Governor-General Will Visit P.E.I.

Lieutenant-Governor W. J. MacDonald announced yesterday morning that Canada's Governor-General the Rt. Hon. Georges P. Vanier will visit Prince Edward Island next month.

The Governor-General will arrive by plane at Summerside, P.E.I., at 3:00 p.m. on Monday, October 31 where he will be met by Lt. Governor MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald and other government and civic dignitaries. The Governor-General's private train will arrive in the province earlier and will be in Charlottetown.

The Governor-General will be in the province until Friday, November 4.

On Tuesday Governor General Vanier will be honored by St. Dunstan's University when he will have conferred on him an honorary doctor of laws degree from the university. The new science building at the university will be officially opened at this time.

Governor General Vanier was scheduled to visit Prince Edward Island last spring, but his visit was cancelled when a provincial election was called.

Missionary To Brazil Tells Of Experience

Forty men of the Charlottetown Central Christian Church were on hand Thursday night to hear Low Cass, a missionary to Brazil who is married to the former Vida Stewart, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Stewart of Charlottetown, tell of his experience as a missionary in Brazil.

Mr. Cass spoke at a meeting held in the Maritime Christian College building following the regular evening evangelistic meeting.

Mr. Cass, who is home on furlough spoke following the business transactions of the Central Church's Men's Christian Fellowship. The men planned a meeting next Monday night with E.P. Benoit of Alberta to discuss the relation of religion to politics and a golf tournament the following Monday.

The guest speaker at the meeting compared the men of Brazil with the men of Prince Edward Island. He said that in many respects there was not too much difference between the two. The people of Brazil are a cosmopolitan group, made up of many

nations. There are many immigrants there. Generally speaking, Mr. Cass observed that the people of the northern part of Brazil were darker complexioned and smaller stature than those in the southern section where the influx of Europeans and Americans was not noticeable.

TREND TO CITIES
The speaker told of several large cities in excess of a million people and how the population shift was to the cities in Brazil, the same as on the North American continent. The principal language in the country is Portuguese whereas in other South American countries Spanish predominates. He observed that there were problems in persuading men to assume responsibilities in the churches the same as in this province.

In replying to questions following his address, Mr. Cass stated that while Brazil was a melting pot for people of many nations there was evidence of segregation and discrimination, the same as in North America. The discrimination is sharpest against the Japanese in that country.

Coffee and doughnuts were served following the business and lecture. The meeting was the first official meeting of the season for the Men's Christian Fellowship.

J. J. Revell To Attend Conference

Westmoreland Resident Remanded For Sentence

A Westmoreland, P.E.I. man, Lawson Oakes was found guilty of having in his possession an offensive weapon and constituting a danger to the public peace, by Magistrate James B. Johnson in Magistrate's Court yesterday.

The accused was remanded to the Queen's County Jail until Wednesday, October 5 at 10:30 a.m. for sentencing. Bail was set at \$100.

Cst. Alan Burchill of the Borden detachment of the RCMP, a crown witness, in his testimony stated that he had received a call on September 29 at 8:30 p.m. from the accused's 12-year-old daughter informing them that her father was in the yard of their home with a shotgun and had just shot the lock of the trunk of his car.

WITH THE GUN
Cst. Burchill said he is the company of Cst. John McQuire, RCMP, had proceeded to the Oakes' home and found the accused standing at the side of the house with the gun. Cst. Burchill said that the accused told he and Cst. McQuire to go back to the road and that he had pointed the gun at him. Cst. Burchill explained to the court how the gun was taken from Oakes and that the gun was loaded. It was a 12 gauge shotgun. Cst. Burchill noted that the accused was moderately intoxicated. The accused was not represented by counsel.
