. A. meeting held in Halifax over the weekend. It was really an educational experience. We learned a lot of things we didn't know about the set-up, and the procedure of these meetings. A great deal of the time was taken up in considering the suspensions of hockey players that played for Fredericton and New Glasgow. The New Glasgow boys were given a clean bill of health, while nobody seemed very sure whether the Fredericton "Black Caps" would sink or swim.

The New Glasgow team had become embroiled in a dispute with the Pictou team, and were suspended. But by a vote of the delegates at the annual meeting they were re-instated. The Pictou delegates pointed out with pretty air-tight reasoning, we thought, that the New Glasgow boys were being brought back into the fold through a process of ignoring the regulations of the association. Sometimes in these turbulent hockey disputes this flouting of the book seems to be the wisest thing to do. Teams should not be encouraged to defy the powers that be, of course, but when the evidence is sifted out, there is generally found to be fault on both sides, and it is difficult and desirable to suspend a whole team of hockey players, at a time when there seems to be a dearth of good puck pushers in the Maritimes.

A similar situation sometimes comes up in baseball. A team appears on the diamond with only nine players. One of these players during the course of the game turns to the umpire and says some very uncomplimentary things about his ancestors. The umpire has a choice of taking it without throwing the offending player out of the game, or throwing him out, awarding the game to the other team, and sending the spectators home disappointed and disgruntled. What to do?

The case of the Fredericton boys is saturated with confusion. Apparently they were never really suspended. At least, they were never notified, and that would seem to be a necessary

step in suspending an athlete. It was argued that if the court does not pass judgment on them, the M. A. H. A. should take their cue from that. It will be interesting: At any rate, to see if these boys play organized hockey this winter.

We managed to air our pet peeve regarding the M. A. H. A. I. E. The fact that down here in the Maritimes classification (whether senior "A", senior "B", intermediate "A", intermediate "B", etc.) is decided by application and the discretion of the association, where as in other provinces hard and fast rules are laid down to govern such classification. We didn't get a satisfactory answer. No one attempted to defend our system here. It seemed just another case of "What ever will be, will be."

It seems to us that the more you go by rules in such cases, and the less you leave to people's discretion, the less hot water governing bodies will get into. Sure, we know. Up away, we said some things that seem almost to contradict this view. Suppose we try to wiggle out of that one. It boils down to this: you may have to wink at a rule occasionally to keep the whole organizational structure from falling on your face. But rules help in the matter of classifying grades of hockey, and you get more even competition because of them.

Get ready for another evening of fun, frolic and mayhem at Civic Stadium Monday night, folks. The same colorful boys will be breaking the rules as when the referee's back is turned, the villains will be taunting the crowd between body spins, and real, he-man action will be the order of the night. We confess we were a little surprised at the crowd reaction after the last card. At least eleven fans in every dozen were loud in their praise of the show. We thought it was very, very good at times, a fraction over done for a brief interval now and then, but 1,200 wrestling fans can't be wrong. They liked it unreservedly, and we'll be surprised again if they don't come back to Civic Stadium next Monday night looking for more of the same.

Babe Zaharias Continues Fight Against Cancer

GALVESTON, Tex. (AP)—Babe Didrikson Zaharias, famed woman athlete, has not given up in her fight against cancer, John Sealy Hospital said Wednesday.

A hospital bulletin said Babe, now in critical condition, passed an easier night and appeared to have lost no further ground.

Although she is extremely weak, officials said, when awake she recognizes her family and doctors. A bulletin issued this afternoon said:

"Although there has been no pain, Babe has had an uncomfortable day because of nausea. Her condition has not changed significantly otherwise than she is very weak as she has been for 36 hours. She is conscious and rational when she talks although to conserve her strength she refrains from much talking. She has chosen to withdraw the oxygen tent by spells."

Tommy Jackson Wins Decision Over Bob Baker

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Shuffling Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson swarmed all over big Bob Baker in the final rounds with his windmill attack to gain a split decision Wednesday night in a gruelling 12-round heavyweight outdoor fight at Forbes Field.

Jackson, a 5-to-8 underdog, racked up his 26th victory in 34 fights and his second over Baker in seven months. Jackson also won a split decision over the 29-year-old Pittsburgher in Madison Square Garden Feb. 3.

Baker weighed 213½; Jackson 195.

Referee Ernie Sesto scored it 7-4-1 for Jackson. Judge Al Grayber saw it 6-4-2 for Jackson and Judge George Lupinacci had it 8-5 for Baker.

Rocket Appointed New Captain Of Montreal Canucks

MONTREAL (CP)—Maurice (Rocket) Richard, his new contract signed, became the new captain of Montreal Canadiens Wednesday. The famous Rocket is preparing to start his 15th National Hockey League campaign.

Richard visited managing director Frank Selke Tuesday and the signing was only a formality. The terms weren't disclosed. The Rocket's mates chose him captain, in succession to Butch Bouchard, veteran defenceman who has retired. Bouchard took over the captaincy in the 1947-48 season following the retirement of Toe Blake, now Canadiens coach.

Two other regulars and three rookies were signed later. The regulars are goalie Jacques Plante and defenceman om Johnson. The rookies, whom Selke announced will be sent to the new Rochester entry in the American Hockey League, are Mickey Keating, Glen Cressman and Charlie Hodge.

Keating is a promising defenceman from Winnipeg and Cressman, who hails from Kitchener, played forward with Chicoutimi of the Quebec Hockey League last season.


Hodge, a goalie, has played for several of Canadian farm clubs and now had a few fill-in jobs with the NHL club.
