

Enjoyable Irish Play At Tignish

—Despite the bad weather and roads a very large crowd attended the annual St. Patrick's Play in St. Mary's Hall, Tignish, on Thursday and Friday evenings. The play this year was a three act drama, "Kitty Kearney From Killarney," directed by Mr. Arthur Arsenault.

The setting for the entire play was the beautiful and spacious living room of one of America's most popular society ladies, Mrs. Wellington Spencer. A young business man who does not make friends easily persists in spending his money lavishly in order to buy his way into the "social world."

A number of very capable performers filled the supporting roles and rounded out the production in a very suitable way.
