A SUBJECT FOR MR. M'MULLEN.

It seems that the Laurier Government has spent exactly \$237,650 in lawyers' fees since it has been in office. The details are:—1897, \$101,409; 1898, \$100,218; 1899, \$65,960. Here is a citation from Sir Wilfrid Laurier's campaign speech at Lindsay:

"He would not have time to mention all the channels of wastefulness and corruption, but would give a few specimen bricks from the structure. Take the matter of lawyers' fees—he was very sorry to have to speak disparagingly of lawyers—he was one of them. One of the lawyers in the Cabinet was Sir C. H. Tupper, drawing a salary of \$7,000 a year. Sir Hibbert has an assistant at \$4,000 a year; then we had until the other day a Solicitor-General, at a salary of \$5,000. The above salaries totalled up \$16,000, as permanent salaries to officials engaged to conduct the litigation of the country. If he told them they paid more than that sum in extra fees they would probably be astonished. Let the amount be doubled and trebled, and they would still be far astray. Mr. Laurier then read the law expenses for several years past, and remarked that he felt confident that these large amounts were not for the legal services rendered, but for the election expenses under that guise. This expenditure he said, is corrupt and indefensible. It was not so in Mackenzie's time, and it will not be so when we have a new Liberal Administration at Ottawa."

Sir Wilfrid has served out \$267,650 in this "wastefulness" and "corruption" he undertook to stop. He is either doing wrong wrong now; or he was "inexact" to use a moderate term, when he made the speech just cited.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is stated that the government of British Columbia will appeal to the people next week.

—The proposal to abolish the senior wrangle, at Cambridge University and to class all the wranglers alphabetically has been rejected.

—The parliamentary bye-election in the Newark division of Northamptonshire, England, resulted in the election of the government candidate by a majority of 3291.

—The report is current in Montreal on very good authority that Mr. Tarte has resigned and will go to Paris for a year as Canadian High Commissioner.

—The Egyptian government has appointed an Englishman as Inspector of antiquities. Mr. Howard Carter was selected. He has been for many years identified with the Egyptian Exploration Fund. He will make an archaeological survey of the Soudan.

—The wearing of mourning is London's latest society fad. Even though without relatives at the front, all the fashionable men affect mourning bands on their hats and some go to the extreme of wearing a band on their arm. No up-to-date society woman is without a mourning gown.

—According to A. Gauthier, arsenic is constantly present in the thyroid gland, apparently like phosphorus or iodine, combined in the nucleins. Arsenic is also found in minute quantities in the spleen and in the skin, but no other organ gives even the faintest trace. This precise limitation of its occurrence has important toxicological significance.

—Lord Rosebery writes to the London Times expressing his regret that in a recent speech he forgot to mention the "singular instance of open friendliness displayed in Italy" during the present war. He said: "I mean the declaration made on behalf of the Italian government by the statesman who bears the honored name of Miscenti-Venesta. I regret that I did not recall it, for it is memorable and should be remembered."

—The last rails were laid on the Trans-Baikal section of the Siberian railway on December 28 thus completing that part of the enterprise and establishing a communication between western Europe and St. Petersburg and the eastern limits of the Russian Empire on the Pacific coast. The length of the section is 693 miles, says the Engineering and Mining Journal. The trains are transported across Lake Baikal on an ice-breaking ferry boat. The rail line is under construction from Sretensk, through Manchuria to Port Artur.

—Sir Garnet Wolseley has begun his contributions to Blackwood's Magazine by an account of his memorable expedition to quell the rebellion in the Red River Territory in 1870. The narrative of the expedition was necessarily anonymous, and occasioned one of those innocent criticisms from a weekly newspaper which have often been the cause of much mirth among the inner circle of Blackwood. The editor (John Blackwood) remarks in a letter to William Blackwood:—"I never felt more inclined to discard the anonymous than on reading the calm assertion that the writer of the Red River Expedition in Blackwood knew nothing about the subject."
